





Salem Eckardt, a pioneer of the County of York, was found dead in bed on Saturday morning at his late residence, 108 Wellington-place. He had been up and about the city on Friday, and appeared to be in his usual good health when he retired that night. Death, it is thought, resulted from an internal hemorrhage, due to a tumor. Mr. Eckardt was a grand uncle of H. P. Eckardt of the well-known wholesale grocery firm, and Albert Eckardt of the Eckardt Casket Co. He was the last of the first settlers of York County. In 1792 his father come out from Saxony to the Genesee Valley, where he, with others, had made arrangements for the taking up of land. The party became dissatisfied with the The party became dissatisfied with the new home, and seeing Governor Simcoe's proclamation offering free grants of land to settlers, they formed a deputation and came to York, now Toronto. Here they waited on Governor Simcoe and were given land in the Township of Markham, which had then just been surveyed. It was this party who first opened up Yonge-street, which was then a wilderness. In those days it took 21 days to bring supplies from Toronto to Markham Township, the trip being generally made with oxen.

Seventy-eight years ago Salem Eckardt was born, and at an early age became interested in the business of an auctioneer. He followed this occupation until the time of his death. There are few farmers in York County who had not employed deceased at one time or another. His last sale he conducted only last Friday afternoon near Thornhill. After the sale he returned to his home in Toronto. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Fenwick, who resided with him. License Inspector James Eckardt of East York is a nephew of the deceased. In politics he was a Reformer and an adherent of the German Lutheran Church. Deceased's father was one of the first to establish grist mills in York County. The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning to Unionville, where the remains will be interred in the Lutheran Cemetery. Services will be held at the church there prior to the interment.





Rev. W. W. 
