During the year 1867, there ewere 90 married convicts of both sexes in the Provincial Penitentiary; 190 single persons of both sexes, 5 widows and 5 widowers, making a total of 296. From these figures we infer that marriage is one of the most powerful preventives of crime, and as a consequence early marriages should be encouraged. It has been posed to our national school system, that education is a prolific cause of c ime. Let us see what the facts of the case are. London Aug. 29.—It is announced to-day that the Parliament will meet on the 10th of December next, the meeting will be merely for qualification of members and other preliminary business. The Queen's speech will be delivered on the

St. Petersburg, Aug. 29.—By a fire at Marco Polo town, on the sea of Azof, some 250 houses were destroyed, and the fire was still burning at last accounts.

Lisbon, Aug. 29.—Advices from Rio Janeiro to the 8th are received. The Paraguayan garrison at Humaita had been starved out. On the 24th July they evacuated the fortress, the allied forces marched into Humaita. The next day 250 cannon, and a great quantity of ammunition, small arms, &c., which the Paraguayans were compelled to abandon, were captured by the allies. The retreating Paraguayans were oursued, and 400 of them cut off from the main body, and surrounded in Elgrau Chaco. They here formed a line of battle, and in answer to a demand to surrender, emphatically refused. Three Brazilian iron clads had forced their way past the obstructions, and had joined the fleet bombarding Lopez's position at the mouth of the Tibiguary. Marshal Calxas was also advancing his troops against Lopez on the land side, it was believed the Paraguayans would be obliged to surrender the position; it was believed throughout Brazil that the war was nearly closed. A revolt in Paraguay had been put down summarily, and the leaders arrested, A former Secretary of Foreign Affairs named Bergs was engaged in it and was shot.

London, Aug. 30—Accounts from the Rio Parana state that the Paraguayans claim that the allies received very severe checks in two battles on the 16th and 18th July. The fortress was subsequently evacuated without knowledge of the enemy, all heavy guns spiked, and arms and ammunition removed. The Governments of Chili and Bolivia had offered their good offices to Lopez as mediators. Humaita was abandoned because Lopez had completed his new defensive line of fortifications. Paraguayans were confident that the allies, though holding the priver, would not attempt to enter the interior of the country, and believed that the war would soon end.

WAR RUMORS .- A letter from Ber lin, in the Temps, says: In political circles here the greatest importance is attached to the interview between the Emperor of Russia and the King of Prussia. An offensive and defensive alliance between the two Powers is more than ever spoken of. Appar ently the political horizon is free from clouds; there does not seem to be a question in dispute which is likely to lead to a conflict, but yet the people here believe in an explosion in a short time. People here take on mysterious airs, and say that there is "very disquieting news from France," which requires them to be ready for any conngency, and they add that they are prepared and have nothing to dread. A correspondent, writing from Paris, also says :- " Although Louis Napoleon has proclaimed that nothing threatens the peace of Europe 'to-day. and the skies are apparently cloudless, I am assured that some of the best informed foreigners—Italian, French and German—in London, men particularly well acquainted with the undercurrents of continental affairs, that this year will not end without seeing a battle between France and Prussia in the vicinity of Mayence, the French dynasty baving at last concluded that it sally popular,"

THE COLENSO TROUBLE .- The wexed question of Dr. Colenso's right sings very willingly, if not very sweetly, to the bishopric of Natal has taken a fresh lease of life. Our readers will remember that on account of his famous book he was formally deposed by an ecclesiastical tribunal; that he resisted; and that the civil courts of Great Britain pronounced in his favor. Now it seems that a new bishop for the See of Natal is about to be consecrated in England, and so the relations of the Church and State will be brought to a very delicate point. Dr. Colenso, with the judges to back him, will be able to enforce a claim to the diocesan revenues, and though the consecration of the new prelate will undoubtedly, according to the principles of the Church of England, be valid, it is not easy to perceive how the Archbishop of Canterbury can put him in possession of his See. The real trouble falls upon the unhappy sheep over whom the rival shepherds will have to quarrel.

Godd News.—The Belleville Intelligencer says: While gold discoveries have been languishing in some parts of the back country, Marmora has received a fresh impetus in some very valuable discoveries. Some months ago it was found at Feigle's, lot 16 in the 11th con. and for some time nothing further in gold was heard of in that quarter, but about a month since a fine lead, showing free gold, was found by one of the Gillen s on lot 6 in the 3th concession. At the time of the discovery this was kept quiet, and the lead traced across lots 7, 8, 9 and 10 in the 9th concession. When the news became partially public, and a general rush was made. But titles were so mixed up it became almost impossible to get them perfected after bargains were made.—That this particular section of the country is rich in paying veins of gold bearing quartz there seems to be no double, as free gold in several of them can be found with little trouble. As yet the best discoveries are on lot 6 in the 9th concession of Marmora. The quartz is of the same character as found in Nova Scotia, easily worked, and abounding in free gold.

The repeal debate in the Nova Scotian Legislature creeps along slowly. It was expected to end on Friday, but every member seems resolved to make a speech. Mr B. S. Dawson left Ottawa on Saturday for Fort William. It is said the Government have not taken any action with regrd to the new route discovered by Mr. Dawson, making available a considerable extent of water communication on the Red River route. If Mr. Dawson's discovery is genuine, which there seems no reason to doubt, the other lake work should be stopped at once.

Mr. James O'Rielly, Q. C. of Kingston arrived on Saturday to prepare for the prosecution of the Crown business at the assizes, which commences September the 2nd. It is said that Whalen, Doyle, Buckley and Slattery will be arraigned on charge of the murder of Mr. D'Arcy McGoe. All the presents which she had received from the Queen and the Emperor of the French were buried with her, and all her furniture and personal effects.


