General Intelligence.

(From the N. Y. Commercial Advertiser, 18th April.)

ENGLAND.
Sir Robert Peel's proposition to lay on an Income Tax was debated at great length from night to night, until the 23rd of March, when the opponents of the measure succeeded in throwing it over beyond the Easter holidays, in spite of the Premier's most strenuous efforts to have the sense of the House taken upon it before the adjournment. The debate was to be resumed on the 4th of April.
In the course of the discussions Sir Robert informed the House that the Queen had of her own accord given him to understand that, if Parliament should think an income tax necessary, it was her wish and intention that her income should be subjected to it, as well as those of her people.
On Monday, March 7, the army estimates were brought forward. No material difference from last year was proposed, the estimate being for 1,250,000 rank and file, officers and non-commissioned officers. Increase, 1447, accounted for by the raising of the royal Canadian regiment and the St. Helena corps, and an augmentation of the 3rd West India regiment. After sundry objections the motion was agreed to. The sum voted was £3,587,571—not including the expense for India.
Mr. Ward's motion for a committee to inquire and report whether there are peculiar burdens affecting the landed interest, or whether that interest enjoys peculiar exemptions, after considerable debate was negatived, 115 to 230. The House is clearly resolved to go on with Sir Robert Peel in perfecting his corn law.

Spain.
The accounts from Madrid were to the 24th of March.—The conspiracy, if it is really existed, had not broken out, and was believed to be postponed sine die. The kingdom was generally tranquil, and the Regent was going on vigorously and successfully. The capital was principally occupied with the solemnities of the holy week. The best understanding was said to exist between the Regent and the Infant Don Francisco, uncle of the young Queen. In the northern provinces there were no movements or intimations of discontent.

Portugal.
On the 16th of March the Queen gave birth to another Prince, which happy event was celebrated with the usual rejoicings. The late revolution had been followed by a state of repose, all parties settling down in apparent acquiescence; the chief personages by whom it was effected had received promotion and honours, and all was going on favourably. The difficulties with the Papal Government, consequent upon the confiscations of church property, were in train of amicable adjustment, and the Pope was to be sponsor for the new-born Prince.

WELAND CANAL.—This important link of connexion between the two splendid lakes, Erie and Ontario, will soon be in requisition again, for the purpose of commerce. It is known to most of our readers, that the water has been drawn off the canal, during the past winter, in order to afford an opportunity of widening and deepening the feeder. The contractors for the work have been favoured with propitious weather, and have proceeded advantageously and prosperously, thus far. It is expected that, in the course of another season, this object will be fully accomplished. On Thursday, the 14th inst., the water was let in again, and the following day witnessed between twenty and thirty schooners, lying in the basin near our village, on their way to their various destinations on the upper lakes. One of them is bound for Chicago, Illinois, and others to various ports in Canada and the United States. The various branches of trade will now receive a fresh impetus. Considerable Canada capital has been employed, during the past winter, in purchasing wheat, in Ohio, and other Western States, and in such as from the upper part of this division of Canada.—St. Catharines Journal.

ST. LAWRENCE CANAL.—We are glad to see that one thousand labourers are required on the St. Lawrence Canal, at the Long Sault, to whom employment is promised during the season. Fifty stone-cutters and a like number of masons are also advertised for on the same works.—Montreal Courier.

IMPROVEMENTS IN THE WEST, are proceeding with every possible rapidity. The main Western road from Brantford to London is being surveyed, and will be immediately under contract. The road leading from Woodstock to Port Burwell is being surveyed by Mr. Carroll. The Great Western road from London to Sarnia is already under contract, and a great portion of it is now being grubbed.

MILITARY MOVEMENTS IN CANADA.—The following will be the distribution of the army in Canada after the opening of the navigation in spring.—Kingston—43d regiment, and left wing of the 93d Highlanders. Toronto—83d regiment and head-quarters of the 93d Highlanders. Drummondville—67th regiment. London—The Royals and 89th regiment. Amherstburgh—14th regiment. Montreal and St. Helens—Head-quarters of the Queen's Royal Canadian corps, 43d, 70th, and 71st regiments. Quebec—6th regiment of guards. St. John's—85th regiment. Chambly—56th regiment. Three Rivers and Nicolet—Left wing of the royal Canadian regiment. Laprairie—Head-quarters of the 74th regiment. Isle-aux-Noix—6th regiment of the 74th regiment. Sorel—Head-quarters of the 18th regiment. Portage—Left wing of the 6th regiment. We understand that all the general officers lately promoted, who were employed on the staff at that time, are to continue in their commands until the end of the present military year, both at home and abroad. Lieut.-General Clitherow will therefore continue in command at Kingston until that period.
