Stocks Disposed of; Saskatoon Agents Laud Reduction, Saying It Will Stimulate Business

TORONTO, April 17.—The Dodge Motor Car Company of Canada suspended operations at its Toronto plant today, and more than 400 employes were rendered unemployed for an indefinite period. At the same time the Durant Motor Company of Canada also closed temporarily, affecting about 600 men. Both suspensions were made in order that the companies might decide on future operations.

The Canadian motor car manufacturers will meet, to gether with all other Canadian manufacturers adversely affected by the tariff changes, on April 21, in. this city, to decide what action is to be taken.

NEW YORK, April 17.—Stocks of the Ford Company of Canada continued their toboggan on the curb exchange this morning, the theory of the sellers continuing to be that the proposed reduction of the Canadian tariff rates on automobiles would largely wipe out the advantage of United States companies operating in Canada. Deputy Speaker Squires predicted that New Brunswick was on the eve of the greatest industrial development era in its history as a result of the arrangement which the provincial government had made with the International Paper Company and the Fraser Companies, which would bring about the establishment of at least three more newsprint mills in New Brunswick, as well as development of the most potential natural water power in Canada, east of Niggara.

Hon. Mr. Richards referred to "Save the Forest Week" set apart by those entrusted with the care of the forests for an intensive campaign in the interests of conservation. In this connection, he appealed to the sportsmanship of those assembled to focus the attention of the people upon the vital necessity of protecting the forests from fire, the most destructive single agency. The forests were the greatest revenue producing assets of the province. He

CHICAGO, Ills., April 17—The first crop of spring forest and prairie fires in three widely separated areas of the country generally was under control today, although continuing high winds in some districts carried threats of fanning the flames anew.

Fires which swept large forest areas near Plymouth, Mass., have been checked, and most of the prairie and grass fires in Minnesota and the Dakotas has been extinguished, but rangers still were fighting flames in the Kootenai National forest in Western Montana and Idaho.

HALIFAX, April 16-While loca shipping men and Board of Trade officials were reluctant today to discuss the effect of the "direct passage" clause in Finance Minister Robb's hudget or Maritime ports, it was unanimously greed that the restriction of the operation of the British preference to Canadian ports after January first, next, was a change of great importance and of particular interest to the Maritime Provinces, as British goods, to get the henefit of the preferential stariff, must be imported directly through Canadian ports from the port of shipment. Early this month B. The communication pointed out there was a short crop in British Columbia and that the company would be buying this year in considerable quantities from the east. The shipments would be packed in barrels with one pound of sugar for two pounds of strawberries and placed in cold storage until refrigerator space could be secured on the trains for shipment to Vancouver.

Gillan, representing the corporation, asking for further information regarding conditions down here and advising that the company might consider erecting a factory in Saint John, if suitable. Hon.
