





GOT GOOD PRICE BULGARIA AGAIN FACES TROUBLE FOR DEBENTURES

City Disposes of Issue of Revolution Threatened If At-\$159,000 At 98.64.

ST. THOMAS, March 9.—A sale of debentures amounting to \$159,000 has been made by City Treasurer Perry to a local brokerage firm in Toronto. 





Mr. Smith claimed that it would be of infinitely greater benefit to the cattle raising industry and the Canadian labor if the embargo remained in force and the Government built an abattoir at Halifax, where cattle could be slaughtered and the carcases chilled for shipment.

Several members opnosed maintenance of the embargo on the ground that it placed an undeserved stigma on Canadian cattle which had been given a clean bill of health.

I. E. Pedlow (South Renfrew) moved an amendment declaring "that the Government of Canada should make a strong protest arainst the reason assigned by the Government of Great Britain that Canadian cattle are diseased as an excuse for placing an embargo on live cattle going into the United Kingdom."

Endamental Chances.

Fon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of aericulture, regretted that the matter had been taken up in the way it had, by certain men from Canada. He believed they were seriously endancering the chances of getting the embargo removed.

The prime minister further reminded

ing the chances of getting the embargo removed.

The nrime minister further reminded the House that there had been protests by every Canadian Government since the embargo was nut into effect. Mr. Pedlow's amendment gave the empression that such had not been the case. Canada rested her case on a promise given to Sir. Robert Borden in 1917 that the embargo would be removed at the end of the war. The prime minister thought it was not proper for the House to launch a pronaganda campaign against a policy followed by the British Government. Debate on the resolution was adjourned by Dr. Michael Steele (South Perth) and the House adjourned at 6 o'clock.

On resolution proposed by Wm. Smith (South Ontario) "that it would not be in the interests of Canada should the Government of Great Britain remove the embargo upon cattle going into the United Kingdom," Mr. Smith said he considered it would be of far greater benefit to the cattle raising industry and to labor in Canada if the Government built and operated an abattor at Halifax, where finished cattle could be slaughtered before shipment. Then the by-products would be manufactured in Canada, and the work would be done

Canada, and the work would be by Canadian labor. Fears Difficulties.

The removal of the embargo might lead to difficulties. At the present time Mr. Smith understood that cattle from all countries were affected by it. If the all countries were affected by it. If the embargo were removed from Canadian cattle only, there would probably be shipments of American cattle to Canada. Some of these cattle might be diseased or might contract disease on the voyage, Then there would be a danger of the shargo being reimposed.

W. H. White (Victoria, Alta.) said that he did not see much hope for Mr. Smith's plan of a cold storage plant. That had been pressed upon the Government several times during the past few years without any result. It was necessary that cold storage facilities should be established in Canada as soon as possible.

Does Not Agree.

Dr. Michael Clark (Red Deer) had no sympathy with an attempt to force Canadian cattle into Great Britain with Canadian cattle into Great Britain with a crowbar. Canada ought to respect the wishes of the English people in this regard. If Canadian cattle raisers wished to get their cattle into Great Britain they must be prepared to reduce the tariff against British goods, and thus bring ships to Canada. Dr. Clark criticized the Government for not reducing the tariff against British goods at the close of the war. As a free trader, he would vote against the motion.

Donald Sutherland (Oxford South) said that all other countries were on the same basis as Canada as far as the British embargo on cattle was concerned. This embargo was first put on to prevent diseased cattle entering Great Britain, but was kept in force in order to protect the cattle industry of Great Britain.

Going te England.

Formerly, British cattle had been swept with disease, but it was now admitted that buyers from all counrites were going to Great Britain in order to secure improved stock for their herds. Referring to the attempts being made to secure the removal of the embargo, Mr. Sutherland declared that the Ontario minister of agriculture. Hon-

Mr. Sutherland declared that the Ontario minister of agriculture, Hon. Manning Doherty, who could do nothing officially in the matter, was overseas as a private individual, trying to stir up trouble in labor.

Referring to the development of the agricultural industry in Canada, Mr. Sutherland said that what was needed was better farming of the land already under cultivation rather than an increase in the acreage cultivated. Favors Emigration. Mr. Sutherland declared that Canada

should encourage emigration from the mother country to the Dominion. This country needed more people who were willing to go on the land and work. If willing to go on the land and work. If a large proportion of people who were now unemployed would do this, the situation in Canada would be much improved. The livestock industry was the only hope for agriculture in Canada, and he insisted that it had not been hampered by useless legislation as had been the case in the past. He thought it would be better for the Canadian livestock industry if animals were shipped to England in a finished condition.

Hon. Rodolph Lemieux said that he did not wish to oppose Mr. Smith's resolution on any of the grounds suggested by the mover. 





MANY OF FRANCE'S TREASURES OF ART ARE LOST FOREVER

Reparation of One Billion Francs Is Demanded by Fine Arts Ministry.

NOT COVER REPAIR

Proposal To Make Germany Replace Loot With Her Own Masterpieces.

PARIS, March 9 .- The French ministry of fine arts has presented a bill to the reparations commission, for collection from Germany, for damages done by German invaders to France's art asures and monuments. In a statement the ministry says that more than 1,000,000,000 france are needed to repair the German damage to these art treas-there and monuments and even then the story of the Teutonic invasion and of marauding and heartless sacrilege will remain to counterbalance any propaganda the German historians of the

future may make.

When it is remembered that the bill represented hundreds of cases of damage which money can never repair, it must be admitted that France has approached at least one side of her reconstruction work in a sense of unusual






