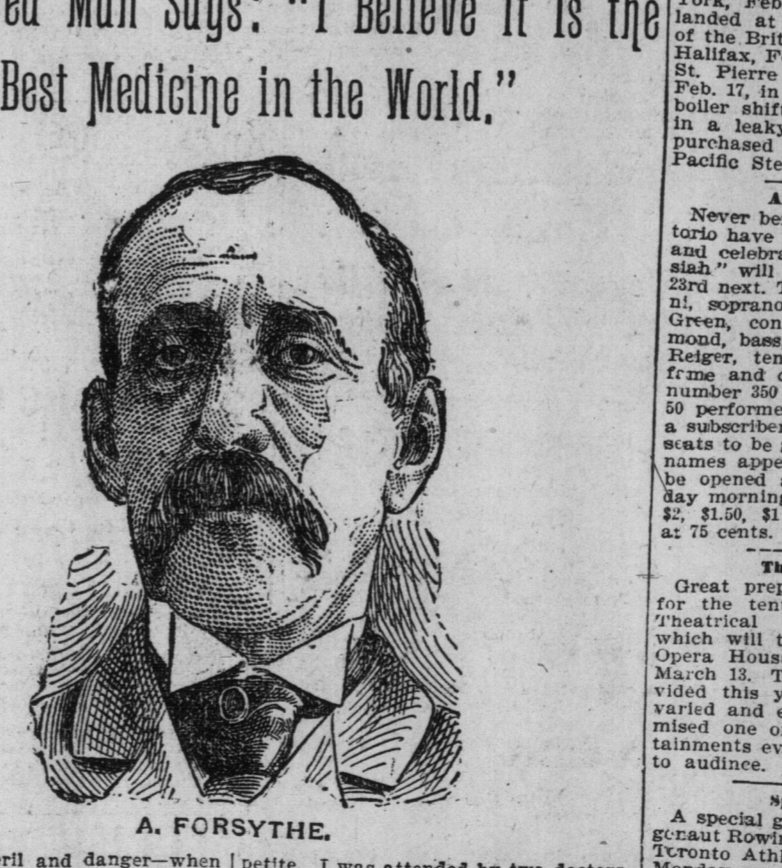

IS NO BETTER THAN SODOM

STRONG ARRANGEMENT OF MODERN CITY LIFE

Canon DuBois's Remarkable Address on Impurity and its Consequences

So great was the attendance at the noon service at St. James' Cathedral yesterday that many had to stand during the rector's address. This was of a remarkable nature, and was of the kind sometimes delivered to men only. Said the canon: "Under a strong sense of duty I speak of an evil as widespread, as universally destructive, as any I know. It is an evil unshrouded in silence, which ministers and teachers generally balk. The father shirks his duty and does not speak of this fearful evil to his son, the mother to her daughter, the preceptor to his pupils, the guardian to his ward, the clergyman to his flock."

The silence of the pulpit he condemned as recreancy to duty and utterly unjustifiable in view of St. Paul's exhortation to the youth: "Keep thyself pure." How many never hear a sermon on the Seventh Commandment, "Thou shalt not commit adultery?"

Impurity in Ancient and Modern Times. St. Augustine holds that it was gross impurity which hurried the Jews into the destruction of their Temple. There is no doubt that this was the sin which brought about the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah. The Greeks and Romans were not better, the canon showed by reference to the uncleanliness of their gods, as described by St. Paul, nor any of the great continental cities. Recently in London revelations were given which made the ears tingle, and which frightened the aristocracy knowing that they were compromised. The exposure shook the guilty metropolis from Belgravia to Whitechapel. Every modern city is the same. In every land this unclean monster walks abroad without reproach. So it will be till better ideals dominate the people.

Historic Examples. Art and poetry showed the prevalence of uncleanliness in the pictures, "Marriage à la Mode," "Marriage for Convenience," and "After." Homer's Iliad, the destruction of the adulterer; Shakespeare's Othello, the madness of the Moor. Literature reeks with the foul theme; Scott's "Heart of Midlothian" and "Kenilworth"; George Eliot's "Adam Bede"; Charlotte Bronte and other writers pictured the awful crime and its results. History tells the same story; Joseph and Potiphar's wife, the defilement of Dinah, David and the wife of Uriah the Hittite. And everywhere with a had stamped upon them the results of these deeds of shame. One result is the ruin of the soul and the feelings of the human soul. Burns, who knew all about it, testifies, "It perfumes all within and hardens the feelings."

Having treated of the moral effects, the canon said: "In the dark catalogue of human sin there is none so heinous as the sin of impurity. It is the sin which the Almighty has attached such fearful physical penalties. On this point he referred to the testimony of medical men and quoted the relevant and pitiless law of the hereditary taint to the innocent third and fourth generations.

The most brilliant and splendid lawyers, distinguished politicians, bravest warriors have been utterly wrecked through impurity. When the canon, in glowing words and with much pathos, besought all to stifle the impudent workings of this evil, the hold of them and strangle them with his advice, or you will be unhappy men and women. Shun every tale of love and impure reading. He instanced amongst French novels, the writings of Zola, whose plea was that he depicted life as it is, and that the world is not as bad as his predecessors. Such novels, by exciting the imagination and the passions, open the sluice-gates and floods of pollution are admitted.

How to Treat Young Women. "Deeply I regret to say it, but the folly of young women is responsible for much impurity. Commencing with flirtation, then in eloquent and the sad consequences—inevitable misery, darkness and ruin. Another evil was the outcome of modern life. The young woman takes her place in the colleges, offices and stores. She is paid a salary insufficient to clothe and feed her properly, and everyone can recognize the danger that surrounds her path. Here is a sphere for upholding the manliness of every man deserving the name of man: Learn to treat woman with chivalrous respect. Be her protector. Strike down the man that would do her an injury. Defend her as if your own mother and sister."

Other personal advice was not to tamper with the body, but to be a man or an inebriate, keep your body under, let it be your servant, not your master. Get Married Early. One important piece of advice the canon gave: "Young men, make up your minds to contract an early marriage. There is no safeguard better than an early engagement and an early marriage. Dispense with the contemptible conventionalities of the present day that says that you must have hundreds of thousands of dollars before you can marry the girl of your love. Do not believe it. Begin humbly and lowly. Do not begin where your fathers left off. If you can earn an honest day's wages, and if you have a heart if she gives her consent. This will be your best guard against the temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil. Let not the rule of you as it does so many in such a ridiculous way. Believe that you will get along all right—that God will never leave a man to hunger who trusts Him and is honest and industrious."

Notable Events on the Other Side Told in Brief Form

Bourke Cochran denies the report that he intends to join a religious order. The asphalt paving companies of Buffalo are having a war of rates and the prices have come down to \$2.69 a yard. One hundred and fifteen thousand New York City people have petitioned the Legislature at Albany for "liberal Sunday laws." Senator John Sherman says: "It is a disgrace to our country, a disgrace to civilization that we are spending \$30,000,000 a year more than the income of the Government."

Lycium Hall, one of the most famous buildings of the old brick row at Yale University, New Haven, Conn., is to be torn down to make room for improvements to the campus. The child was alone in the house when the brutes jumped through the window and attacked her. Dr. C. Colgrove Perry has been arrested in New York charged with having a plurality of wives. Both the wives are said to have temper like prairie fires, while the doctor dispenses as the baby food which he dispenses as means of livelihood. He will have to face both wives in court. A bill is to be introduced into the New York State Assembly at Albany, for establishing a New York City free labor bureau, for taking all applications for help, free of charge. An appropriation of \$500 is provided for the State Treasury to pay the costs. The Ways and Means Committee has decided to report the bill favorably. THE STORM WAS TERRIFIC

ONE HUNDRED LIVES WERE LOST IN QUEENSLAND.

Whole Villages Were Destroyed by Wind and Flood—Thousands of Homes Wrecked—Many Steamers Foundered—Townsville Almost Wiped Out—A Hurricane's Work at the Hapal Group.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 28.—The captains of vessels arriving here from Australia bring information of a terrible storm which has devastated the coast of Queensland. There were furious hurricanes and a fearful downpour of rain, which flooded the entire district. More than 100 lives were lost, it is reported. Whole villages were destroyed. Thousands of houses were wrecked. And with the other property destroyed on shore, the damage is estimated at half a million pounds sterling. The value of the vessels wrecked cannot be estimated.

SUGGESTIONS POURING IN.

World Readers Who are Anxious to Select a Name for the New Niagara Boat.

The Niagara Navigation Company will certainly experience but little difficulty in finding an appropriate name for the vessel now being constructed to replace the Cibola, which was burned to the water's edge at the American terminus last summer, if the number of suggestions being supplied by World readers will be of assistance in this case. So varied are these suggestions that it is again necessary to notify contributors that the word must be composed of three syllables and certain not to exceed 20 letters. A name of Indian derivation is desired, though not insisted upon.

A lady correspondent writes that she submitted the name of Corona direct to the company about three months ago. The lady's claim to originality in this respect will not be overlooked. "Old Toronto" applauds the suggestion "Canada," published yesterday, and recalls the little creeper of 65 years ago, commanded by Capt. Hugh Richardson, R.N. Anglo-Saxon, also favors the adoption of "Canada," and points out that the word begins and ends similarly with those of Chipewa and Chicora, the company's other boats.

IT DOES NOT SCARE SPECKLES.

The Youngest Son of the Hawaiian Sugar King Will See the Charges.

San Francisco, Feb. 28.—Rudolph Speckles, youngest son of Claus Speckles, sugar king, sailed for Honolulu on the steamer City of Peking. His mission, it is said, is to face President Dole and his Cabinet, by whom he is charged with treason against the Hawaiian Government.

The charge of treason was preferred against Speckles by Dole after the Hawaiian uprising a year ago. He was accused of supplying the revolutionists with arms and funds, and in one instance giving the ex-Queen \$10,000 to aid in carrying out her plans to overthrow the republican Government and place her niece, Princess Kaiulani, on the throne.

THE POLICE COURT YESTERDAY.

The venerable bewhiskered conspiracy case against ex-Ald. J. B. Verral got another hearing yesterday and occupied the attention of the Police Court for a couple of hours.

A number of witnesses for the Crown were examined, among them being Clerk Sanderson, Controller Shields and Commissioner Stenographer Downey, who was appointed by the Superior Court to examine Otto Gullich in Detroit. The evidence was substantially the same as that given before Judge McDougall. The case was adjourned until next Friday.

For assaulting his wife, James McDonald, 108 Duchesne-street, was sent down for 30 days. George Hunt and Robert Barnes were remanded for a week on a charge of shoplifting and theft preferred by Law Kee, a laundryman. Arthur Woods, charged with theft from L. Farewell, was remanded till Wednesday.
