Watch out for waste in circulation. Find out where your story is going to be read. Don't pay for planting the seed of publicity in a spot where you are not going to harvest the results

The manufacturer of soap who has his goods on sale from Oskaloosa to Timbucto doesn't care how widely a newspaper circulation is scattered. Whoever reads about his product is near to some store or other where it is sold-but you have just one store and it is in Chicago.

Buying advertising circulation is very much like ordering a steakif the waiter brings you a porterhouse twice as big as your digestion will take care of, you've paid twice as much as the steak was worth to you, even if it is worth the price to the restaurant man.

It is not the amount of circulation that your advertisement gets. but the amount of circulation that gets people to buy.

If two newspapers offer you their columns and one shows a distribution almost entirely within the City of Chicago and in towns that rely upon Chicago for buying facilities, your business can digest all of its influence. If the other has as much circulation, but only one-third of it is in Chicago territory, the bulk of copies cannot establish its value to you—it's another case of the big steak—you pay for more than you can digest. That part of its influence which is concentrated where men and women can't get your goods after you get their attention is sheer waste,

By dividing the number of copies he prints into his line rate, a publisher may fallaciously demonstrate to you that his space is sold as low as that of his stronger competitors, but if half his circulation is too far away to bring buyers, his real rate is double what it seems. He is like the butcher who weighs in all the bone and sinew and fat and charges you as much for the waste as he does for the meat.

Gen. Buller entered the army in 1858, and in 1891 he had risen to the rank of lieutenant-general. He saw active service in many parts of the world. He served in China in 1860, in the Ashanti war in 1874, in the Kaf-fir war, in the Zulu war in 1878-79; he was in South Africa in 1881, and in

GEN. BULLER IS DEAD

Egypt in 1882, and was present at the battle of Tel-El-Kebir; he also fought in the Soudan war in 1884, and was under secretary for Ireland in 1887. under secretary for Ireland in 1887. He became well known during the Boer war as the man who relieved Ladysmith. He went out to South Africa in 1899, first as general com-manding the forces in South Africa, and afterwards as general officer com-manding in Natal. He conducted the operations for the relief of Ladysmith, which was successfully accomplished

operations for the relief of Ladysmith, which was successfully accomplished after an investment of 119 days, and subsequently he conducted the opera-tions that resulted in The expulsion of the Boer army from Natal. The late Gen. Buller, during his long military career, saw a great deal of service in Canada. He came out here with the battalion of his regiment, the 60th Royal Rifles, which came to Canada during the Fenian raid troubles of 1866, and later accompanied the of 1866, and later accompanied the four companies of that famous corps four companies of that famous corps, which formed part of the Red River expedition of 4870, under Col., nod Field Marshal Lord Wolseley. It was that expedition which first established the reputation of Lord Wolseley as a sol-dier and it was also in the course of reputation of Lord wolseley as a sol-dier, and it was also in the course of that campaign, with its wonderful re-cord of the march of the Canadian and imperial troops thru the wilder-ness that then existed between Port Arthur and Fort Garry, that Buller first attracted the attention of Lord

Wolseley. Woiseley. Three years later, when Wolseley was selecting his officers for the Ash-anti expedition, he remembered Buller and chose him as one of his staff on

and chose him as one of his campaign in West Africa. In April Gen, Buller contracted a chill in London, and this indisposi-tion was followed by a severe attack of jaundice and other complications. Early in May a hopeful view of his recovery was entertained by his physician, and the turn for the worse was unexpected.


