### ENGLAND IS AROUSED OVER ASQUITH'S LICENSING BILL

LONDON, Feb. 28—Chancellor Asquith's bold and drastic licensing bill which was introduced in the house of commons yesterday, is raising' a storm of denunciation in the opposition press. 





Patterson Settlement, Sunbury county, Feb. 22.—William Eastwood, an old and respected resident of Patterson Settlement, passed away on Feb. 17th in the seventy sixth year of his age. William Eastwood was a son of the late Joseph Eastwood, who was a soldier in the British army, and came to this county in the year 1820, after getting his discharge, and settled on a farm in what is now known as Patterson Settlement, Sunbury county. There were no roads at that time and the only way of traveling was on foot. He went to work in the wilderness and cleared a farm, where he lived the rest of his life and died at the advanced age of 86 years. William Eastwood was born June 8, 1832. 
