B., and Miss Agnes Wickham, eldest daughter of the Rev. Hill Dave Wickham, rector of Horstington, Somerset; but in consequence of the recent death of General Seymour's brother, the Governor of British Columbia, the marriage will not take place till the end of August."

THE transfer of the Hudson Bay Territory to the Dominion will make the duty to be paid on goods imported twenty instead of four per cent, as at present.
