

In the Public Charities report furnished by Dr. Sinclair, the government inspector of penal and humane instituions, he makes a strong plea for an establishment of this nature, depre cating the necessity of placing children of defective intellect among the portunity for their development permitted, and also the neglect of many other children of well to do families who are not so situated as to secure the benefit of systematic

Dr. Sinclair asserts much can be accomplished in educating these children. They may be vastly benefitted and so educated that they can assist materially in their own support. He urges the establishment of an asylum with nection with it, and with facilities for trades-teaching, as well as ordinary education, to which all the feebleminded juveniles now in our asylums and as many as possible now cared for under the parental roof, should be sent. Under skilled instructors they could be graded, taught and trained and their dormant intelligence stimu-

The other resolution appointed a committee to take steps to organize the fruit growers into a working body for the purpose of having our fruit go through this one channel if the service be obtained and prove satisfactory.

FIGHTING THE FLAMES IN A COAL MINE.

Sydney, March 21.—With their eyes and nostrils filled with the nauseating oder of coal gas and their faces within parching distance of a sea of flame which curls and rises above two hundred square feet of solid coal one hundred firemen are slowly but surely subduing the fire in Dominion No. 1. Within the pit it is Egyptian darkness and except for the occasional gleam of a miners safety lamp and the faint flickering hissing of a blue flame which rises and then recedes, one could not imagine the fierce conflict between man and fire which is raging hundreds of feet beneath ground. Just one hundred men face that stubborn conflagration. With three lines of hose they advance through the darkness and the heat and gas which stifles, then warns and compels them to recede. They cough and spit, wipe their brows and in a moment the hose is once more playing over that sea of burning coals. It takes but little imagination to picture the weird scene and less to realize the difficulty of the task. But as one shift works through its allotted time another takes its place. The stead's stream of water continues and gra' ally the suffocating black smoke diminishes and the brave fireladdies realize that they are conquering inch by inch.

'There is a slight change for the better.' This was the statement is sued to-day to the Chronicle's correspondent by J. H. Duggan, asst. Mgr. director of the Hominion Coal Co., who has been on the scene all hight and who is there to-day. The men got nearer the fire by shovelling out one of the cross cuts between the main and back deep. Three steady streams of water are playing over the burning area but the work of the men was considerably hampered to-day by heavy falls of stone. The fire is being attacked from three different sides and the volume of smoke is slowly becoming less. Besides the suffocating gas and smoke the firemen are compelled to face intense heat. Imagine the heat from a furnace filled with red bot coals and one can have a faint idea of the intensity of the heat from this conflagration. It can easily be imagined how difficult it is to get near such a big surface of red hot coals. And then there is the fear of falling coal. Timbers have been burned away and coal is falling in many places, but this has in no way deterred them from advancing as near as possible to the smouldering mass. It is still dense and it is only occacasionally that a faint flame is perceptible. But the fire is there nevertheless. A seething mass of flames reigns beneath that smoky mass. Four hours each shift of one hundred men works. There are plenty of volunteers and every effort is being made to quench the fury of the conflagration. Last night a large force of men were engaged in getting material ready to put in strong dams in case it becomes necessary to flood the burning section of the pit. A strong pump has been installed and everything will soon be ready for this emergency.
