

We further earnestly hope and pray that this Union, if consummated, may be but the forerunner of a more extended Methodist and General Evangélical Christian Union, which may result in a blessing to the Church of Christ, and to the glory of God.

In view of the possible action of our English Conference in this matter, affecting our relations to the B ble Christian Mission in Canada,—Resolved, that the after mentioned brethren be a committee, in conjunction with our Executive committee, to confer with the executive officers of that body, or with any special committee, which it may appoint; and that such committee be instructed to negotiate with their brethren upon a basis of union, not inconsistent with the action of our English Conference, and that said committee report to our next annual Conference. We would respectfully suggest, through our General Superintendent, the propriety of the Ministers in England communicating with us, as far as possible, as to the destination of such friends, and certifying as to their standing in the church at home.

The fields are white un the harvest-we would earnestly pray the Lord of the harve to send more labourers into his harvest.

The records of the past year do not show that degree prosperity we ardently desire, and we would fain look for ward to times of much greater advancement. We cannot however, but greatly enjoice in the marked improvement which has taken place in at least two important department of our work. A large increase in Sabbath Scholars is return ed in the year-a fact of the highest significance and mo encouraging character, whether we look to the most remun rative toil of the present, or the permanence of our Instit tions in the future. Never at any previous period haves many of our Ministers received their full stipend, as during the year just closed. The improvement here is most marked and has elicited the most lively congratulations.

And now, brethren, we commend you to God and the word of his grace, which is able to keep us from falling, and present us at last faultless before his presents with exceeding joy. /


