

ST. JOHN HAS HOUSING PROBLEM

Medical Health Officer at Public Meeting

SOME INSTANCES

Six Persons in One Room in Basement-W. F. Burditt Urger Reform-Com. Schofield Talks of Lancaster Cottage Proposition -Mr. Fenten Expresses Some

Dr. Melvin, medical health officer, said at the public meeting in Keith's assembly rooms last evening that St. John has a housing problem, and his statements and those of W. F. Burditt were confirmed by some pictures of Harrigan's Alley and other undesirable tenements.

The meeting was held under the auspices of the board of trade and the Canadian Clubs and President J. M. Robinson of the board of trade was in the chair.

Mr. Burditt delivered a very interesting address, supported by illustrations and tables of figures showing the injurious effects of bad housing upon the health and character of the people, and the beneficial effects of better housing. The pictures shown on the screen were drawn from St. John, Brantford, Ont. Philadelphia, Washington and England.

After going very thoroughly into the relation of bad housing to disease, vice and crime. Mr. Burditt took up the question of preventive measures and the need in St. John of houses costing from \$1,000 to \$2,000 to rent at \$0 to \$10 per month. He shewed in this connection what had been done in Brantford, Philadelphia and Washington, and described the co-partnership system in England. As a policy to be pursued in St. John he suggested the following:—
