THE WINTER TREK.

neying Into Grande Prairie Is As surely as times change and old things give way to new, there is a present-day phase of western Caradian life that a few years from new will have ceased to be, says Aubrey Fullerton in The Saturday Globe. It is a picturesque thing—the winter trek to Grande Prairie—and full of human interest. When the railroads get up north it will be seen no more as seen to-day; and they are already heading northward. But as yet the trail is the only way, the long, hard way, of the men who seek northern homes, and over it has been going, for

way, of the men who seek northern homes, and over it has been going, for the past three years, a movement that is more significant, with less of mystery and tragedy, than that of the Klondike trail of fifteen years ago.

This moving of the settlers over the northern trails, with families and stock, and miscellaneous possessions, is one of the most realistic phases of Canadian immigration. It has a look of the domestic, combined with the adventurous. It suggests both tediousness and good fun. It is distinctive of the country, and very creditable to the spirit of the folk who journey thus. There's nothing else in Canada qutte like it.

From Edson, which is the new railway town west of Edmonton, to Grande Prairie City, is a journey of from ten to fifteen days. How much longer or shorter a time one is om the road depends upon where his homestead is located. But two weeks of such traveling will necessitate a willingness to conform to circumstances and the kind of spirit that Sam Weller had. Otherwise it won't be happy going at all. It is sleighriding and picnicking of a protracted kind, combined with a narrowness of space that almost equals that of a Pullman sleeping-car.

The caboosee, or little houses on sleds, in which the settlers move their

The cabooses, or little houses on sleds, in which the settlers move their families over the trail are cosy, notwithstanding their narrow limits. When the weather is not too cold it is possible to have really good times in a caboose. In Edmonton one frequently sees a party preparing to set out, and through the open flaps of the house-on-sleds one catches cheerful glimpses of a traveling family and its domestic strangements. Every inch of space is utilized to good effect, and in this little house, walled sometimes with boards, sometimes fect, and in this little house, walled sometimes with boards, sometimes with canvas, and heated with a small stows, several persons eat and sleep and travel for two weeks, or longer. The loads of supplies go on ahead or follow behind. These are sometimes of almost as much human interest as the make up of the parties. Household effects, groceries to last for months, farming implements, and sundry boxes and bundles give a supply team a varied and altogether unique appearance. Ontario's Fisheries. The total value of all fish taken in Ontario for the last fiscal year was \$2,419,178.21, against \$2,348,269.57 for

2.419,17s.21, against \$2,349,589.57 for the previous year, says the game warden's report. For the last fiscal year the total catch from all the fisheries of all kinds of fish was 35,154,285 pounds, against 32,730,793 pounds for the year previous or an increase of 3,125,696 pounds.

Employed in the fisheries industries there are 156 tugs with 666 men, 1,578 boats with 2,740 men, 6,279,267 gill nets, 27,379 yards of seines nets, 584 pound nets, 798 hoop nets, 326 dip nets, 40,860 hooks on set lines, 163 spears, 430 freezers and ice houses and 95 piers and wharves. Total value of fishing apparatus, \$1,259,059.



AN OLD DEMOGRACY

ISLE OF MAN WAS PIONEER MAN'S SUFFRAGE.

Little Island Has Had That and Sev eral Other Up-to-Date Institution Long Before Other Countries Adopt ed Them-King Qrry Founded the Parliament, Formed an Army, and Wrote Down the Laws.

In all parts of this world you will

ind Marx men and "comen, and wherever they are they will form Manx societies, and hold their annual meetings, tell their old, old stories; find out where their countrymen are, and how they are getting on.

The Isle of Man is situated in the Irish Sea, about 31-2 hours' run from Liverpool; yet, in the centre of the British Empire, to-day the Isle of Man makes its own laws, has its governor, its council or upper house, and its house of keys, elected by the people. In Mona's Isle women had the franchise many years before they had it in New Zealand. The Manx Parliament goes back to the days of King Orry in the early part of the tenth century. He is believed to be the son of the King of Denmark. There is a legend that he landed on a clear starlight night, and being asked by the natives whence he came, he replied, pointing to the mility way, which glittered bright in the heavens: "That is the road to my country." And to this day the "milky way" is called the "Raad mooar ree Goree"—"The great road of King Orry."

King Orry established a legislative body, committed the laws to writing, and formed an army. Sit James Gell, one of the greatest men the Island has produced, who was clerk of the rolls and acting governor when King Edward visited the island some years ago, writes: "It is hardly open to me or to any lawyer to question the existence of King Orry (the first of the name), since this king was declared by the Deemsters and Keys in 1422 to have existed." It is, therefore, clear we had a Parliament in the Isle of Man before "Rolf the Ganger," the great, great, great grandfather of William the Conquerer, had sailed up the Seine and taken Normany from King Charles the Simple, of France.

If you visit the Isle of Man on the sith of July, you will still see the old open air Parliament of King Orry, the oldest legislative body in the world. Tynwald Hill is almost in the centre of the island, and is formed of earth brought from each of the seventeen parishes, the clergy, the high beiliffa, members of keys, members of counc

times, in "fencing" the great Tyn-wald court, no man was allowed to murmur or stir in the Lord's pres-ence in pain of being hanged or drawn. The short titles of the acts are read in English by the clerk of rolls, and in Manx by the coroner of Glentabe, if he is qualified. Of late years the late speaker of the keys, Mr. A. V. Moore, C.V.O., read the Manz,

But King Orry is only a modern, every-day king. Away back in the dark ages, when Romulus and Remus were suckled by the she wolf, Mannin Beg Mac of Leagher was ruling in Man. He was a mild and just ruler. The tribute he exacted from his followers was a bart of "leagher glass," green sedge, a species of the rush family; and to this day, coming down from countless centuries, this tribute of rushes is paid by a farm near St. John's. The owner has to supply rushes for the path from St. John's Church to Tynwald Hill, over which the procession marches. Manin Beg was not only a great navigator, but a

was not only a great navigator, but a famous magician, and kept this island under a mist. He was dreaded by his enemies, and if he threw chips of wood in the sea they at once became ships. His stronghold was Peel Castle, on the battlements of which, by the power of his "magic," one man would appear as a thousand. He was called Zu Dooinney Troor Cassagh, the Three-Legged Man; and all his people, who were likewise three-legged, traveled about like a wheel, turning round and round. A Manx legend says they were routed by St. Patrick, whereupon, being small in stature, they became fairies and lived in the ancient turnull, using fiint arrow-heads as

on, being small in stature, they became fairies and lived in the ancient tunnul, using fiint arrow-heads as weapons, with which they avenged their wrongs on human beings.

When St. Patrick first came to the Isle of Man he came across on horseback. The island was under a dense mist, and he had all the powers of darkness arrayed against him. A great sea monster had followed him. The horse climbed up the steepest place on Peel Hill, and stopped when it found a firm foothold. A beautiful spring of fresh water sprang out of the ground, whereby the saint and his horse were refreshed. Looking down he saw the great monster which had followed him. He cursed the monster, which was turned into solid rock, and remains there, and can still be seen with its great fin upon its back. He was directed to the island by the the bleating of a gost, whose kid had fallen over the rocks, and by the cry of the curlew. He blessed them both, and from that day no man has seen, a gost bring forth its young, or found a curlew's nest.

This particular little choir of less than twenty voices won very high honors at the sixth Alberta Festival, held in Edmonton this year; and it did so by presenting choral art in a remarkably high form, even for a Western Provincial Festival, which is saying a great deal.

Three years ago this choir attended its first festival, in Saskatoon, winning the shield for small choirs and entering in the open class as well. The adjudicators from Winnipeg described the performance of the choir as "an object lesson in choral singing to the whole festival." For this also, after much difficulty in making the award, they were given a special cup. Next year the choir went to the Alberta festival. This is a peculiarity of Lloydminster; its main street being part of the boundary line between the provinces, the choirs of that town may send competitors to both provincial festivals. So, in 1911, the St. John's choir came next to the top in the small dolor competition, beaten one

choir came next to the top in the small choir competition, beaten one point only by the Robertson Fresbyterian choir, of Edmonton. In 1912 they were too busy raising money for a new organ to attend any festival. In 1913 the festival committee at Edmonton offered the St. John's choir a rebate on railway fares to compete. They went—and won.

The choir are all English, except one lady. Many of them are Barr colonists who founded Lleydminster under such discouraging auspices about eleven years ago. They live on farms, some of them six miles from town; but distance and bad roads and cold westher make no difference to their enthusiasm for attending rehearsals and services. Mr. H. B. Haines, for some time manager of the Bank of Commerce in Lloydminster, really started the choir attending festivals. He was then organist of the chirch and had produced the whole of Stainer's "Crucifixion" in a church service. The present organist and conductor, Mr. Francis Stevenson, an Englishman, was a homesteader. He acted as choirmaster and came regularly to town to attend rehearsals and services. In 1911 Mr. Stevenson moved to town, where at present he is engaged in the business of real estate, lending money, insurance and tloket agencies. He is now both organist and chorimaster. Every Good Friday his little choir gives Stainer's "Crucifixion" with special services during Lent.

This is one of many such stories of good choirs developing choral art by sheer enthusiasm and love of music in the towns and cities of the West. And it is one of the best signs of the times in that country that so many people, both Canadians and Britishborn, are working with such interest to further the cause of art in a country that has so much to contend with in the real estate booster and the land gambler.

INSURING HIGHWAYMEN.

Odd Cases of Policies Issued In th Early History of Lloyd's. In the history of business and com merce there is no more romantic chap-ter than that which concerns Lloyd's, that great English organization of brokers and underwriters, which conbrokers and underwriters, which conducts all the maritime insurance of the world, and, as a side line, so to s, eak, accepts all sorts of freak insurance against almost any conceivable risk-against twins, bad weather, appendicitis - other illness; earthquakes and what-not.
Ourfously enough, these queer insurances played an important part in the early history of Lloyd's, which was so named after Edward Lloyd, a man who kept in Tower street, toward the close of the 17th century, a coffee house which was the great meeting

who kept in Tower street, toward the close of the 17th century, a coffee house which was the great meeting place at that time for persons interested in shipping and matters connected with shipping.

Lloyd was a man of great enterprise, and he was resilly the originator of the great system of maritime and commercial intelligence which had been so developed that to-day Lloyd's agents are to be found on every coast in the world. Day by day they report by electric cable and wireless telements of the great and it is thus that the world, through the passing or arrival of vessels in their particular corner of the globe, and it is thus that the world, through the medium of Lloyd's, is able to keep in touch with the movements of every ship.

As an illustration of the gambling in speculative insurance which was carried on at Jayd's coffee house, it might be mentioned that the lives of highwaymen who had fallen within the clutches of the law, or were likely to do so, were frequently insured. One insurance is still recorded of the possibilities of the execution of two Jacobite Scotch peers after the 1745 rebellion at a premium of one and one half per cent. The chance of war with France was insured against at a premium of \$50 and a dissolution of Parliament at a premium of \$75. Travelers might insure their return from foreign countries at various rates.

It was issued to Richard May "upon goods and merchandise, and also upon the good ship Golden Fleece, 250 tons (Gasper Hicks, master), from Lisbon to Venice, at the rate of four pounds percent."

Religion In India.

Would Exite Hard Criminals.

The question of exiling habitual or professional criminals is being agitated in England. There are now, it is estimated by W. S. Lilly, considerably more than 20,000 habitual or professional criminals in London.

"The only way of dealing with these habitual criminals," says Mr. Lilly, "is to expel them from the community against which they wage incessant war. A third conviction should cause the prisoners to be deported to some island and reduced to a state of industrial seridom, in which they could earn their living."
