List of The Graft Payments Are a Feature Of Opening Dugal Session

Carvell Files Particulars Asked For by Mr. Flemming's Counsel

Col. Loggie The First Witness -- He Furnishes Groundwork of Case Showing How Mr. Flemming and Berry Managed All The Bonus Business--Proceedings Amicable Today

Definite charges of the payment of large sums of money by the lumber operators of the province, lessees of crown lands, to W. H. Berry, provincial superintendent of scalers, for Premier Fleming's names of those who were paid and the amounts extorted from them were presented to the court this morning when the royal commission to investigate the Dugal charges resumed.

Col. Loggie's evidence was mainly to lay the groundwork for the case to come, and it is expected that his evidence is completed, W. H. Berry's name will be called, and the evidence of the subpoena on him proved, and that several of the lumbermen will be called to the stand and questioned in regard to the alleged payment of \$15 a mile graft.

When the session was opened the additional counsel, who had not appeared previously, were recognized. Mr. Ted announced that he had received additional particulars in connection with the timber lands charges. Mr. Carvell added the names of the following lessees, James A. Rundle, 8625 and Daniel Sullivan \$2,000. The complete list is given on this page.

In Brussels five persons were seriously injured by lightning. Near Ghent a railway employe was killed. At Genats, two trains collided, the signals having been disarranged by the storm and many persons were injured.

Three Houses in Woodstock Are Struck. Woodstock, N. B., June 16--During a severe electrical storm yesterday the residences of Barry London, Benjamin London and Walter Cheney were struck by lightning and much damage was done. No one was injured.

Last of Reed's Castle. This week will mark the end of the history of Reed's Castle, which for many years has been a landmark on Mount Pleasant. The grounds in which it is situated are being divided up for building lots, and the old building is being removed to give more room. The workmen who have been demolishing it have been called to the lowest story, and that will disappear this week.

Bid for Woodstock Foundry Accepted. Woodstock, N. B., June 16--The tenders for Connel Brothers' foundry were opened last night and the tender of James McKee was accepted. It is understood that local people are interested in the deal by which the plant will be opened up and the business resumed. Mr. McKee is to be manager and has had years of experience. He has been connected with the Fleming works in St. John and the Burrill Johnson foundry in Yarmouth, N. S. The plant will be opened soon.

SAYS IMMIGRANTS HELD IN QUARANTINE ARE ILL TREATED

Montreal Man Receives Letter From One Held at Grosse Isle, Complaining of Lack of Food and Other Things.

Montreal, June 15—Letters declaring that nearly 300 immigrants from the steamship Canada, detained at the quarantine station at Grosse Isle, are being ill-treated and underfed have been received by S. Kysalis, of 298 Roy street, from relatives among the passengers. The letters begged him to send food and Canadian money, as Russian money was refused by officials in charge. The question of quarantine at Grosse Isle does not come within the jurisdiction of the Montreal officials.

TAX REFORM.

The question of tax reform in St. John has been discussed recently by the Commissioner Potts and others, and there is universal agreement in the statement that reform is urgently needed. The first step would seem to be to ensure the granting to this municipality of home rule in taxation.

The Toronto Globe points out that next to the abolition of the bar tax reform plank is the most important in the Liberal platform in the Ontario provincial elections. Sir James Whitney has been and continues to be stubbornly hostile to tax reform, and to the principle of home rule in taxation.

The benefits of tax reform are summarized below. It would help (a) All progressive citizens who are improving their property, and thereby benefitting the community, because it would decrease the tax upon their improvements.

**DEATH AND RUIN IN PARIS STORM**  
Streets Caved in and Many Perish—Taxicab Engulfed—Terrific Downpour Lasted Three Hours

Paris, June 15.—A thunderstorm of phenomenal violence raged over Paris for three hours this evening. It caused loss of life and enormous damage to property. The great volume of rain flooded the streets and caused the bursting of sewers. In the central business district of the city, a street caved in, engulfing several pedestrians. The rain was so heavy that the water was to the danger of approaching the immense pits resulting from the collapse of sidewalks and roadways. The police estimated the victims at seven at least.

About the same time a large section of the road in the Place St. Augustin suddenly collapsed. A passing taxicab was engulfed. Eye-witnesses saw the driver's head of the chauffeur, as the taxicab disappeared. Almost immediately a great block of stone, weighing a large wagonette just missed the same fate, the hind wheels sinking axle deep in the soil, but the occupants made their escape.

**REMEMBER THE ELDEST GIRL**

"No, I never want Janie to leave us," said an elderly woman as she glanced fondly at her eldest daughter. "I don't know what I should have done without her, with all the children to look after."

Younger sons and daughters had gone out into the world, married, and settled down. But Janie had always been mother's right hand at home in the cooking, cleaning and mending. The brave, good girl, doing her work willingly and uncomplainingly, had grown into a rather sad, tired woman. No one ever seemed to think that Janie would marry. No one ever considered the fact, either, that Janie had never had an opportunity of meeting anyone suitable.

Doubtless the love and sympathy that existed between Janie and her mother compensated for much that the former had missed; but it gave me the impression that she had been robbed of her childhood and the promise of her womanhood.

So many eldest girls in large families develop into the little maid-of-all-work. When quite children they are burdened with the care of younger sisters and brothers, and, as they get older, the mother grows to lean upon her eldest child, since she fully understands the things that must be done in the house and the attention necessary to the children.

It is very natural that this should be the case, and yet it is a little hard on the girl. It keeps her in the background always, and saddles her with responsibility early in life. She is the one who must stay in to look after baby while the others go out to play; she is the one who must help dress others for parties, and regretfully remain at home because mother "must have someone to give a hand."

Many bitter childhood tears—and not only childish—have been wept at the seeming injustice of this treatment, and yet in time it grows to be accepted as the inevitable order of things, and the girl settles down into her groove.

It is very natural, more than I do the many and trying time that the mother of young family experiences, and I cordially agree that the children should be taught to make themselves useful in little tasks. But I do think that these should be appreciated more earnestly, and that the eldest girl should be given the same chance of enjoyment and success in life as the others.

No, decidedly it won't do for them to go rowing! They must wait till Bill can buy a motor-boat. 

Scranton Boosters Set The Pace For American Cities—"Scranton Plan" Revolutionizes Methods of City Promotion

(Continued from yesterday's Times) All of the funds received from the subscriptions of the Scranton Industrial Development Company will be put into the new industries brought to the city or into local industries of great promise requiring additional capital to make a great growth.

The advantages of this plan to prospective manufacturers are obvious. A manufacturer in another city has a prosperous business, but needs perhaps one hundred thousand dollars to put the business in a position where it can make a rapid, substantial and profitable growth.

The subscription payment to the Million Dollar Company cover a period of five years, the subscription blanks calling for not over twenty per cent. of the total amount any one year. The calls are made on the subscribers for payments only when an investment is immediately to be made in the securities of a new industry, so that all money invested is immediately earning dividends.

With the restriction thrown on the investments the stock is regarded as so secure that the Scranton banks are already willing to loan it as collateral up to eighty per cent. and there will always be a ready market for the stock in Scranton and vicinity. Quite a number of subscriptions have been received from out-of-town investors who wished to go into a particularly attractive proposition.

POLICE INVESTIGATIONS

GREAT CUB MACHINE WRECKED BY OWNER'S GREED; STANDS AS LESSON TO MAGNATES AND PLAYERS

Frank Schulte, Last of the Famous Old Cubs—Now on the Bench

(By Hugh S. Fullerton) Chicago's Cubs present a sad spectacle these days. The wreck of a championship team always is sad, but this one is pitiable. With the benching of Frank Schulte the final remnant of Chance's great team disappears from

action. Deserted by its friends, hooted from the stands, beaten by tail-end clubs, with a bunch of has-beens half heartedly battling along with worse results, the greatest pitching staff in the league wrecked and ruined, the Cubs present an object lesson in the results

of greed that ought to be a warning to all club owners—yes, and to players. The ruin of the great machine built up by Chance is the result of nothing else than money greed—greed by the players for more money; worse greed by the owner. Let us go back to the start. The Cubs, when Murphy came into possession of the team, were among the lowest salaried players in either major league. Selig believed in small salaries. Chance did not. Chance wanted to pay his men what they were worth and to reward them. Over Murphy's protests he acquired Steinfield and rounded out his team. In four years this team earned a profit of about \$50,000. During those four years the salary paid to all players was about \$250,000, exclusive of what they received from the world's series and city series. It is small wonder that the players, seeing the fortunes they were winning for Murphy, wanted larger salaries. Murphy, and Chance broke first. Chance was wrong. He signed a contract that demanded more money. Murphy hot headedly accused Chance of bolstering expense accounts. Chance flew into a rage and quit. He forced Murphy to tear up the old contract, give him a new one and more money. The night Murphy surrendered to Chance he declared he would get him. He was right. The Brown, Overall and Pfister formed a combination to hold out and agreed none would sign until all got what they wanted. Murphy gave in, but four days later the three pitchers were marked men. Hoffman led out and forced Murphy to pay him more. Hoffman was marked for release that day. The story is the same in almost every case. Murphy surrendered and hid his time. He fired Chance as soon as he thought the manager was down and out with illness. He sent Brown to Louisville under an agreement that Brown never was to be permitted to return to a major league club and he "canned" Hoffman.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

German States Grapple With Problem—Why Government Stands Off

(Times Special Correspondence) Berlin, June 5.—Insurance against unemployment is the burning question in Germany. The matter has of late been before the Reichstag, also before the Bavarian, Saxon, and numerous minor state parliaments; and in all cases demands have been made by the democratic parties for the state support of the workers who, to the number of between 500,000 and 1,000,000 are always out of work.

The demand is backed up by several motives. Firstly, there is the practical motive that even without unemployment insurance the unemployed are supported by the community. Secondly, it is contended that unemployment insurance has been tested on a limited scale in other European countries, and been proved a success. Thirdly, there are the abstract grounds of reason and logic, the chief of which reasons is the "right to work."

For half a dozen years past Germany has had excellent systems of unemployment insurance. The trouble is that these systems are all local and partial. Certain municipalities have adopted them as regards certain classes of workers; but there is nowhere a system which insures all workers; and many municipalities have refrained from adopting the system, as a result of their conviction that not they but the state government or the imperial government should be responsible for the unemployed.

The annual "Stadtag," which represents all large municipalities in the empire, last year passed a resolution demanding imperial unemployment insurance. The Reichstag did the same thing two years ago, and in January 1912 it repeated the demand. The Reichstag cannot put through such a law without the consent of the government (which means, strictly speaking, the Bundesrat); and this consent is refused. The government's answer is that the state is not ripe, which means that the state shall and other municipalities which insurance could be based does not so far exist.

Imperial states have so far taken up the same attitude as the imperial government. They desire that unemployment insurance shall be municipal. The municipalities have offered to organize insurance, but they demand that the state shall recognize its responsibility by giving a subsidy. The states have refused. Bavaria is the only, and a new exception. Of late German municipalities have been trying a system, based on the

Ghent system, but applicable to the unorganized. That is to start unemployment savings banks. The workman during employment pays his savings into the savings bank and can withdraw them only when he loses employment. In this case he withdraws them at a fixed daily rate corresponding to the unemployment pay of the labor unions; and the municipality adds its daily supplement. Thus an unemployed man who draws from his own savings seventy-five cents daily may get an additional municipal allowance of twenty-five cents. The aim of the municipalities is to get the municipal supplements refunded by the state. In Bavaria, where the Ghent system will be combined with public "kassen" for voluntary insurance, the state has agreed to refund one-third.

The chief enemy of imperial unemployment is Secretary for the Interior Delbrueck. He let out the fact that no serious social or technical obstacles stand in the way. The obstacles are political. Imperial unemployment insurance would politically help the Socialists. Under the present system the Socialist labor unions have to bear the chief burden of supporting their unemployed. If the empire bears the burden, said Herr Delbrueck, the Socialist union funds will be relieved; and the Socialists will have much more money in their campaign treasuries for the political and electioneering struggle. Why should the government thus kindly play into its enemies' hands? The Reichstag's conviction is that the empire do nothing; and that the immediate future of unemployment insurance is in the hands of the municipalities, subsidized perhaps to a slight extent by the treasuries of the federal states.


