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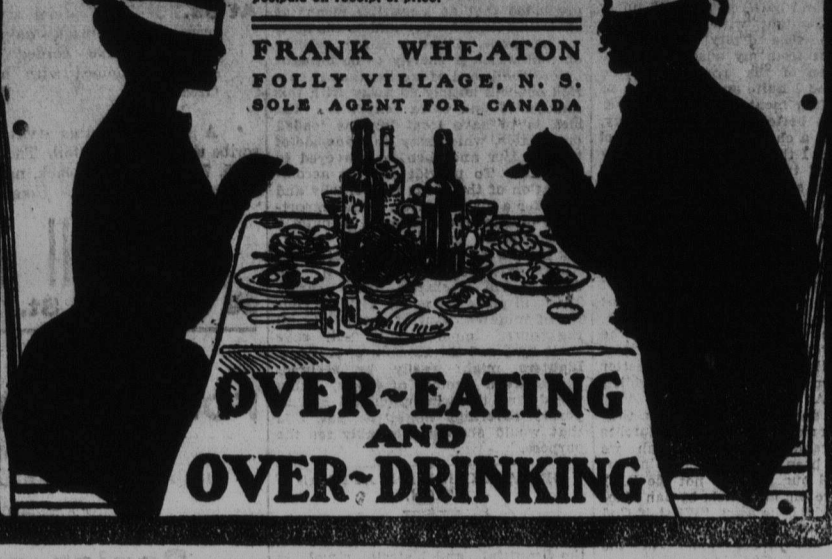

BLUEBERRY BREAD

Blueberry bread is in season now. To make it sift together a quart of flour, two heaping teaspoonsful of baking powder and a level teaspoonful of salt. Turn in cold milk enough to make a stiff batter and add two cupsful of blueberries or huckleberries which have been washed, drained and dried. Bake in a square shallow pan. Serve hot with butter. The bread should be broken, not cut.

GLOUCESTER BLUEBERRY CAKE

This is a delicacy from Massachusetts. Sift together two or three times four level cupsful of flour, one cupful of sugar, two teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar and half a teaspoonful of salt. Rub into this a small piece of butter and when well mixed stir in two well-beaten eggs and one cupful of milk in which a teaspoonful of soda has been dissolved. Add lastly a pint and a half of well-flavored berries. Bake about half an hour in a good oven. Sour milk can be used instead of sweet, and omit the cream of tartar. Delicious. Half quantity is ample for one meal.

THE TURF

Yesterday's Great Surprise on the Roadville Track. READVILLE, Mass., Aug. 22.—The one great surprise at the Roadville track on today's Grand Circuit card was the appearance of Lord Derby in the 207 foot. The surprise was not carried out to the extent of his winning the race, for Ed Geers drove the Monk under the wire ahead of him in two straight heats and won, in the first heat establishing a new record for himself of 2:06 1/4 and a new race record for the track. Although \$2,500 was offered in the first heat only four horses were entered. The small field served to make the race more interesting, as all the horses went fast and there was no straggling. Geers got away first and led to the finish. Lord Derby tried to show speed at the half, but was too late, and Geers came under the wire first. The time, 2:06 1/4, broke Monk's own record. The 216 feet had twelve starters, and five heats were needed to find a winner. The first heat went to the Kentucky horse. Re-elected, the New Jersey mare Alice Carr won the second, and Thomas W. Lawson's Mary P. Leyburn the third. The others were sent to the stable, and Alice Carr won the next two heats and the race.

This was what a Swedish missionary recently said when Menelik, before whom he was summoned, inquired as to the object of his visit. "And were you not able to find in Germany any Hebrews whom you might have converted?" asked Menelik. The missionary was obliged to admit that he had seen many Hebrews in Germany. An hour later the disappointed missionary was being conducted to the frontier by Abyssinian soldiers.

THE CHARM OF DICKENS

(Saturday Review.) The century would have been immeasurably poorer without Dickens; let us rejoice (with Mr. Swinburne) in having him for an everlasting possession; but let us enjoy him for what he was and is and not for what he was not and never can ever be. He is, first of all, one of the spontaneous, opulent, overflowing generous humorists the world has ever known; a humorist to be set with Aristophanes (as humorist), Cervantes and Shakespeare. His humor never depends upon a formula. Read a page of Pickwick or one of Mr. Micawber's speeches; then turn up anything you like of Mark Twain or any of the innumerable professional humorists of today. The one is fresh, can be read and laughed at a dozen times; the other wears upon you even when you laugh, and you only get through the book by earnest effort. What other wit ever invented such a saying as that of Mr. Weller the Elder, "More widder is married than single vimen?" (It is noteworthy that this is also a stroke of true characterization: Who does not remember the wooden measure with which Mr. Wegg retailed nuts at the street corner, a measure "with no perceptible inside" supposed to represent the pennorth as fixed by Magna Charta? It is all caricature, but what rich, buoyant, unforced caricature! Aristophanes, Cervantes, and Shakespeare, they were something more than that. So was Dickens.

VALUE OF VACCINATION

(Ottawa Journal.) Ottawa adds testimony to the efficacy of vaccination. Dr. Law, city medical officer, reports that among 372 cases of smallpox treated in the civic hospital during the recent epidemic, only 13 showed any marks of vaccination, and in these cases the vaccination had not been recent. When one reflects that the great majority of the people of the city are vaccinated, so that the number of persons in the vicinity of the disease vaccinated, the exceeding preponderance of unvaccinated persons who took smallpox becomes still more significant.
