

Protest Against Prohibition of Grain Export

COUNCIL TO DISCUSS

PEKING. Feb. 18—For the second time within a fortnight Great Britain, Japan and Russia made a protest to the Foreign Board against China's prohibition of grain exportations from Heilung Chiang in the northern part of Kirin Province, Manchurla, charging a violation of the international conventions. Because of the distress occasioned the people and as well as the effect upon the flour mills at Harbin, Russia made strong representations expressing the conviction that the prohibition was in the nature of retaliation for Russian action regarding the rallways and other questions concerning Manchuria.






