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Will Stage Big Fight But It Was All Off For While Last Night

Stormy Time Over Finances But Kearns Finally Agrees To Get His Last \$100,000 From The Gate Receipts—Battle At 3 O'clock Tomorrow.

(Canadian Press.) Great Falls, Mont., July 3.—The Jack Dempsey-Tom Gibbons heavy-weight championship fight, suddenly called off last night, was put back to its original date and will be decided at Shelby tomorrow as scheduled.

The fight was actually declared off at 12:30 o'clock this morning after an angry argument between Kearns and George Stanton, a local banker.

Stanton advised that it was too late to consider any proposition and that the fight was off.

Some of the newspaper correspondents said that the fight was off.

Kearns was obstinate to the last, insisting that he had a perfectly legal contract which called for the payment of \$200,000 before Dempsey stepped into the ring.

GREAT BRITAIN AND THE SHIP LIQUOR SEIZURES

London, July 3.—Premier Baldwin gave the House of Commons a gleam of light yesterday on Great Britain's attitude toward the ship liquor seizures. He denied that he had official information that the U. S. Government proposed to arrest ship captains and seize foreign vessels entering harbors with liquor under seal; and expressed the hope that the inter-departmental committee considering the question would before long make definite recommendations enabling the government to determine its attitude.

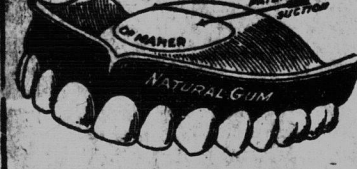

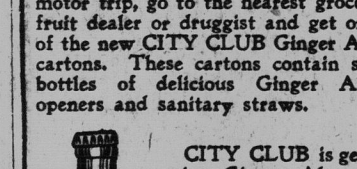

TEXAN WINS STAY IN SUIT OF GIRL FOR "LIFETIME" ALLOWANCE
Appeal Halted Order Requiring J. H. Kirby to Testify Before Trial; "Daughter" Says He Agreed to Studies.
New York, July 3.—By filing an appeal with the Appellate Division, John H. Kirby, a wealthy Texas lumber man, has obtained a stay of an order obtained by Bennett E. Siegelstein requiring Mr. Kirby to give testimony before trial of a suit brought against him by Miss Olga Ralph Kirby, on an alleged agreement under which she was to receive from the defendant an annuity of \$6,000 for life.
Miss Kirby says in her suit that she assumed the family name of Mr. Kirby at his request and that between 1918 and 1922 she traveled as father and daughter. There was a disagreement in March, 1922, and according to the plaintiff, it was agreed that Mr. Kirby was to pay her \$6,000 during her lifetime with which she might pursue her musical studies in Italy, which she had abandoned; that Miss Kirby was to resume her family name of Ralph and also deliver to Mr. Kirby all correspondence that had passed between them.
Miss Kirby's story is that she went to Italy, where she received one payment of \$600 from Mr. Kirby, representing a monthly instalment of the \$6,000 a year allowance. When no further remittances came she returned here and began suit.
Mr. Kirby has denied the main allegations of the plaintiff. Mr. Siegelstein, representing Miss Kirby, obtained an order to examine him before trial. Mr. Kirby asked to have that order vacated on the ground that he is a resident of Houston, Tex., and the Supreme Court of New York is without jurisdiction, and also that he could not be compelled to submit to examination before trial. Justice Lehman said in his decision that Mr. Kirby has appealed.
Mr. Kirby is president of the Southern Tariff Association, and during the war was lumber administrator of the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

Sea Wreck Survivors Lived on a Biscuit Apiece for 23 Days

Captain and 16 of British Ship Trevesa's Crew Rowed 1,750 Miles; Kept Alive on Rain Water.

London, July 2.—Details received of the experiences undergone by the survivors of the British ship Trevesa, which recently sank in the Indian Ocean, tell a tale of suffering which seems likely to be remembered long in the annals of sea disasters.

The survivors covered the 1,750 miles from the scene of the Trevesa's sinking to Rodrigues by rowing and sailing their open lifeboat under the blazing tropical sun with rations equal only to two tablespoonfuls of condensed milk and a single biscuit daily for twenty three days, and with no water except that which they were able to catch when it rained.

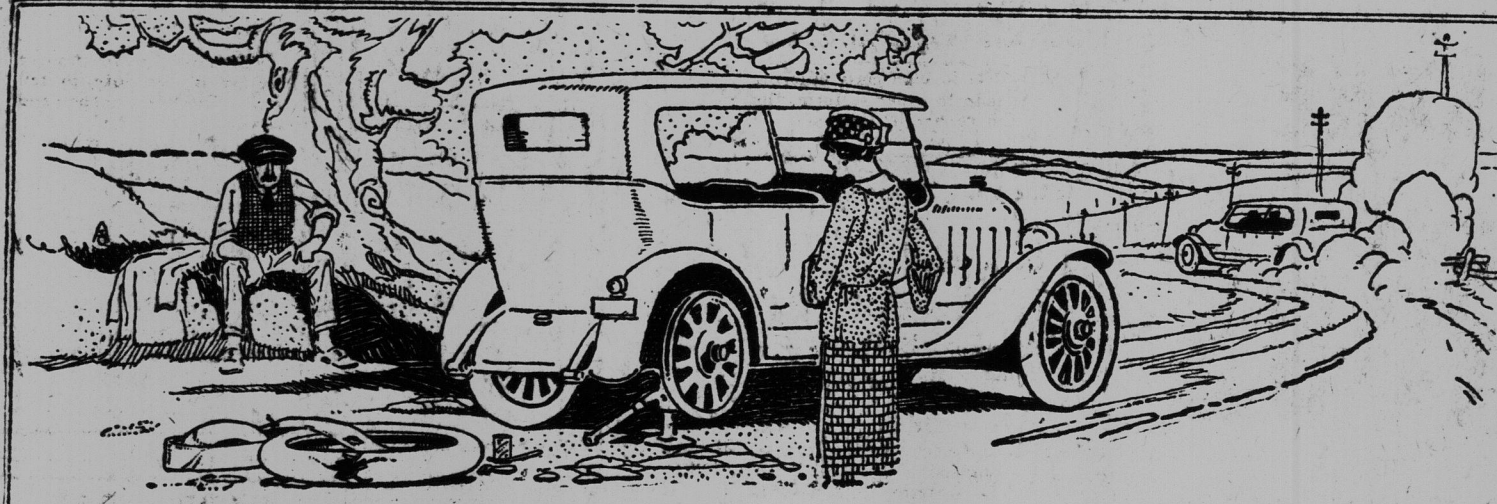

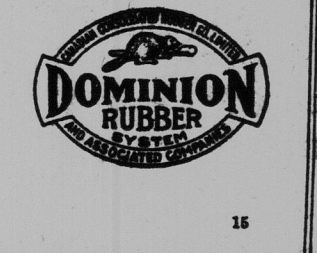
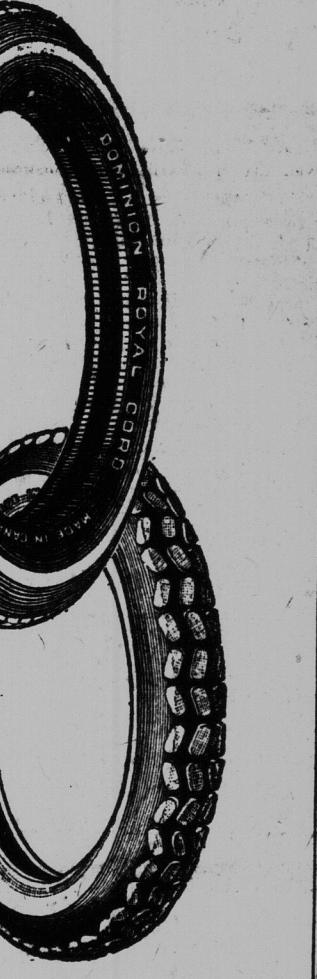

IMPRESSIONS OF ENGLAND

Cardinal O'Connell Gives Interesting Interview on His Return

Comment on Public Men—Watch Ramsay MacDonald—Baldwin's Ambition Not Political—A Word About T. P. O'Connell and Others.

The Boston Herald prints an interview by James Walsh with Cardinal O'Connell on his recent visit to England. The following is an interesting extract:

"The first thing that impressed me," said the cardinal, "was the roads, the most perfect roads that I have ever seen in the world. From the end of England to the other they are so even that you are never conscious of the slightest jar. And they are kept in absolutely perfect condition, not only the great highways which one might expect to be kept in perfect condition, it even the second and third class roads through the country.

"The roads are very well posted. All the corners and directions are clearly marked out. What was new to me, too, was the size of the automobiles in England. We could not remark how much smaller the automobiles are in England than they are here, but they are very comfortable and seem very practicable.

"Then there is a great use being made of the motorcycle with side car. A number of people who use them are astonished. There is also a great use of the charabanc, so called, a large motor-driven wagon, which provides transportation from town to town for long distances, so that riding through the country in England is made very comfortable and very easy."

The Herald man asked the cardinal if he saw any indications of the rise of the growing power of socialism in England.

"Well, no," answered the cardinal. "I am not in a position to see first hand the particular phase of English life, but, however, it was made very clear to me from people on the ground, who knew very well what they were talking about, that underneath the apparent calm surface there is a tremendous wave of discontent.

Tragedy of Unemployment.
"First of all, of course, we all know that the question of unemployment is a very tragic one. As we went along the road, we were constantly meeting, here singly or in groups, men whose condition was really pathetic. They were evidently not willingly tramps, it yet there they were going from village to village, trying to live. I honestly think that the English Government has done remarkably well, all in all, to provide for this situation. The expenses are enormous. It is hard to see, but how they could be increased, there is no demand for manufactures on account of European conditions. It is nobody's fault especially, it is a fact of the circumstances of the time."

a debate with a good deal of interest, because it brought into the arena several of the more noted and conspicuous figures of the lords. Lord Curzon was all propriety. 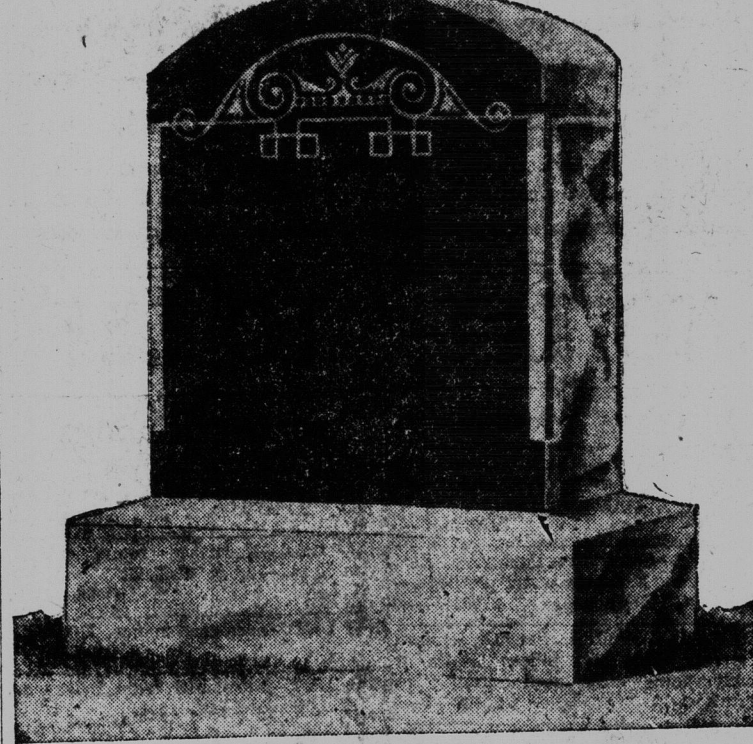
"On the other hand on the bench of the opposition was Lord Grey of Faldoon, whose appearance impressed me very much. There was no affectation of elegance in his speech. It was just excellent, clear, precise English. In the coolest way imaginable he taunted the government with evidently endeavoring to stimulate the growth of bolshevism in the country by their high-handed methods. This was all said with such perfect calmness of manner as to, of course, only drive the dart home deeper.

"At once Lord Salisbury, the brother of Lord Robert, was on his feet. But evidently it seems to be a mark of the present day to lose their temper. Lord Salisbury was so irritated by the cool, dignified manner of Lord Grey that he could only stammer out a reply which was no reply at all and then really finish his remarks in a stutter of rage.

Uncomfortable Seating.
"While the Parliament building and the Hall of the Lords and the Hall of the Commons is a fine place of architecture, I can't conceive of a more comfortable way of seating the members. There are a series of long benches which at times are most uncomfortably crowded, leaving no space for hands or arms, much less for documents or papers which any speaker may wish to use. Some of the time the sun poured through the west windows of the House of Lords, straight into the eyes of the members on the opposite side so that they could scarcely see what was going on on the other side of the House unless they put on their hats and screened their eyes with their hands. No doubt it is traditional, and the English like traditions, but I can only repeat, I can't conceive of a more convenient method of housing a Parliament than these benches."

"Then the cardinal spoke of 'T. P. O'Connell.'
"I had the pleasure of meeting 'T. P. O'Connell,' said he. 'He is looking, of course, very much older than when I saw him last, but he still has the humorous twinkle in his eye and genial and friendly manner. He is a fine looking, upstanding individual, of a very rugged type, and when he talks he talks with conviction. He evidently never loses his temper, as Lord Robert does, but he drives home with a clear and pungent speech, delivered in the most perfect enunciation and with a wonderfully well modulated voice whatever he has to say."

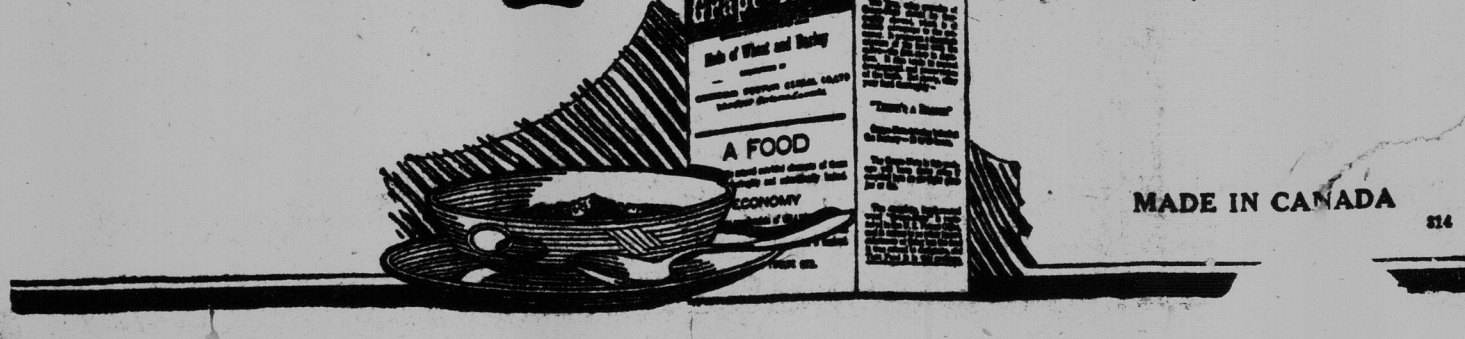

SCHOOL ATHLETICS FOR YOUNG GIRLS
Preadolescent Training Fits Them for Something Better Than Powder Puffs, Says Expert.

If the preadolescent girl could be generally trained along athletic lines we might have a new type of adolescent, "an improvement on the one obsessed with the powder puff."

There is not much difference between boys and girls of this age, says the writer. "And while there is a difference in their physical abilities at present, she considers that in all likelihood even that difference may be effaced in years to come."

"The records of our needs for the last ten years," she says, "in jumping, throwing and running show that the average performance has steadily increased each year. Exercise from infancy is a natural means of growth. In older children every form of outdoor exercise should be encouraged. Dr. Holt says, 'up to the eleven years no difference need be made in the exercise for the two sexes.'"

"It does not seem so strange today to associate the idea of the boy with the girl in exercise but it was not so long ago that girls were not considered in exercise and it is only quite recently that anything like athletic competition was thought possible or proper. Only last Spring I was surprised to find that our New York friends are still fearful of jumping for girls, and yet proverbially slow Philadelphiaans are jumping."

"Now that the social side of physical education is recognized as its important phase, the different systems of physical education have given way to the question of formal gymnastics versus play activities. Dr. Williams in speaking of adults says that they suffer from a lack of exercise. 'The adult has not carried on his interest in

motor activity because of two defects in his training.
"(1) The formal calisthenic training of school days offered no satisfactory state and hence no habituation to exercise that would make for continuous after school days.

CLASS AND COALITION CON- DEMNED. Le Canada draws from the Ontario results a double lesson: Class government is to be considered as annihilated; secondly, the people by their vote have shown that what they want is a well-defined programme and that what they do not like is coalition, whether it is real or merely apparent.

GRADING FOR CANNIERS. Because of repeated complaints from importers of canned lobsters in United States, Great Britain and continental countries the Canadian Government is adopting a system of grading for the canned lobster. This was the statement made by Dr. A. P. Knight, chairman of the Biological Board of Canada, who has just completed a tour of the Maritime Provinces in connection with his work. He said that while the grading was being done no standard of efficiency would be enforced this year and the canneries would be given until 1928 to come up to requirements. 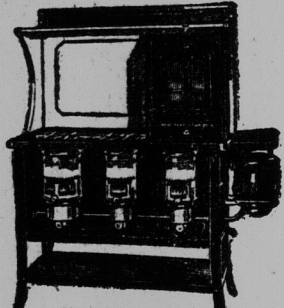

GIRL FOUND DEAD IN MUD AT CREEK

Police Believe Gladys Hayes was Suicide

Body of Colored Girl Found Early This Morning—Drowned, is Declaration After Post Mortem—She Had Been at Picnic and Dance.

St. John is confronted with another mystery in which the toll exacted of human life. About five o'clock this morning the lifeless body of Miss Gladys Hayes was found lying in the mud at the Marsh bridge, her clothing soaked and her hat lying about fifteen feet distant. There were no marks of violence, and all officials said indications pointed to an act of self-destruction, although the girl may have fallen into the water. The body was sent to the General Public Hospital by order of Coroner H. A. Porter, and a post mortem examination was made by Dr. H. L. Abramson, provincial pathologist. Dr. Abramson said at noon that the girl undoubtedly was drowned. She was a colored girl about twenty-two years of age.

About five o'clock this morning Joseph Laroque, watchman at the McAvity plant in the Marsh road, was passing the bridge when he saw the body lying on the flats. He notified the police, and Policeman Coughlan, in company with Detective Kilpatrick and Saunders, went to the scene. The body was lying in the mud at the water's edge on the side of the creek farthest from the city. The unfortunate young woman's hat was found about fifteen feet away from where she was lying. The body was identified as that of Miss Gladys Hayes, whose mother, Mrs. Hattie Hayes, resides in Protection street, West Side, two weeks ago. Efforts to discover the movements of the young woman previous to her death resulted in discovering the following: She attended a picnic in Hampton yesterday and came in to the city in the early evening by train. An aluminum drinking cup taken from her clothing this morning contained a ticket from Hampton to St. John, but Rev. Claude Stewart, pastor of St. Philip's A. M. E. church, said this morning that he was positive she had come in on the train. Her mother also had been at the picnic, but had come in on a later train. It is known that the girl went to a dance at the residence of Fred Holder in Main street and there met Miss Rosemary Bilsland, who also was with Annie Andrews, who resides in Union Alley.

Miss Bilsland told a Times reporter this morning that she and Miss Hayes had left the dance together about 11:45 and had gone to the home of Mrs. Hayes, aunt of the dead girl, in Chapel street. They had stayed there until about two o'clock this morning when they had walked down Main street to the corner of Paradise road. There, after some argument as to which one would go with the other for the night, they parted, and Miss Rooney says that the last time she saw Miss Hayes alive. It was said by the police that the girl had been drinking yesterday and last night, and that for the last three or four years she had been subject to such spells and had been hospitalized had been heard to say, "Oh, what's the use of living?" Considering this, together with the fact that she had been drinking last night, it is thought probable that her death was due to suicide. The detective reported that it was possible to smell liquor about the body this morning. The aluminum cup taken from her body also smelled strongly of liquor. There were no marks of violence about the body, and, in fact, the only mark was a small blue one under the eye, which, it was also said at headquarters, she received recently in a fracas on board of the West Indies boat. She is survived by her mother, Mrs. Hattie Hayes of Protection street, West Side, two weeks ago and one brother.

Coroner Porter said at noon today that, so far as he was at present, no inquest would be held.
