BY-LAW NO. 607.

A BY-LAW to authorize the Warden and Treasurer of the County of Welland to borrow money.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient that authority be given the Warden and Treasurer of the County of Welland to borrow money for the use of the said County during the current year:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED, and it is hereby enacted, that the Warden and Treasurer be, and they are, hereby authorized to negotiate any loans necessary for the use of the County of Welland during the current year.

BY-LAW NO. 608.

A BY-LAW to raise a sum of money by assessment in aid of Public Schools in the Townships in the County of Welland for the year 1893.

WHEREAS, the Standing Committee on Education, in and by their report, recommended that the sums therein mentioned be raised the current year in the several townships in aid of Public Schools;

And, whereas, the Corporation of the County of Welland desires to carry such recommendation into effect, and enacts as follows:

That there shall be levied and collected in the several townships within the County of Welland, the current year, for payment of legally qualified teachers of Public Schools therein, the sums hereinafter named, which said sums so to be raised shall be over and above and in addition to all other rates whatsoever, in the manner and within the time limited and appointed by law for levying and collecting taxes generally, and shall be paid over to the Sub-Treasurers for the said townships in which the same is raised, on or before the 14th day of December next, or on or before such other day as shall be fixed in any by-law of such township which may be passed fixing the time when the collectors shall pay over their collections and return their rolls, that is to say:

DRAINAGE.

Your committee have purchased 4397 three inch tile at \$9 per thousand, and 3603 two and a half inch tile at \$8 per thousand, from the estate of T. W. Hooker; and whenever the weather would permit a gang of prisoners was kept at work laying the tile, at first under the superintendence of Mr. Gilchriese, and when he could no longer be permitted to leave the jail, in charge of James Walker, E. H. Burgar and M. Hoban as guards. For some time the work was carried on slowly and with great difficulty owing to the frost, but finally 7000 tile were laid, completing the drainage of the field north of the House and barn, and the greater part of the system yet uncompleted on the south side.

PRISON LABOR.

Prisoners were employed, whenever the weather permitted, from the beginning of the year until April 8th, in parties numbering from eight to twelve daily. In all, they performed 472 days labor of seven hours each, during that time, and as a rule they worked well and cheerfully. Besides laying the drains and pipes and transplanting trees, already referred to, they sawed 50 cords of wood and husked a considerable quantity of corn. We believe that the experiment of employing them on the farm may be confidently pronounced a success. About one thousand tile remain unlaid.

While many of the schools are well equipped with maps, globes,

black boards, &c., it has been occasionally necessary to call the

attention of trustees to the need of a better supply or of an improved quality. The addition of a standard dictionary and gazetteer to the equipments formerly required by the regulations, is one that fills a very useful place in the schools, but the schools are not yet generally supplied with it, the expense, amounting to \$10 or \$12, apparently being something of an obstacle in the way to its being provided.

Q. -ORDER AND DISCIPLINE.

Good order and discipline are essential to the teacher's efficiency and the pupils' progress, including the formation of habits of punctuality, industry and good conduct, and I am glad to be able to report favorably of the order and discipline maintained in the schools generally; while suggestions may occasionally be made with a view to the improvement of the order and discipline, in some of the schools they are all that could be desired. Among the means employed for the maintainance of order and discipline, that of keeping the pupils well occupied is one of the most efficient and most strongly urged. Rewards and punishments also have their uses, among the former, merit marks, merit cards, prizes, posting in the school room the results of the written examinations, which are held weekly in one subject in most of the schools, or publishing the results, are employed, and among the punishments demerit marks, detention, standing on the floor, corporal punishment, suspension and expulsion. Corporal punishment, however, is resorted to only when milder means fail, and the management of some of our teachers is such as to obviate the necessity of using it once during the course of the year, and suspension or expulsion is very seldom employed at all.

10.-PROGRAMME OF STUDIES.

The programme of studies prescribed by law is generally pretty closely followed. In certain large schools, however, which have only one teacher, and which comprise pupils of all grades, from beginners up to those who are about to compete for teachers' third class certificates, failure to carry out the programme as fully as is contemplated by law is not to be wondered at. The proper remedy in such cases is the employment of an assistant teacher, and this would be attended

with good returns, as the school would afford better advantages, the pupils would receive better attention and would make better pro-Among the subjects requiring more attention in our public schools is that of agriculture, which is one of the most important subjects on the programme. Farming is the chief industry of the country, and upon it the trade and commerce of the country and its general wealth and prosperity largely depend. The great majority of the public school population belong to the rural districts, and twothirds of the people are either engaged in farming or are intimately connected with it. It is very desirable and important therefore, that an occupation which affords a living to so large a proportion of the people, and is of such supreme importance to the country, should receive due attention in our public schools, and as much reliable information as possible be imparted in regard to agricultural pursuits. If the teaching could be made so efficient, and farm life with its healthfulness, simplicity and independence, be made so attractive as to enlist the youth of the country in its pursuit, and inspire an ambition of being well informed, progressive and successful farmers, instead of drifting into the cities, it will be accomplishing a work whose importance cannot be overestimated.

With a view to qualifying public school teachers for teaching the subject efficiently, the Agricultural College at Guelph is to be open to teachers (male and female) during the month of July, and instruction given free of charge, and it is to be hoped as many as possible will avail themselves of the opportunity of thus qualifying themselves for teaching this important subject, and if rural trustees should offer a bonus to those who have done so it will be another step in the right direction.

11. - STATE OF PROFICIENCY.

In grading the standing of the pupils in each school in the different subjects of study, it is found convenient to employ six different grades, the highest being excellent, and the lowest very poor. It is seldom, however, that a class is found requiring to be ranked in the lowest grade; and while the highest grade is frequently attained, the

next lower, good, is common, and middling the grade generally attained by those who rank next lower than good, while inferior or poor, although a grade met with, is not common.

COUNTY MODEL SCHOOL.

Among the means employed for promoting the efficiency of the public school, that of training the teachers for their work is one of the highest importance. For third class teachers, this is done at the County Model school, and it is gratifying to observe the painstaking. earnestness and fidelity with which the principal, Mr. S. C. Woodworth, and his assistants, discharge this important duty. During the last session 20 teachers in training attended, and at the close they were subjected to an examination which was partly written, and consisted partly in practical teaching, before the County board of examiners. At the conclusion it was found that they all had reached the standard for receiving certificates, which were accordingly awarded to all,-although in a couple of cases the certificates were with-held until the legal age for receiving them had been attained.

In regard to the County Model school accommodations, they are not by any means such as should be provided, and it is to be hoped that circumstances will permit of accommodations being provided which will correspond to the importance of the institution.

Minister of Education.

In accordance with the last clause of this resolution, the cooperation of your council is solicited in this matter, with the view, as expressed, of presenting the same to the Hon. Minister of Education. The public school is the substantial foundation of our school system. It is the only part of our school system in which all share alike. It is therefore the school of our people, and legislative aid to these schools should be considered first, as when expended on these it is expended in a manner in which all have a direct interest. We are not warring against the High schools in the least, but we ask consideration for the Public school in some reasonable proportion to that given the High school from the public fund. The High school is to a very considerable extent a class school, as is shown from the fact that for every pupil attending the High schools in this province there are at least 22 attending the Public schools.

The legislative grant to Public schools is equal to about \$24.00 for every teacher employed in them, while for High schools it amounts to over \$200.00 per teacher. The legislative aid to Public schools averages less than \$40.00 per school, while to High schools it is over \$800.00 per school.

We have reason therefore for saying that, while we do not wish to see the High school curtailed in any way, we do wish for greater consideration for the Public school.

Secondly, as to the distribution of public school grants, legislative and municipal: The system at present in use was adopted in

1871 when circumstances/ were different, and encouragement to attend school was required. At the present time there is one law and one set of regulations for all Public schools in the province. The management of these schools is the same. The equipment is to be the same, and we ask why should not the assistance be the same. All are doing or trying to do the same work, teaching from the same text book, preparing for the same examinations, answering the same questions and obeying the same instructions from the department. Besides, with increased legislative aid, and an equal distribution of this aid on the basis of the number of schools and departments of schools in operation, trustees would know just how much they would receive in any year, and the satisfaction of equal sharing would prevail. We therefore hope to receive your approval of the foregoing resolution, endorsing (1) an increased legislative Public school grant, and (2) an equal distribution of this grant among the Public schools and departments of Public schools throughout this province.

The undersigned would respectfully suggest to your Honorable Body that it would be in the interests of litigants, and of the public generally, to have authority given to the judge of the county court to engage the services of a short-hand reporter for the session of the county court.

We understand that the usual rate of remuneration for sborthand reporters, payable out of the county funds, is the sum of five dollars per day, and whatever travelling expenses the reporter may incur.

It will be at once apparent to you that if even one day were saved by reason of the service of a reporter, a large saving of county funds would be secured.

The members of the council are aware that there are forty-eight petit jurors in attendance at each session of the court. If a day were saved at each of the sessions, in June and December, there would be a saving of ninety-six dollars to the county, at an expenditure of about ten dollars for the reporter.

Aside from the question of expense, it is now generally conceded that the business of the court is facilitated by means of a stenographer. It is also well known to the members of the county council that a stenographer is always in attendance at the sessions of the superior courts.

We who sign this letter are practitioners in the county courts of the county and are also practitioners in the high courts, which have their sessions in this county, and we are therefore in a position to say that were a reporter engaged in the county court the business of that court would be facilitated to the same extent as the business of the high court.

We would therefore suggest that the county judge of the county be empowered to engage the services of a stenographer at an expenditure of five dollars per day and expenses.
