Ottawa, March 10.-Canadian Press.-Addressing the annual meeting of the St. John Ambulance Association here yesterday, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire spoke of the regret he felt at his impending departure from Canada, and, after eulogizing Canada's war efforts, said: "There is no reason for fussy interference with people's general standards of living, but undoubtedly much could be accomplished in the ordinary course of everyday life to bring to the attention of the population conditions that might be remedied. We in Canada are fortunate in not having large congregations of human beings in a small area. With due attention from federal, provincial and municipal governments, there need be no difficulty in making regulations to prevent anyhing like slums in our great cities. There should be ample accommodation for living in our great industrial centres. It is easier to prevent slums than to remove them.'

Woodstock, March 10 .- Not until early evening is it expected that the jury will retire to decide whether Norman J. Garfield is guilty of murdering Bernard Johnston, Dundas street east confectioner. At 2:45 o'clock this afternoon evidence was still being taken, and the prisoner had not then taken the stand on his own

Andrew Denton Garfield is in his cell awaiting sentence for manslaughter.

Belfast, March 10.—Four men, who had incurred the displeasure of the Sinn Fein, were murdered near here on Tuesday night. The bodies of James Maher and Patrick O'Mara, former soldiers, and both residents of the town of Thurles, were found in a field. Maher's body was labelled "spy." It is said they were accused of giving information to the police. The bodies of two other men were found in a country lane at Augnacloy, and on their breasts were cards inscribed with the words: "Tried, convicted and executed by the Irish republican army." One was flentified as Francis McPhillips, who was taken from his bed at an early hour yesterday morning by six armed men. The identity of the other slain man is not known.

Charge from murder to manslaughter, the crown today proceeded against Norman Garfield on the murder charge. Norman Garfield was placed in the dock, and when he was asked to plead to the charge of murdering Ben Johnston, replied in a low voice: "Not guilty."

Before the court opened, Denton Garfield was brought into court and placed in the prisoners' dock beside his brother, Norman. It was a rather dramatic moment, for it was the first time the boys had set eyes on each other since Denton made the sensational confession that said his brother, Norman, had done the shooting. As the younger brother stepped into the box, Norman met him with a faint smile.

The mother of the boys and wife of Norman Garfield are again in court to-day.

Denton's evidence was almost similar to his statement delivered yesterday, when he was on trial. The only new facts brought out were that one of the revolvers had been his property at one time, and that prior to a year ago last August he had not seen his brother for eight or ten years. HEAVY LOSS BY PRICE-FIXING

Costs Ontario Apple Growers Millions Each Year. Says Preston.

TORONTO. March 9.-Establishment committee of the Legislature appointed to deal with marketing and export of fruit products. Losses of millions of dollars are sustained annually by Ontario because of operations of a price-fixing ring in Britain, Mr. Preston charged. Ontario growers received only \$1.50 per barrel for apples, while the retail price for apples in England was from \$25 to \$50 per barrel. British consumers paid \$25,000,000 annually for Canadian apples, the cost of which, f.o.b. Liverpool, was not more than \$6.





DONAHUE AND CHILDS BOTH QUALIFY FOR ALDERMANIC CONTEST

Not Likely That Large Vote Will Be Polled.

LIVELY CAMPAIGN

By Both Candidates Anticipated-Ward Will Be Canvassed.

Qualifying early today, J. M. Donahue, nominee of the Labor Representation Committee, in the Ward 4 by-election, assured a contest for the vacancy on the council caused by Ald. C. G. Moorhead's death,
H. J. Childs, the other candidate, qualified Wednesday night immediately after his nomination.

While it is expected that both candidates will conduct a lively carapaign the contest is not expected to be an exceptionally warm one. 



The prime minister further reminded the House that there had been protests by every Canadian Government since the embargo was put into effect. Mr. Pedlow's amendment gave the empression that such had not been the case. Canada rested her case on a promise given to Sir. Robert Borden in 1917 that the embargo would be removed at the end of the war. The prime minister thought it was not proper for the House to launch a pronaganda campaign against a policy followed by the British Government. Dehate on the resolution was adjourned by Dr. Michael Steele (South Perth) and the House adjourned at 6 o'clock.

On resolution proposed by Wm. Smith (South Ontario) "that it would not be in the interests of Canada should the Government of Great Britain remove the embargo upon cattle going into the United Kingdom," Mr. Smith said he considered it would be of far greater benefit to the cattle raising industry and to labor in Canada if the Government built and operated an abattoir at Halifax, where finished cattle could be slaughtered before shipment. Then the by-products would be manufactured in Canada, and the work would be done by Canadian labor.

Fear Difficulties.

The removal of the embargo might lead to difficulties. At the present time Mr. Smith understood that cattle from all countries were affected by it. If the embargo were removed from Canadian cattle only, there would probably be shipments of American cattle to Canada. Some of these cattle might be diseased or might contract disease on the voyage, Then there would be a danger of the Mbargo being reimposed.

W. H. White (Victoria, Alta.) said that he did not see much hope for Mr. Smith's plan of a cold storage facilities should be established in Canada as soon as possible.

Referring to the attempts being made to secure the removal of the embargo, Mr. Sutherland declared that the Ontario minister of agriculture, Hon. Manning Doherty, who could do nothing officially in the matter, was overseas as a private individual, trying to stir up trouble in labor.

The livestock industry was the only hope for agriculture in Canada, and he insisted that it had not been hampered by useless legislation as had been the case in the past. He thought it would be better for the Canadian livestock industry if animals were shipped to England in a finished condition. Favors Emigration.

OTTAWA, March 9.—(By Canadian Press).—In a judgment issued today the board of rallway commissioners grants the application of the Railway Association of Canada for permission to make surcharges on paesenger trainic between Canada and the United States. This means that Canadians purchasing passenger tickets to United States points will be required to pay, not only the usual price of the ticket, but an additional amount to cover the difference in value between Canadian and United States money. The surcharges provided for depend in amount on the distance from the border of the place where the ticket is purchased. The order providing for the system of surcharges will go into effect on March 15.


