Each year the change of policy from the jail building to the Municipal Farms is justified to a greater degree.

This year, up to November, the value of the produce secured was estimated at \$53,990.25. This was made up as follows: Field Crops, \$32,814.50; Garden Produce, \$596; Horses, \$4,410; Castle, \$6,815; Sheep, \$321; Pigs, \$7,825, and Poultry, \$208.75.

Citizens of Toronto do not fully realize the big asset the city has in these institutions. The men's farm comprises 750 acres, and the women's, 200, a total of 950 acres acquired and equipped at a cost of \$350,000.

To erect a modern building to replace the old jail on Gerrard street would have cost \$2,000,000. Interest on this investment would alone have amounted to \$100,000 per annum-practically what it costs to meet the combined debt and maintenance charges on the two

A city of a million requires institutions not needed in a smaller one. In securing the Municipal Farms ample provision was made for the requirements of a Greater Toronto along these lines.

Apart from the improvement in the treatment afforded offenders, and the greater opportunity for reestablishing them in the ranks of good citizens, the Municipal Farms, which I always advocated, are a paying investment.






