Fatally Injured.

Mrs. James Harrison, of Lambeth, Had Her Skull Fractured.

The Victim of a Runaway Accident-

She Was Trying to Escape Danger When She Met With Misfortune. Mrs. James Harrison, wife of a well

known Lambeth farmer, received fatal injuries in a runaway accident here yesterday. She has been unconscious ever since, and the physicians have no hope of recovery.

The accident occurred about 10 a.m. on Dundas street, between Richmond and Clarence streets. 


