[To the Associated Press.] New York, Jan. 29. A fire at Sumner, S. C., yesterday, caused a loss of \$70,000. Governor Chamberlain, of South Carolina, at the recommendation of Judge Mackay, issued a proclamation clearing the turbulent colored militia of Edgedale County and disbanded all the military units of the United States House of Representatives adjourned at 11 o'clock to-day, after a continuous session of 48 hours, until noon on Saturday. The Napan Volunteers arrived yesterday afternoon, and the artillery after sunset. Three more rioters were brought up this morning. Two were captured, and one yielded voluntarily. Father Pelletier has addressed a letter to Hon. Robert Young, begging a truce, and promising that the rioters would come in and confess their crimes. But it is out of Young's hands now. The chief instigator, who would not fight, must first be caught and punished. The blood of Gifford has yet to be avenged. The examination of the prisoners, sixteen in number, is being going on to-day. The town, with its military, is like a garrisoned town just now. The working of the Caraquez Branch line of telegraph is daily interrupted.

[Special Telegram to the Tribune.] The Queen telegraphed from Osborne yesterday, demanding the immediate attendance at that place of the Cabinet Ministers. Archbishop Manning has issued a pamphlet in reply to Gladstone, in which he maintains that the Vatican decrees have not changed the condition of civil allegiance. The Spanish Army of the North has begun a movement and captured three important positions from the Carlists in the Valley of Casarac. A general attack will be made to-day.

A Quebec dispatch says that the Beauport Lignite Asylum was burned last night. No particulars.

[Special Telegram to the Tribune.] Messrs. Hearst, Fry and Berthelot arrived at Ottawa this morning from Quebec. They have come to obtain a settlement with the Government of Messrs. Bertrand and Berthelot's Contract on the Intercolonial Railway. It is said that the contractors claim \$700,000 for extras. A deputation from Montreal interviewed the Government to-day with a view of obtaining assistance to construct a Tunnel under the Lachine Canal. The work will cost \$450,000. They have also a proposition to construct a bridge over the Canal near the Tanagers.

[Special Telegram to the Tribune.] It is the intention of the Post Master General during the coming session to introduce reforms in connection with newspaper postage. Quarterly postage will, under the change, be required to be paid by publishers in advance. The rate will be reduced to something like two cents per pound on the whole bulk of papers mailed from the office of publication. Stamped one cent wrappers are to be issued, and it is also the intention of new papers will be assumed by the Post Office.

[Special Telegram to the Tribune.] There is information before the Coroner's jury that the parties in Albert House had assembled for the purpose of resisting the constables, but assured themselves and resolved to shoot the officers rather than surrender. Five guns were captured. Brigade Major McCully and City Volunteers expected here to-night. When information was communicated to the rioters that Volunteers were coming, they at once decided to surrender. Three prisoners are just leaving for Bathurst. The Coroner and jury will proceed to Bathurst to-morrow, when the inquest will close.

It is supposed that the horse, unable to free himself, perished of starvation. The great commercial value of the magnetic iron sands of New Zealand, worked to so much advantage in the manufacture of steel, has called attention to the very extensive deposits of the same substance on the coast of Labrador, and several establishments are now engaged in entering this and forwarding it to England. At one place about thirty tons a day are extracted. The separation of this sand from other substances mixed mechanically with it is greatly facilitated by the use of a new magnetic ore separator, which has also been used to advantage in other localities, where the ore by roasting is covered into magnetic oxide of iron, then purified, and the iron extracted.
