

Sir John A. Macdonald said the government of Canada had, in 1896, adopted a license system not as matter of revenue is but simply as an assertion of its right to these waters—a right which was considered so important that the Americans should recognize the license fee which had been raised from 50 cents in 1866 to \$1 in 1867, and now it was \$2 per ton. After explaining the law which gave authority for the full enforcement of every measure necessary for protection, he stated that already the admiral had taken early means for their protection. OPENING UP THE NORTH-WEST. THE CROWN LAND OFFICE.

OPENING UP THE NORTH-WEST. A movement has been inaugurated by a number of capitalists in Toronto with the view of opening up communication between Thunder Bay and the Red River country. A prospectus of a contemplated railway and canal from Lake Superior to Red River was submitted to the meeting, and highly approved of. A number of provisional directors were at once appointed to forward the views of the meeting held at. Toronto on Saturday last, and the total sum required for the completion of the work is estimated at below six millions and a half of dollars, to raise which a company is proposed to be formed, to embrace some of the leading moneyed men of the provinces. We wish this scheme all possible success, and it is not only feasible in an engineering point of view, but eminently practical in a business way. When the undertaking is completed, Fort Garry will be within forty hours travel of Thunder Bay, and the line to be built will be a link to the chain which will bind the Pacific to us, and attract hitherward a large portion of the trade in the Chinese and Indian seas. Pushing men have taken hold of the work, and we doubt not of their ultimate success.

GREECE AND THE GREEKS.—All accounts agree in representing the present state of Greece as unsatisfactory in every respect, except as in giving hopes that the worst is past. Greece has a bankrupt exchequer, a discredited policy, a languishing agriculture and provinces infested by the most barbarous brigands in Europe. The failure of the Cretan insurrection, the collapse of the "grand idea" and, above all, the fact that the treasury is empty, and there are no means of filling it, must have a sedative effect, upon the entire Greek community. One may say that Greece is now at the bottom of the wheel of foitune, and that every change must tend to raise beg. She is without roads bridges, and the ordinary facilities for communication; the land is in many parts out of cultivation, owing to the small number of the rural in habitants, the difficulty of carrying produce and the operation of a tyrannical system of finance. In the whole of the districts north of the Isthmus of Corinth brigandage prevails, and some places are more dangerous now than at any period since Greece has been a kingdom. Lately the same disorder has invaded the Peloponnessus so that in this roadless, carriageless Greece there is no part where the foreign tourist can travel without the fear of interruption, or where the cultivator of the soil may hope to dwell in security.


