ATHENS, Jan. 29, via Paris, Jan. 30.—A landing squad of five or six men debarked from a torpedo boat at Retimo, Crete, yesterday afternoon and arrested at his hotel the former German consul at Canea, who is said to have been acting recently as an agent of the Krupp. He was taken aboard the torpedo boat.

RUSSIAN MOVE TO BRITISH TIGRIS VALLEY

Success Near Kandalanski Pass Puts Them Near Persian Gulf.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 30, via London, 6 p.m.—The Russian Caucasian operation is widening fanlike, to the westward, southwestward and southward with the possibility, according to semi-official opinion, of a juncture being formed with the British Mesopotamia expedition.

PARIS IS RAIDED BY ZEPPELIN

FIFTY-ONE KILLED OR HURT

Firemen Dashed Thru Streets Giving Alarm and in Few Minutes All Lights Were Out.

PARIS, Jan. 30.—(10.10 p.m.)—At 9.40 tonight firemen dashed thru the streets sounding warning of another Zeppelin raid. In a few minutes the capital was entirely dark. Crowds remained in the boulevards watching the skies for the appearance of a German aircraft. The Place de l'Opera, which is generally brilliantly lighted, was suddenly thrown into darkness, and policemen carrying poles hurried thru the streets extinguishing the gas lights.

Twenty-four Persons Met Instant Death When Zeppelin, Pursued Thru Night Fog, Dropped Dozen Big Bombs, Which Cut Buildings in Two.

ANOTHER RAID SUNDAY
LONDON, Jan. 31, 3 a.m.—A Zeppelin airship was over Paris at 10 o'clock Sunday night.

PARIS, Jan. 30.—A Zeppelin dirigible passed swiftly over a section of Paris last night, dropping about a dozen dozen big bombs, which killed 24 persons and injured 27, according to an official statement given out today. Ten of the wounded were placed in hospital owing to the severity of their hurts.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 29.—President Wilson, in delivering a solemn warning here tonight of the need of prompt steps for national preparedness, described the difficulties encountered in maintaining the peace and the danger of the United States at the same time. Two things, he said, were told him by almost every one who came to the peace table. One was that the people were counting on him to keep them out of war, and in the next breath, he continued, he was told that the people counted equally upon him to maintain the honor of the United States.

OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—Major-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes, minister of militia, has received the following communique from the Canadian general representative in France:

Canadian general headquarters in France: During the week Jan. 19-26, the general situation on the Canadian front has undergone no material change. The weather has been mild and for the most part fine.

LONDON, Jan. 31, 3.15 a.m.—The Daily Express' Geneva correspondent quotes The Frankfurter Zeitung to the effect that Germany's final answer in the Lusitania case has been submitted to Washington, and that the "action of the submarine and the action of the German" and Germany will make no further concession.

PRO-ALLY SENTIMENT RUNNING HIGH IN U.S.

Hon. James Beck Believes His Country Should Be Fighting Germany

A NOTABLE GATHERING

Duke of Connaught and Party Leaders Heard Address at Ottawa.

OTAWA, Jan. 30.—"There is an element of pro-ally sentiment in the United States which has grown with amazing impetus," said Hon. James M. Beck of New York and Philadelphia, ex-assistant attorney-general of the United States, in addressing the Ottawa Canadian Club Saturday. "It is that element to which I am proud and happy to belong, the element which believes that the Stars and Stripes should be beside the Union Jack and the Tricolor of France."

PHILADELPHIA IN COLLISION

LINER RETURNS TO LIVERPOOL

Ben Lee, Liverpool Steamer, in Sinking Condition, But All Crew, Save One Man, Were Rescued—Philadelphia's Upper Works Damaged.

LONDON, Jan. 30, 6.15 p.m.—The American Line steamer Philadelphia has been in collision with the Liverpool steamer Ben Lee, 12 miles south of Cansuero Bay. Lloyd's reports that Philadelphia, putting back to Liverpool under her own steam, has been damaged. A large portion of the bridge, several boats and the main postmast being carried away. Nobody on board the Philadelphia was injured.

TURKS CLAIM CAPTURE OF RUSSIAN POSITION

Surprise Attack on Caucasus Front Reported to Have Succeeded

ATHENS, Jan. 29, via London, 6.15 p.m.—Situations virtually unchanged both in Mesopotamia and on the Caucasus fronts are reported by the Turkish war office in today's official statement. The most notable incidents reported are the recapture of the Russians of a strongly defended position by the Turkish forces engaged in the Caucasus campaign and the taking of 100 camels from the British in the Mesopotamian operations. The statement is as follows:

WAR SUMMARY

Today's Events Reviewed

IT APPEARS from the rapid advance that the Russians are making, and its spreading out to the westward, southeastward and southward, and the arrival of Sir Percy Lake with reinforcements from India to take command of the British Mesopotamian expeditionary force, that Great Britain and Russia contemplate the subjugation of Turkey in Asia in a few months. The extreme southern wing of the Russian force in Persia has defeated a large force of Turks, Germans and Persians near the Kandalanski Pass, southeast of Hamadan. This point is only about ten days' march from Mesopotamia. The pass opens the way thru a broken, woody country to the River Abi-Idiz, a affluent of the Shat-el-Arab, into which the Tigris and the Euphrates also flow near the Persian Gulf. The British are in control of these rivers and of southern Persia, so the Russians and British may join hands in a few days.

The linking of the Russian with the British force would open for the Russians a new line of supply from the open sea by way of the Persian Gulf. In the north the Russians have already reached a point 50 miles south of Erzerum, and they are plainly making for the upper waters of the Tigris River and the road from the north to Baghdad. Thus the allies appear to be closing in on the eastern half of Turkey in Asia in all directions at a time when the Germans and Turks will be unable for some months to provide the eastern portion of their army with adequate reinforcements. It is also expected that the Turks will stampeed when confronted with superior forces in the open field.

The only question that remains unanswered is whether the British and Russians will be present in sufficient force to complete the conquest and become consolidated there before the enemy is ready to strike a counter blow. Contrary to the generally expressed view, Sir Thomas Holdich, in Land and Water, says that the Turk is not effete, or half-trained, or mutinous, or neglected. On the contrary, he is as well equipped as the British soldier, and better than the Indian. The Turks possess tons of ammunition, and do not hesitate to abandon it if there is any difficulty in carrying it away.

The German offensive in Artois has been checked, and the French artillery yesterday was as active as ever against the organizations of the enemy. A French mine was exploded south of the Neuville-La Folle road.

CIVIL AUTHORITY IN MONTENEGRIN HANDS

Austrians Reserve Rights to Require Co-Operation at Any Time.

DETAILS OF PROTOCOL

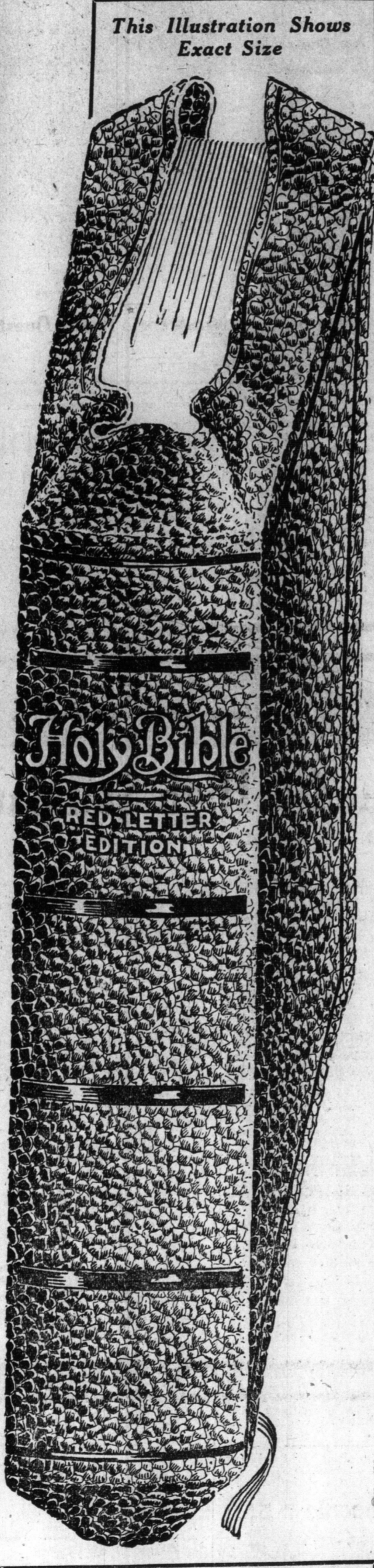
