# WAR UPON BULGARIA

Every Dollar Spent in U. S. Approved by British Government.

SESSIONS IN LONDON

Russia's Disregard of This Committee Upset Exchange Situation.

TEW YORK, Oct. 15 .-- Of the millions of dollars spent daily in this country by the allies for war supplies, not a dollar, it was learned authoritatively today, can be spent without first obtaining the official sanction of the British Govern-

This sanction is obtained from committee sitting in London and holding frequent sessions. Altho the com-mission has been in operation for any months, its existence has retofore been generally known outovernmental circles Only once, so far as can be learned—and then in the case of Russia—has the mandate of this body been disregard—

The personnel of this committee has never been published and probably never will be. It consists, however, of representatives of each of the allied nations, from Great Britain to Montenance. Montenegro, controls absolutely the purchase of all war supplies in whatever section of the world they may be bought, acts as a financial check and supervisor over all the war chests and supervisor over all the war chests of all the allies, and seeks to eliminate positively competitive bidding on the part of the allies for war supplies in the few open markets of the world, first of all, in the United States.

No Supervision at Home.

Over mychases made in home.

Over purchases made in home mar-kets by the various nations the committee holds no supervision. Its sphere is limited strictly to purchases outside the boundary lines of the nations at war and their colonies. The committee is designated by a French title, the English translation of which is "The international war supplies committee."

Under its guidance, Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy, in seeking munitions of war in the U.S. and other supplies, refrain from competition in bidding. Such competition, if permitted, the committee realized early in its career, would result in sending prices of munitions and other supplies to prohibitive levels and would consequently swell the cost of conducting the war proportionately. Instead of coming into the American market when supplies are needed and waging a financial contest for supremacy in obtaining the supplies, the allies have adopted a system of placing one big order at a time in this country. When the contract for this order is signed, the next allied nation's needs are taken up and another contract is

The British Foreign Office announces that, in view of the fact that Bulgaria has announced she is at war with Serbia and is an ally of the central powers, his majesty's government has informed the Bulgarian Government, thru the Swedish ministry at London, who is in charge of Bulgarian interests, that a state of war exists between Great Britain and Bulgaria from 10 p.m.

"On Oct. 11 the Bulgarians made a surprise attack on us at Koritza and Glava. The attack was repulsed. The same day the Bulgars occupied the positions of Kita and advanced two-thirds of a mile into our territory. "On the 12th they attacked our positions at Ivanovra and Livada, but were repulsed. The same day they attacked without result our positions at Pisina. Boukva, Rasovati, Kanon, Viroboulasova and Goleche. On the 13th they attacked the line of Tsrwer Kinanengrad, repulsing one of our detachments. In the whole Timok River section the Bulgars opened fire on our positions. We made no reply. "On the 14th they attacked various points. Near Krivapalanka they attacked Ravnomnivo fort and also in the direction of Radiochevo and in the Strimina valley.

"Bulgaria thus began war against us treacherously, as in 1913, by surprise, and without a declaration of war."

LORD DERBY'S PLANS

Sufficient Number of Volunteers Expected Without Conscription.

French Destroy Two Blockhouses and Trenches at Violu in Vosges.

POSITIONS RETAKEN

Teutons Regain Some in Champagne—French Regain Some in Lorraine.

ARIS, Oct. 16. - Two German blockhouses were torn up and their trenches demolished by French artillery operating at the Violu French artillery operating at the Violu, in the Vosges, between the Sainte Marie and the Bonhomme pass. The French recaptured some trenches in Lorraine, which the Germans had taken on Oct. 9. In Champagne, the Germans, under cover of a heavy arfooting in some trenches forming a salient at the extreme left of the French line of advance east of Auberive. In the Vosges, the Germans launched a heavy attack on a 5000 yards front between Rehfelsen and the Sudelkopt. They were repulsed everywhere except at Hartmans-Weilerkopf, where they again occupied some trenches at the summit. The fighting on the British front east of Loos was confined to a flerce artillery

The official statement of the French war office tonight follows:

war office tonight follows:

"Bombardments were again vicient on both sides during the most of the day before Loos, at Boisenhache, and in the Givenchy wood.

"In Champagne, under the cover of the bombardment reported this morning to the east of Auberive, the enemy was able to secure again a footing on a certain point of his former trenches in the form of a salient in front of the extreme left wing of the positions carried by our recent attacks.

"In the Argonne the explosion of one of our mines has shattered some enemy lines near Hill 285.

"On the front of Lorraine we have recaptured some elements of trenches which the enemy had been holding since Oct. 9 to the north of Reillion. We have repulsed several counterattacks. Fifty prisoners remained in our hands.

"In the Vosges the Germans this morning made a very strong attack on a five-kilome re (3.11 miles) front between Rehfelsen, to the south of the Hartmanns-We lerkopf, and the Sudelkopf. This attack had been preceded by violent showers of shells of various calibres and big bombs and was accompanied by the projection of biazing petroleum.

### **GERMANY CAN STOP ARMENIAN HORRORS**

Viscount Bryce Appeals to Neutrals to Bring Pressure to Bear.

ONLY REMEDY OPEN

Deliberate Extermination of People Whom Turks Envied, Going On.

LONDON, Oct 15-"There is only one power that can stop the Armenian atrocities and that is Germany," declared Viscount Bryce at a meeting today at the Mansion House, in support of the lord mayor's fund in aid of the Armenian sufferers. He declared that the only remedy was to bring the pressure of world opinion, particularly of neutral opinion, to bear on Germany and force her to take action.

Viscount Bryce, who proposed a resolution condemning the reported atgence and progressiveness of the Armenians who, he said, were far superior in the Mohammedans, and he declared the case was not so much of religious fanatacism as it were the religious fanatacism as it was of deliberate extermination of a people of whom the Turks were envious.

Horrors Exceed Everything.

The horrors of the massacres exceeded anything in the history of persecutions, declared the speaker.

Women and children, he s id, had driven across the Arabian desert with whips by the Turks, who went mad, and at Trebizond carried their victims out to sea in boats and drowned them. "Women, many of whom were as highly civilized as any of us," he declared, "had been sold into slavery, where they were Mohammedanized. He declared untrue the events offered by Germans for the excuse offered by Germans for the Turks to the effect that the Armnians had rebelled, the speaker declaring that the Armenians were quiet and inoffesnive until forced to fend themselves.

Cardinal Denounces Turks. 'In seconding the resolution Car-dinal Bourne said that the evidence was not able to deny the massacres. Neutrals, he said, should follow the example of Pope Benedict, who wrote was so strong that even Germany a personal protest and plea to the

Sir Edward Pears, who had been the leader of the British Bar in Constantinople, apparently surprised his hearers by saying that the persecu-tion was not an article of Moham-medan faith and that the massacres were deplored by the mass o Turks. DUTCH FIRED ON ZEPPS.





It is not difficult to discriminate between the Germans and the allies by the bribes they offer to neutral powers. Germany, which has been preparing for a world-war and hoping for world-domination ever since the time of Frederick the Great, taking the first step in the modern development in 1864 with the robbery from Denmark of Schleswig - Holstein-Germany knows only one motivepower with which effectively to operate on human nature. It is the power which alone is effective with herselfthe motive of greed and selfishness. Consequently, in order to attach neutrals to her cause Germany offers them the booty she hopes to take away from others, and her present campaign, like many previous ones, is merely one of international robbery or free-booting.

She is willing to offer France the Belgian Congo at first, and England the French colonies, and Turkey Egypt, and Bulgaria Greece, and Roumania Serbia, and Greece Albania, and Italy part of Austria and North Africa and Spain Gibraltar, if they will only do what is convenient to Germany for the moment. The silly nations do not seem to be able to realize that a nation which is so reckless with the property of other people may be equally reckless, when the time comes for implementing these promises. 

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

### CANADA STEAMSHIP LIKES L HALF BILLION DOLLARS

FOR STRONG U.S. NAVY WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 .- President Wilson today approved Secretary Daniels' recommendation for a five-year construction program for the navy to cost \$500,000,000.

The exact amount to be appropri ated for each of the five years has not been decided, but the first year's pro-gram calls for two dreadnoughts and

gram calls for two dreadnoughts and two battle cruisers.

The five-year program would call for six ships—ten dreadnoughts and six battle cruisers. The first year's construction will include two dreadnoughts and two battle cruisers, and about 25 submarines, 16 destroyers and probably, five scout cruisers.

The total amount to be appropriated for construction this year will be in the neighborhood of \$100,000,000.
