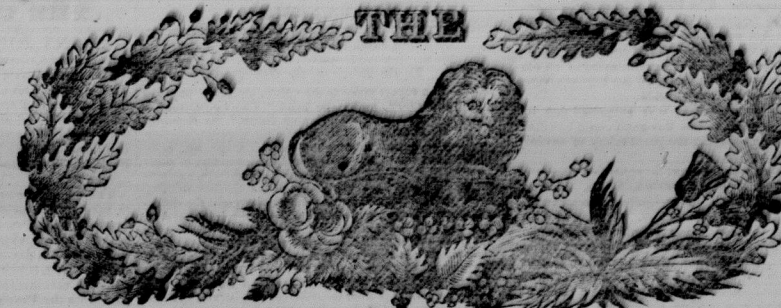

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Provincial Legislature.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, February 21.
The select committee appointed on the 16th day of February instant, to take into consideration the Petitions presented to this House from various parts of the Province, praying relief in consequence of the distress and destitution occasioned by the failure of the Grain and Potato crops, having examined the various petitions referred to them, beg leave to report—A Bill to provide for the necessities occasioned by the failure of the Potato and other crops during the past year.

On motion of Mr. R. D. Wilmet, the house went again into committee of the whole on a Bill to secure the more efficient supply of seamen in this Province. Resolved, that the further consideration of this Bill be postponed until the next session of the Legislature. And upon the question, the committee divided, yeas 19, nays 10.

FEBRUARY 22.
Read a third time as engrossed, a Bill to alter part of the Great Road from Hampton Ferry to Groom's Bridge, so called.
Mr. Erd moved for leave to present a Petition from John Woolner, William Napier, Esquires, and three hundred and six others, inhabitants of the county of Gloucester, praying legislative encouragement towards the Fisheries in that county. The order of the House, limiting the time for introducing Petitions, being in this instance dispensed with, leave was granted, and the Petition then read. Ordered, that the Petition be received and referred to the committee appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the Fisheries to report thereon.

On motion of Mr. Boyd, the House went into committee of the whole on a bill to repeal all the acts regulating Tavern Keepers and Restorers, and to prevent the sale of Intoxicating Liquors, under certain quantities. Resolved, that the further consideration of this Bill be postponed until the next session of the Legislature. Yeas 22, Nays 14.

FEBRUARY 23.
Read a third time as engrossed, a Bill to amend an Act for the amendment of the Charter of the city of Saint John. That the Bill do pass.
Read a third time as engrossed, a Bill to consolidate and amend the Laws relative to offences against the person. That the Bill do pass.

On motion of Mr. Vail, Resolved, that the Petition of Richard O'Neil, praying to be remunerated for losses sustained on Contracts entered into by him on the Great Roads in King's County, in the year 1810 and 1811, and which was presented to the House on the 15th day of February instant, and ordered to lie on the table, be now referred to the Committee appointed to take into consideration the roads required for the improvement of the Roads throughout the Province, to report thereon.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the subject matter of the said Despatch before them, the following Resolution was moved:—
Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the House should support the principles of Colonial Government contained in the Despatch of the Right Honorable Earl Grey, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, of the 13th day of February, 1847, and of their resolutions on this subject.
To expunge the whole of the said Resolution after this Committee "Resolved, as the opinion of this Committee," and substitute as follows:—
That the Tenure of Public Offices in this Colony should depend on a full and entire liberty, talent and independence, rather than on the achievement of Legislative popularity.

Upon the question for adopting the amendment, the Committee divided as follows:—

To the Editor of the Observer,
Sir—In a report made in the Morning News paper of the 17th February, under the head "The Legislature," I observed that the Hon. Mr. Rice's Bill to regulate the Measurement of Firwood, &c., was referred to a select committee of seven members.

The committee were then put for reporting progress: Contd. Hon. Messrs. Johnston, Shore, Botsford, Simonds, and Hatch. Now Contd. Hon. Messrs. Botsford, Simonds, and Hatch. The division being taken, the Chairman, Hon. Mr. Simonds, gave his casting vote in the affirmative, and the Bill was ordered to be printed. The question being then taken to pass, the same division took place, the Contents in the first division being now Contents on this; and the Chairman now giving his casting vote in the affirmative, the motion was carried. The Committee then were, and the Chairman reported the result, but when the Province put a question whether the report be received, the House divided, Contd. Hon. Messrs. Johnston, Shore, Botsford, Simonds, and Hatch; and therefor the report was rejected. Here there was an adjournment of the House till the following day.

Mr. Woodward supported the Bill in a brief speech, "contending what had previously been stated."

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.—On the 28th of the House was engaged with amendments to a Bill relating to the Election of Representatives to serve in the Provincial Assembly, which were suggested by the Legislative Council, and finally agreed in. A Bill to regulate the Measurement of Firwood, &c., and the amendments to which were likewise agreed in.

The committee appointed on the 4th of February to take into consideration the application of the Justice of the Peace for the County of Carleton, to be reimbursed expenses incurred by reason of a riot on the 4th day of July last, admitted a Report, stating that £1000 had been expended in the riot, and recommended that the sum of £250 be paid from the Provincial funds to assist the County in the emergency. They likewise recommended that the balance should be defrayed by assessment on the County, and a Bill for that purpose was prepared and read.

Mr. Botsford moved for leave to bring in a Bill relating to the trade between the British North American possessions, which was granted and the Bill read.

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
