Sca Wreck Survivors Lived on a Biscuit Apiece for 23 Days

Captain and 16 of British Ship Trevassa's Crew Rowed 1,750 Miles; Kept Alive on Rain Water.

London, July 8 .- Details received of the experiences undergone by the survivors of the British ship Trevessa, which recently sank in the Indian Ocean, tell a tale of suffering which seems likely to be remembered long in the annals of sea disasters. The Trevessa had been given up as lost for a month until yesterday when Captain Foster's wife and the vessel's cowners received cable messages stating. owners received cable messages stating that the captain and sixteen of his crew had arrived at Mauritius Island, having landed first on the Island of Rodri-

miles from the scene of the Trevessa's sinking to Rodriguez by rowing and salling their open lifeboat under the blazing tropical sum with rations equal only to two tablespoonsful of condensed milk and a single biscuit daily for twenty three days, and with no water except that which they were sable to catch when it rained.

Vancouver, B. C., July 3-An interesting story is being told here of the manner in which Mr. F. C. Wade, K. C., agent-general for British Columbia, ohtained for the provincial archives documents of historical importance to British Columbia.

At a dinner in London Mr. Wade referred to the history of Canada and British Columbia. A titled Englishman at the conclusion of Mr. Wade's address, said he had documents relating to the early settlement of British Columbia. These he would give to the agent-general for a price. "You must take me to lunch in an historic spot in London that I do not know; then you must show me two other historic places with which I am not acquainted," he stipulated.

Mr. Wade accepted the challenge and won. First he took his friend to a tiny cafe in a side street near Picadilly, which was unknown to his guest. Then he turned up a passage af Dickens referring to the place. Score one. They next visited the East Indian docks and entered a dingy old office. The manager of the office produced at Mr. Wade's request, an aged calfbound volume, containing an entry recording the shipment of a cargo of tea that the revolting colonists threw into Boston harbor. The fate of the shipment was recorded in red ink on the margin. Score two.

The third place yisited was another office near the East India docks, where dust-covered records were produced proving that Charles Lamb, the great essayist, had once worked there as a

essayist, had once worked there as a shipping cierk.

The price had been paid, and the documents, which are said to be of the greatest historical importance, now repose in the provincial archives.

A personal friend of the agent-general, who has just returned from London, vouches for the authenticity of the story.

DOMINION DAY CELEBRATION.






