A Million Dollar Fire

in Portland, Maine

PORTLAND, Me., January 24 .-- A fire which caused a property damage of \$1,000,000 early to-day, destroyed the city hall and police buildings, and endangered the lives of more than 700 persons. Although known as the city hall, the building was divided between city and county offices, while the police building sheltered the supreme judicial and municipal courts in addition to the police department. The fire was the worst in the state since the great conflagration in Portland, in 1866, when the city's business and residential sections were almost completely wiped out. Deaths were absent from the fire, a fact considered very remarkable, as there were more than 700 members of Boston and Maine Knights of Pythias gathered in the auditorium of the city hall when the flames were discovered. Only few persons were hurt.

Chief Engineer Melville Eldridge, the only one known to be seriously in jured, was able to direct the fight against the flames throughout, being supported by two assistants. The financial loss is estimated a \$1,000,000, but this sum will not cover 11.55 a. m the loss of the papers and decuments
