The Committee on Home Missions report :

Your Committee on this subject report—That New Brunswick comes up before them as one vast mission field. Evangelical Churches, not Baptist, are so regarding it, and are consequently multiplying missionary agency ; but they cannot meet our responsibilities or do our work. The fields calling loudly for Baptist preaching, are ripening on all hands for the harvest. For example, there are the four large Counties of the North, stretching from the Westmorland line along the Gulf of the St. Lawrence to the Canadian Boundary, embracing a population of some 60,000 souls, and having in all only three Baptist ministers. The Counties of Victoris and Carleton are rapidly increasing their population, and new districts are springing up in various sections, calling for missionary aid. On the west side of the river St. John, extending from the City to the Oromoto, some sixty miles, the population is fast multiplying in numbers, and in all the elements of financial progress; but, to a lamentable extent, are without the means of grace. The City of St. John and its surroundings, present a field of sufficient extent to employ advantageously, at least two efficient Baptist insistonaries the whole time. The growing town of St Stephen ought to have a Baptist missionary established there without delay. Small and feeble Churches in various setions of the Province are mainly dependent, under God, for strength and progress to the fostering care of the missionary funds. The Committee on Sabbath Schools report :

It appears from the letters from the Churches comprising this Association, that there are, in its connection, twenty-five Sabbath School, with 286 teachers and 2,214 scholars; twenty-five Sabbath School, volumes, and a distribution of 1,650 religious papers monthly. The majority of these schools are reported as being in a flourishing condition, while others complain of their feeble state. Thirteen of the Churches make no mention of having; any Sabbath Schools. Wave Committee would earnestly recommend that all the Churches be particular in giving the statistics of their schools, to specify the number of scholars on the list; number of teachers; number of libraries; number of volumes in the same ; number of papers distributed; amount of money sectors and expended, and the good resulting from the institution.

And your Committee would urge upon those Churches which has no Sabbath Schools, the duty they owe to themselves, and the risk generation, to commence at once, where it is at all practicable, the is mation of such Schools; regarding, as your Committee do, this depriment of Christian labor as one of the most efficient means of giving the youth a knowledge of the great principles of our holy religion, as inspiring the young and tender mind with a reverence for God's hol Word, His sacred day, and preparing them to become the future use ers in our Sabbath Schools. REPORT.

The state of our affairs is more encouraging this year than last. We are abled to speak of work accomplished, seed sown, and some fruit gathered in r finances have been in a more hopeful condition than during the previous o years. In our last we reported having voted assistance to the following brethren:

v. Alexander Estabrooks, to labour in St. Francis; Eev. E. Hickson, in New

castle, Miramichi ; Rev. W. A. Crandall in Flat Lands, in the North of Restgouche; Rev. Abel Washburn, in Loch Lomond, Harding's Settlement, &c., and Rev. J. E. Hopper, in Shediac.

Excepting the last named, all these brethren are labouring in the same fields, and are still assisted by the Board, and are highly esteemed by their people for their labours of love.

Last September Rev. J. E. Hopper closed his labors in Shediac, having spent nearly five months in that field, since which time the church there has been without a missionary, and most of the time without the preached word.

During the year the following brethren have received appointments :- To Blissfield, Blackville, Ludlow, and the Upper Miramichi, Rev. W. M. Edwards He has spent some years in this field already, and some of the time unassisted by the Board ; but last year the loss of logs in the Miramichi, rendered his brethren unable to support him alone. Hence, he must either abandon a par-tion of the field, or receive our aid. It is hoped the field will soon be self. sustaining. He reports two baptisms.

To labor in New Zealand Settlement, and other fields in the same region, is York County, Rev. James Tozer. He reports preaching from four to six times a-week in seven stations; all destitute when he is absent Some were waiting baptism when he last reported.

To labour in St. Andrews, Rev. T. W. Crawley. This brother has been greatly blessed in this old and long neglected field. He seems to have been raised up for this very work.

To Saltspring Settlement for three months, Rev. David Crandall. His report was full of interest, and spoke of good being done.

In view of the destitution around St. John, a Committee was appointed by the Board to make arrangements to supply South Bay, Grand Bay and Milkia with occasional preaching, trusting that the collections taken at these place would pay the expenses; if not, they were to be met by the Board. Accor-dingly these places were quite regularly supplied for about three months, by brethren May, Davies, Miller, and Steadman. But the collections, not equaling the expenses, the effort was discontinued for the present.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

One hundred and twenty-five dollars and thirteen cents have been paid in the hands of the Foreign Mission Board in Nova Scotia, and have been expend by them in the support of native preachers in Burmah, under the direction the Rev. R. R. Crawley. Money on hand, \$18 17.

GENERAL EDUCATION.

Eighty-five dollars and fifty cents have been paid from this fund towards the support of our Seminary in Fredericton. On hand, \$19 77.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

From this fund, fifty-seven dollars and thirty cents have been paid town assisting brothers Peter McLeod, and John W. Titus, in pursuing their studie preparatory to the ministry. On hand, \$81 48.

SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS.

Sixty dollars have been paid from this fund to brethren laid aside from t work by age or disease, viz., Revs. M. Pulcifer, Levi Marshall, A. B. McDona and J. McInnis. On hand, \$47 68.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

From this fund, seventy one dollars and eighty-two cents have been expe in assisting Sabbath Schools in procuring libraries-eleven in all. hand, \$81 42.

After the lapse of another year the Committee of Management are prepared to make a report of educational proceedings in relation to the Seminary at

The number of Students upon the record that have entered the Institution dring the year has been seventy, and the actual attendance has been forty, on an average, each week. The various classes, both in the senior and junior departments, have made good progress in their studies, and shown a commendable interest in learning, which has been very satisfactory to their teachers. In the winter the usual recitations were delivered by the pupils, and as the

School Room has been, for several years, inconveniently crowded by the large audiences that assembled, the Temperance Hall was engaged for the occasion, which was filled to overflowing.

The examination at midsummer was held in the presence of Dr. Jack, Presi-dent of the University, John Bennet, Esq., Chief Superintendent of Schools, the Rev. Dr. Brocke, Rev. J. C. Blakeney, John C. Allen, Esq., Speaker of the House of Assembly, Charles Fisher, Esq., M. P. P., T. Archer, Esq., and other friends. It embraced a wide range of subjects, in English, Latin, Greek and Mathematics and gave general assisfaction to these who was present Mathematics, and gave general satisfaction to those who were present. Mr. Calvin Goodspeed having completed his preparatory course, entered the

University of New Brunswick at the usual time in September. Mr. Peter McLeod attended, in all, about two terms, but eventually he feit.

obliged to discontinue his studies, and became engaged with the Church at Jemseg.

The Committee have been endeavouring to carry out the resolution of the Society in relation to the liquidation of the debt. At the last meeting of the Western Association, the Rev. A. D. Thomson was requested to undertake the task. Having been released for a time from his engagement with Acadia Col-lege, he visited several places in the Western part of the Province, and was making good progress towards the accomplishment of the object, when repeated domestic afflictions of the most severe kind compelled him to desist; and now the Governors of Acadia College are of opinion that its intcrests will suffer if Edger Thomson is detained longer from that work. His report will be made at this Session, and it will be for the Society to decide upon the coarse that will be most conducive to the interests of all parties.

The Committee are waiting for the removal of the debt in order to carry out the plans which they have had under consideration for the increase of the Staff of Teachers; but they cannot incur fresh liabilities until the old ones have been cancelled; they trust, however, that the time is not far distant when this will be fully accomplished.

A DECLARATION

of the Faith, Practice, and Covenant of the Churches of Christ composing the Western New Brunswick Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1. We believe that there is but one only living and true God, who is a Spirit, infinite, eternal, and unchangeable in his being, wisdom, power, holiness, justice, goodness and truth: Deut. vi. 4; John iv. 24; Ps. xc. 2, cxlvii. 5; James i. 17; 1 Tim. i. 17; Mark x. 27; Isaiah vi. 8; Deut. xxxii. 4 ; Ex. xv. 11, xxxiv. 6, 7.

2. That there are three persons in the Godhead-the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost-who are but one God, the same in substance, equal in power and glory : Matt. xxvili. 19; John xv. 26; 1 Cor. xii. 4-6; 2 Cor. xiii. 14; Eph. ii. 18.

3. That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, in which He hath given us our only rule of faith and practice : Luke xvi. 29-31; 2 Tim. iii. 15-17; 1 Thess. ii. 18; 2 Peter 1.21, iii. 2; Rom. iil. 2; Isa. viil. 16, 19, 20.

4. That God, who is infinite in knowledge, and perfectly views all things from the beginning to the end, has foreordained that whatsoever comes to pass, either by his order or permission, shall work for the eternalglory of his great name : Acts xv. 18, ii. 23; Ps. 1xxvl. 10, xxxiii. 11; Rom. ix. 17-23, xi. 36.

5. That in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that in them are; and he upholds and governs all things by the word of his power: Gen. i.; Ex. xx. 11; Dan. iv. 85;

6. That God made man in his own image, in knowledge, righteousness, and true holiness; and made with him a covenant of life, the condition of which was perfect obedience : Gen. i. 26, 27; ii. 16, 17; Ecc. vii. 29;

7. That man being left to himself soon fell from that happy and glorious estate in which he was made, by eating the forbidden fruit, by which he brought himself and all his posterity into a state of death : Gen. iii. 6; Rom. v. 12-9.

8. That man being thus dead, his help and recovery are wholly in and from God : John vi. 44; Eph. ii. 4, 5, 7-10; 1 John iv. 10.

9. That God the Father has chosen a great multitude of the human family, whom no man can number, of all nations, and kindreds, and people, and tongues, and given them to his Son in the covenant of his grace, that he might redeem them from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works, which is the only foundation of salvation for lost and helpless sinners; and thereby the Ministers of the Lord are encouraged to preach the Gospel to every rational creature, because the purposes of God, and the infinite value of Christ's atonement, secure the increase and establishment of Christ's kingdom, so that the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ; and He shall reign for ever and ever; Rom. viii. 29, 80; Eph. i. 4, 5, 11; John vi. 37-39; Rev. vi. 9; Titus ii. 14; Mark xvi. 15; 2 Tim. ii. 19; Isa. ix. 7; Rev. xi. 15.

10. That Jesus, the eternal Son of God, hath come, and taken on him our nature, and in that nature hath yielded a perfect obedience to the aw which we have transgressed, and suffered death for our sins, and hath brought in a complete and everlasting righteousness, and hath risen and ascended to the right hand of God, and ever liveth to make intercession for us: John i. 1, 14; Heb. i. 1-3, vii. 25, x. 5-10: Rom. i. 4; Dan. ix. 24.

11. That the Holy Ghost, and he only, can and doth make particular application of the benefits of the atonement made by Christ to every elect soul : John iii. 5-8, xvi. 7-15; 1 Cor. xii. 8.

12. That the Spirit of God applies the benefits of this atonement, by convincing us of our sinful, lost and miserable condition; and then discovering the glorious Saviour, as he is exhibited in the gospel, in his suitableness and sufficiency, and enabling us to embrace him with our whole souls, by which he is made unto us wisdom, righteousness, sanctification and redemption: John xvi. 8-11; 18-15; Gal. v. 22, 23; 1 Cor. i. 30.

13. That the life of religion consists in the knowledge of God, and conformity with him in the inward man, which necessarily produceth an external conformity to his commands, and brings us to live in obedience to his holy will in all our ways, and in our several places and relations: John xvii. 3; 1 Cor. x, 31; Eph. ii. 10; Col. iii. 2, 3; Gal. ii. 20; Rom. xii. 1, 2.

14. That true believers being united to Jesus Christ, shall never perish, but live and reign with him for ever. They have communion with God, and by his Spirit they are united with each other, and have communion one with another, whereby they are made partakers of each other's gifts and graces; John vi. 30, x. 28; Rev. iii. 21; John xvii. 7, 11, 21; xiv. 3; Rom. viii. 38, 39; J John i. 3.

15. That the first day of the week, commonly called the Lord's day, is the Ohristian Sabbath: John xx. 19; Acts xx. 7; 1 Cor. xvi. 2; Rev. i. 10.

16. That God hath appointed the ordinance of civil government for defending the poor as well as the rich, in their civil rights, without infringing upon the consciences of any, or attempting to dictate or govern in the worship of the eternal God, which belongs only to Jesus Christ the great lawgiver and head of his church: Mark xii. 17; Rom xiii. 1-6; 1 Peter ii. 13-15; Matt. xxiii. 10; Rom xiv. 4.

17. That there will be a general resurrection both of the just and the unjust; and that God hath appointed a day in which he will judge the world in righteousness, by Jesus Christ, and will reward every man according to his works; when the wicked shall be sent away into everlasting punishment, and the righteous received into life eternal: John v. 28, 29; Acts xvii. 31, xxiv. 15; Rom. ii. 16; Matt. xvi. 29, and 25-46.

That a Bishop or Elder hath no more power to decide any case or mirroversy in the Church than any private brother; yet they, having perior gifts for teaching and ruling, ought to exercise and improve the me for the benefit of the Church; and the Church ought to be subdue to the gifts bestowed on the Minister from the Lord, while he is whily administering in his place; whose place it is to lead in the actaction of the Church, and to administer the ordinances of the Gospel. and whote himself to the work of teaching, warning, rebuking, and exhort: a the people publicly, and from house to house: Matt. xx. 25-29; Peter v. 3; Acts xx. 20-28, 31; Heb. xiii. 17; 1 Thes. v. 12, 18. 4 That the Deacon's office or work is to take care of the poor, and to are the oversight of the temporal affairs of the Church, and to minist at the Lord's Table; Acts vi. 1-5; 1 Tim. iii. 8-14.

That there is a mutual obligation between Minister and peopleto administer in things religious and spiritual, according to the gifts od has given. The Church to communicate of their temporal or willy substance for his comfort and support, and that by an equality, nearly as can be ascertained, that one may not be burthened and anher eased. But this is not to be effected by force or compulsion, or the sword of civil power; but it is to be a free-will offering, agreey to the Scriptures of truth ; and every member deficient in this matought to be disciplined by Gospel rule, as for any other breach of renant, or neglect of performing Christian duty: Luke x. 7; Rom.

We do now, in the presence of the great, all-seeing and most glorious God, and before angels and men, give up ourselves to the Lord Jehovah, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, and avouch him this day to be our God, our Father, our Saviour, and our Leader, and receive him as our Portion for ever. We give up ourselves to the Lord Jesus Christ, and grace, and rely on him as our Prophet, Priest, and King, to bring us to eternal blessedness.

We acknowledge our everlasting and indispensable obligations to glorify God by living a holy, righteous, and godly life, in this present world, in all our several places and relations; and we engage by the assistance of the Divine Spirit, to improve our time, strength, talents, and advantages to his glory and the good of our fellowmen; promising, by Divine help, to walk in our houses as becomes those professing godliness, and to maintain the worship of God in our families, and to train up those under our care in the ways of religion and virtue.

We also give up ourselves to one another in covenant, promising to conduct towards each other as brethren in Christ, watching over one another in the love of God-reproving, rebuking, and admonishing one another for good as occasion may require ; and if we at any time know that any members of the church are guilty of immoral conduct, that we will not expose it by tattling it to others; and if we have any personal difficulty with our brethren, we will not cherish enmity or speak of our grievances to others, but will faithfully labour with them, according to the direction of our Lord-Matt. xviii. 16, 17-that sin may be put away from among us, and that iniquity may not be harboured in the church. We engage to watch not only against the most gross evils, but also against all foolish talking and jesting, which are not convenientvain disputing about words and things which gender strife-disregarding promises, and not fulfilling engagements-tattling and backbiting, spending time idly at taverns, or elsewhere, and vain, unnecessary worldly conversation on the Sabbath, and whatsoever else is contrary to sound doctrine, according to the glorious gospel of Christ. We promise to hold communion together in the worship ot God, and in the ordinances and discipline of his church, according as we are or shall be guided by the Spirit of God in his word-expecting that He will yet further and more gloriously open his word and the mysteries of his kingdom-applying to the blood of the everlasting covenant for the pardon of our many errors, and praying that the Lord would prepare and strengthen us for every good work to do his will, working in us that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. - Amen.
