A republic whose welfare depends upon the training of the mass of its citizens cannot begin too early to look after that training. Our present public school system has done its part so well that we have courage to propose an enlargement of its provisions at both ends. The measure to be discussed here is the extension of the kindergarten system to public schools. The need and value of the kindergarten has made itself felt wherever it has been introduced. All children above a certain grade of poverty are sent to it, as a means, at once, of passing their time and leading them into much primary knowledge under the stimulous of well-devised games.
The success reached by this method has already given the lie to that old and much thrummed proverb, "There is no royal road to learning," by proving that there is such a road—the road of nature, which leads to knowledge of such sort as entirely escaped those who whipped their children along the old highway of dull repetition. Now, since the Republic is deeply concerned that all its children should have the best attainable start in life, and since, as a matter of fact, those who have least at home are those who need most of the public, and since nothing can be costlier for the Republic than a large lower class of ill-taught and unresourceful citizens, would it not be wise, as a measure of mere public economy, to provide for our children in their earliest youth places for instruction adapted to tender years? In kindergartens, the public, tender years? In kindergartens, the public, through its teachers, would seize upon the infant mind in its first and most impressionable years of growth; would teach it order, system, cleanliness, the habit of attention—the most important of intelligen habits, and give it such an introduction to the world of knowledge as would make that world seem attractive forever after. The future citizen would be placed in a genial relation to the world of his time, and removed from the narrow, and often illiterate surroundings of his home, into a new and higher world of customs and thoughts.

So far as the child itself is concerned, the gain would be immense, and the lower its parents are in the social scale, the greater would be the child's gain. The mere removal, for a few hours daily, from squalid and overerowded rooms to a well-aired and comfortable apartment, from the company of an overworked and irritable parent, to the supervision of a well-dreased and even-tempered teacher, would be a new stimulus to improvement. The fact that the child would be washed and brushed up to present a respectable appearance alone would act as a powerful factor towards improvement. The chance for associating with other children in interesting games and pastimes, under such oversight as would prevent any mischief from arising, would still further enhance the value of this discipline. In such companionship, the influence of the best is sure to be stronger than that of the worst. Constant urging on the part of the teachers towards the better produces an unconscious habit of looking for the better, which is invaluable. That our present public school system is too wholly intellectual in its results is in a great measure chargeable to the fact that we do not get hold of children at a sufficiently early age; they are left to form bad habits at ages when most habits are formed and fixed, and our later education, therefore, can do but little to change the basis of character, and give the right bend to the growing twig. The infant is at wax, to be moded into any desired shape; the child of 7 is already a half-determined creature, whom one may develop but not transform. We should begin younger; we should take it in the protoplasmic stage before it is hardened to gristle. Character starts early, and we should be up betimes to start with it. Maxims and instruction can do little to change it when once confirmed; but a discipline in good habits and a training to amiable behavior at the outset, such as kindergartens furnish by the very nature of their methods, will sink deep and last long. When a child has learned to dielike being dirty or having soiled clothes, it is already on the way to much virtue. When it has learned to love knowledge about things, as the methods of such schools so generally incite it to do, it has already lifted its head above many of the lower temptations of evil. When it has learned to play with other many of the lower temptations of evil.
When it has learned to play with other children in a sweet-tempered and self-for-getful manner, it has already acquired the first requisites of good citizenship, and for living on good terms with fellow-creatures anywhere.

living on good terms with fellow-creatures anywhere.

Besides all this, one should consider the escape from misery and squalor on the part of tender little creatures during several hours of the day. Moreover, the child is a world of activity, of questions, of curiesties, of almiess desires. Half the wretchedness of children is brought about by the failure of society to provide for the gratification of their impulses and requirements; and if they grow up discontented, grumbling and dismal, it is partly the result of their neglected childhood, which gave them a habit of unhappiness in their early years. And especially is it true that by no other means could the Republic extend its influence and renovating power so easily and deeply into the families of foreigners, who are now seeking our shores in such numbers. What could be more effective and penetrating than that their nurshings should come under the influence of our native-born at once? the influence of our native-born at once !-should be thrown where they would be sure to learn our language as natives, and our ways of thought as "to the manor born."

Here is our true field; on this measure hinges the future welfare of the Republic.

GLADSTONE, ROSEBERY, THE QUEEN AND THE COUNTRY.

In accordance with the determination of Queen Victoria to keep away from London during the summer months, no matter how strong the call of duty might be, and out of respect for the ancient custom that calls for the kissing of the sovereign's hand by the statesman selected as First Lord of the Treasury, Mr. Gladstone has made a pilgrimage to the Isle of Wight. In Osborne Palace he has in secret committed to the Queen the names of the statesmen whom he has chosen to aid him in his arduous task of governing the great British nation. It would have been much more seemly if the Queen had come to London or Windsor to meet her Prime Minister, but it does not appear that the sprightly octogenarian Premier has allowed the journey to trouble him. He seems to have made the most of it as a holiday outing. Our cablegrams give, from a source that

may be partially inspired, a list of the Cabinet alleged to have been selected, but not till the House of Commons is officially apprised of the personnel of the new Administration will it be definitely known to ministration will it be definitely known to the outside public. It seems to be settled that Lord Rosebery will be Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. This has prob-ably been the intention all along, though Conservative politicians have striven hard to make believe that the able young Scotch-man was at variance with the views which his chief entertains on foreign policy. Why this should be it is difficult to understand. Lord Rosebery will undoubtedly bring strength to the Administration. He is firm, well-informed, an able debater and witty. With such a statesman the chief mouthpiece of the new Government in the House of Lords, there may be some interest in the affairs of that unpopular body It is not Lord Rosebery's blame that he is a member of that chamber, however. The hereditary principle of appointing legislators has no friend in the Master of Dalmeny. He has again and again said that he would much rather be a member of the House selected by the free voice of the people than hold a seat in a chamber largely made up of men who owe their presence there to an accident of birth, and who may be totally unfit and unworthy to promote laws for the welfare of the country. As that cannot be, he is in favor of the mending of the House of Lords at he earliest possible moment. The trouble is that the majority of the so-called upper hamber are dead set against any change, so fearful are they of having their privileges curtailed.

Lord Rosebery is a great favorite with Gladstone. It is at this nobleman's beautiful Scottish residence on the River Forth that the Liberal chief tarries while he camthat the Liberal chief tarries while he had a liberal chief tarries while he had no many of Midpaigns in the neighboring county of Midothian. Indeed, it is an open secret that
Holborn constituency is without a member, it was Lord Rosebery who prevailed upon his chief to come north, twelve years ago, stronghold, and wrest from the eldest son of that ancient house the representation of the county in Parliament. In 1886, when speaking at Manchester, Gladstone introduced Rosebery as the "youngest member of his Cabinet," and as the "man of the future" in the Liberal party. Rose-bery was then 40 years of age, so that he is still in the prime of life.

In all probability the new Foreign
Secretary has no sympathy with the view,
so persistently advanced, that Gladstone and his Parliamentary associates are less loyal to British interests abroad than the set of statesmen who now go into Opposition. The trouble with a good many old world politicians, as it is with some of those to be found in the colonies, is that they mistake a policy of non-interference in matters that do not concern them as a sign of weakness. It is no evidence of weakness to steadily follow up such a programme, though it may be missuch a programme, though it may be mis-taken for that when it succeeds a policy more or less made up of bluster. We have admired Gladstone because he so persist-ently adhered to the principle that British Governments are not formed for the pur-pose of meddling with affairs that do not pose of meddling with affairs that do not immediately concern them, or with nations that are doing no more than Great Britain has herself done, and is doing. If Glad-atone had taken the advice of his opponents, when he was last in power, he would have decreed a bloody conflict with Russia because that nation absorbed a portion of Central Asia contiguous to Afghanistan. The Conservative newspapers of England clamered for a declaration of hostilities at the time and according to their view. that time, and according to their view Gladstone would have been warranted in embroiling the land in a war the end of which no one could foresce-to accomplish

what? To vindicate the view that no ation had a right to annex neighboring territory in Central Asia except Great Britain. To Gladstone's credit be it said, he refused to yield to the outcry, and he saved his country from disgrace and from the unnecessary expenditure of millions of pounds and the sacrifice of thousands of lives.

A foreign policy can be maintained in a firm and dignified manner no matter who is at the head of affairs, and in one of his recent speeches in Midlothian Mr. Glad-stone ably set forth the view that while keeping faith with other governments in regard the engagements entered into by his predecessors in office, his policy had been steadily shaped to avoid war and its deplorable consequences. That is the course which the Christian, the humane, the prudent statesman will endeavor to pursue.

REV. J. G. TATE, an Englishman, who only recently obtained his naturalization papers, has been nominated by the Republicans of Nebraska as their candidate for lieutenant-governor. The Englishman, like the Canadian, climbs up, no matter where he casts his lot.

MR. BLAKE ON IRELAND AND CANADA.

Canadians are sometimes told that hey have nothing to do with the home ule question in the British Parliament. To this there is one good retort-so long s we form a part of the British Empire, we are surely interested in the welfare of a portion of it so close to us as Ireland. Why, some of our jingo politicians tell us that it would be the duty of Canada to send her sons into the wilds of Central Asia, to be food for powder, if a British Premier bungled into a war with Russia or China! But Mr. Blake, in his speech at the Eighty Club gathering, very properly asserted that our interest in a proper settlement of the question of local government for Ireland is greater than many may suppose. "Can-adians," he pointed out, "have a material interest in the settlement of the Irish question, the adverse feeling evoked by which had not merely deprived Canada of her fair share of Irish immi-gration, but had exasperated the Irish in the States against England, producing an irritation which had found vent in armed neursions, hostile dealings and unfriendly action against Canada, as part of the Queen's Dominions." There is much truth in Mr. Blake's declaration.

A LONDON cable correspondent ventures the opinion that the Queen does not like Mr. Gladstone because she believes that a considerable number of his Radical followers have a decided leaning for the republican form of government, while, as matter of course, her Majesty has an even stronger attachment to the hereditary system of rulership. There is doubtless some truth in these surmises.

ONE MORE PROOF.

The Port Huron Times announces that Mr. John Murray, editor of the Herald of that city, has been selected as the Demoratic candidate for State senator of Michigan. Mr. Murray is a Canadian by birth and education, having gone from Parkhill village to Port Huron a number of years ago. His preferment to so important a position shows how quickly Canadians make their way in a fair field, and gives the lie once more to the idea so persistently comulgated by the trade restrictionists, hat Canadians are a poor, puny set, notable o hold their own on even ground with their ellows. 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
