Secretary Rusk on Reciprocity.

Columbus, O., Sept. 19.—Fifty thousand people attended the State Fair here yesterday. The feature was an address by Secretary Rusk, of the Department of Agriculture, to the Farmers' Alliance. He advocated a large measure of reciprocity, which he defined as a certain "give and take policy." He said: "I presume there are manufacturers in this country who would be willing to sacrifice your weol interests for a kind of reciprocity that would benefit them as much as it might hurt you. I am opposed to that kind of reciprocity. So far as reciprocity means never give something for nothing, I favor it. Whenever it is evident that a treaty of reciprocity means the benefit of the larger part of the American people I agree to it; and whenever it is meant that reciprocity with this or that country would injure the larger part of our people, I am against it. Mind-Reader Johnston.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.— Paul Alexander Johnston, the mind-reader, whose recent feat of picking a name out of the register at the Grand Pacific Hotel after a long drive blindfolded through crowded streets attracted such wide attention, performed another feat yesterday, which to all appearances, totally disproves the theory that man possesses only five senses, and also the belief that mind reading is really a species of muscle reading. Johnston opened a difficult combination safe in the presence of many well known people at the Wellington Hotel and under the following remarkable circumstances:

under the following remarkable circumstances:

He was first blindfolded and the bandages thoroughly examined by a committee. His cars were packed with cotton so it was impossible for him to hear, then his nostrils were similarly filled to destroy, for the time being, the sense of smell, and finally his hands were covered with thick kid gloves, to disprove the theory of musclerading. In his mouth he held a lighted cigar, so that even the sense of taste was temporarily destroyed. The proprietors and bookkeeper of the hotel then took a position behind him, and while Johnston turned the knob of the safe they were requested to think of the combination. Without touching either of the gentlemen, the mind-reader turned correctly to the numbers and swung the door open. The crowd which witnessed the act cheered him repeatedly.

Johnston declares that his idea in opening Johnston declares that his idea in opening the safe under such peculiar conditions was simply to prove that man actually possesses more than five senses and that science is in error. In conversation the mind-reader couples his performance as in some respects comparing in importance to the scientific world with the discovery of the circulation of the blood or the law of gravitation.

electric light developments in the London City Council change with kaleidoscopic rapidity. Last night's meeting of the aldermen revealed still another phase of the question. For reasons which must now be pretty apparent to the public, though far from satisfactory, and in fact a trifle childish, the Council resolved to upset the whole of its labors in arranging for buying an electric light plant, and decided to continue the present system of lighting the city by contract

In order to understand the true inwardness of the situation, it is necessary to refer to a few civic happenings within the past twelve or fourteen months. Last ammer the City Council began to consider the question of purchasing an electric light plant of its own. Towards the end of the year, almost at the eleventh hour, several aldermen, led by Ald. Boyd, were selzed with the idea that the city would lose much if it did not proceed with nediate purchase of a plant. A move was made in the Council having that object in view. The ADYRTISER, in the interests of the taxpayers, opposed any such precipitate action being taken by a dying Council, and the majority of the aldermen Council, and the majority of the settlewoted that the question be left for settle-ment by the new Board. During the early part of the year the Council was occupie tion of the amalgamation of uth with the city, and the mem bers of the Board who most strongly favored the speedy purchase of a plant last year lailed to make any special effort to promote the scheme. After amalgamation, however, the agitation was renewed, and under the assumption that they would be better able to judge of the merits of the respective systems if they saw them in operation, a prition of the Council went on a tour of inspection in other ciries. Then followed the calling for tenders, and finally, tendays ago, the awarding of the tender is the council of the calling for the awarding of the tender is the council of the call of t tender to the Royal Company, which has for some time supplied the city with a portion of its street lights.

Not an obstacle was thrown in the way of the purchase of an electric light plant -not one of the aldermen suggested that there were either legal or financial culties in the way. That drawback seems to have been an after-thought, but whether well or ill founded, it was sprung at the special meeting of the Council last night, and by a majority of one accepted as a valid excuse for once more withdrawing from the resolution to purcha plant, and reverting to the lighting of the

The wicked Water Commissioners, it seems, are at the bottom of it all. Now, no one to look at either Chairman Davis, Com-missioner Essery or Mayor Taylor would believe that they would plot to frustrate the wise decisions of so grave a body of men as the aldermen of London. The Water Commissioners may make mis-takes, but they are not so foolish as to believe that unnecessary antagonism to the other civic rulers would be justifiable. What is the gravamen of the charge s bill for the amalgamation of London South with the city and other purposes, which, while imposing new liabilities on the Water Commissioners, provided for the borrowing by the Council of \$130,000 to meet those expenses. But, argued the aldermen, the commissioners only asked for \$70,000. We will give them that amount, and keep the remainder to buy an electric light plant. Months ago the aldermen asked the commissioners to agree to this modus vivendi, but the commissioners would have none of it. They pointed out that \$70,000 would have been enough of money with which to make ordia bill for the amalgamation of London enough of money with which to make ordimary extensions, and it might not take so very much more to accomplish what they mow are committed to; but they do not mean to take any chances. They will finish their work originally resolved on, as well as the extensions called for by act of Legislature, passed at the instance of the Council, as economically as possible and then hand over the balance to the civic treasury.



The manner in which the tenders have been disposed of, Mr. Barr asserts, will have "an effect hereafter in keeping reputeble companies from tendering, not only for electric light plants, but for other works which the Council may require to enter upon."

Water Commissioner Essery States His Views-He Says the Council Are to Blame for Their Own Mistake.

"I see some of the aldermen are charging the Water Commissioners with taking advantage of the statute, "said the scribe."

"Well, such is not the case. The commissioners are simply going to do their duty by the citizens. If the Council made a mistake, as they acknowledge, in framing the statute, are we to father it? The Water Commissioners had nothing to do with that. We are directed to do certain works, to keep faith with South London, and if it requires more than \$70,000, why we must apply for more, and if not handed over we will take steps to compel the Council to do so. They now say that they have made an error and should have made two sections in the same statute—one to raise \$70,000 for the electric light plant. And they didn't, although there were deputations from London South and the city; but are we responsible for that? The Council passed a bylaw to give us \$130,000, and then actually wanted us to pass another handing over to them \$60,000 before their grant was given. But we refused because that would the charging us with a debt which we never incurred. What kind of book-keeping would the citizens think that to be? No; we are going to carry on our work conscientiously. Again, the Council claim that the commissioners are in debt to them \$60,000 incurred during the past several years. Now, supposing the residents of a street make application for water, we are compelled to lay down pipe on that street. It costs us a certain amount to do that, but when finished every inch of that pipe and all the work immediately becomes the property of the city. Then they go and levy a tax on the whole of the people to pay for the exponditure, charging the debt at the same time at our doors. They want us to estimate the value on the lands to be purchased at Springbank; but do you suppose for a moment that we are going to put our figures in public before the arbitration has decided on them? They wo
