"On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front), yesterday evening and last night were marked by heavy artillery actions. The enemy delivered a violent attack on our positions north of Hill 34t. After a severe combat we repulsed the enemy, who was able to maintain himself in a position on our advanced line. A vigorous counterattack by our troops expelled him, and our line was re-established entirely. Another German attack on the Crete-des-Courieres cost our assailants appreciable losses without any result.

BRANDON UNIONISTS UNABLE TO SETTLE UPON A CANDIDATE

Brandon, Oct. 24.—Brandon Conservatives and Liberals have failed to agree to either Sir Augustus Nanton or Hon. T. A. Crerar, as union candidate. After an eight and one-half hour session the 168 delegates representing polling divisions in the federal riding, departed for their homes without having accomplished anything. One great obstacle was lack of assurance from either Sir lugustus Nanton or Hon. T. A. Crerar that nomination would be accepted. Eleven candidates were originally nominated.

The Government has decided to abolish the patronage list in every department. The announcement is contained in an official memorandum issued today reading: "The work of the war purchasing committee has been so satisfactory and effective that the premier has under consideration the retention of its organization as a general purchasing commission for all departments of the Government. During the last 2½ years the commission has undertaken and carried out the purchase of all supplies for every department of the Government in connection with the war. These supplies have been purchased chiefly for the department of militia and defence, the department of maval service and the department of instruction to abolish patronage both in regard to the appointments to the public service and in the purchase of supplies, there will hereafter be no patronage lists in any department of the Government. There has been no such list in the war purchasing commission, which has purchasing commission, which has purchasing commission, which has purchased all supplies by tender after publishing advertisements or circulars addressed to all known sources of supply in this country."

The regulations also provide that after the expiry of the time limit for reporting for service or claiming exemption (in the present case, November 10) any man reasonably supposed to be a member of the class or sub-class called out, may be accosted by any commissioned or non-commissioned military officer, or by any police officer, and his name and address, place of employment place and date of birth taken. "If," the regulation adds, "the officer questioning him has reasonable grounds to believe that the answers are untruthful or evasive, he may detain the man and take him before a justice of the peace to be dealt with according to law."

NO INTENTIONS OF HOLDING UP

Instructions Issued to Military Tribunal Representatives Made This Clear.

AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Questions of Agricultural Responsibility Answered by Lieut.-Col. H. D. Smith.

In view of the fact that considerable

authorities on the question of exempting men engaged in farming who are included in class one under the military service act, Lieut.-Col. Smith, district military representative of the military service council, has issued the following statement, in order to make the position of the military authorities plain, and to clear up any misapprehension that may exist in the minds of those concerned.

"Owing to misleading newspaper reports dealing with the instructions to military representatives as to the attitude to be taken by them towards farmers, farmers' sons and farm help when claiming exemption, Lieut.-Col. Smith states that the suggestions made to representatives were to the effect that where any of the above class claim exemption, inquiries should be made as to how many acres are affected, how many are under plow, how many are not, what means in the way of horses, machinery, etc., are available to work the farm, and what male help, not within the class called out, is available, and also what work can be undertaken by women as has been done since the commencement of war to relieve the present conditions. mencement of war to relieve the present

"Representatives were instructed that farmers, farmers' sons and farm help who had been engaged in farming some years should be exempted, assuming that they were working sufficient land to warrant it. It was said in a general way that for general farming one and a half men could work 100 acres.

The need of production was fully rec-

ognized, and there was no attempt to instruct, representatives to do anything that would in any way interfere with legitimate farming.

Investigate Dodgers' Case.

"Representatives were instructed, however, to investigate closely those cases of young men leaving the cittes and taking up agriculture as a pursuit with a view of escaping the military service act; also those cases of men who have gone into farming within the last year having the same object in view; also those cases of farmers who, having three or four sons and only small farms, refuse to allow any of their sons to go to the war, although their neighbors have done so; the sons of the farmer remaining sufficiency work to do on their own

of the farmer remaining sufficient work to do on their own farms, holding up the neighbors whose sons have gone to the war for exhorbitant wages whenever their labor was required by them .It was considered that these people are fit subjects for investigation and possible draft."

I have always credited the Government with a little common-sense, but if because of its order-in-council it is going to compel cereal factories all over the country to close down and put thousands of men out of employment, I say it is the essence of assimilate. pel cereal factories all over the country to close down and put thousands of men out of employment. I say it is the essence of asininity. Even if we were capable of distributing corn flakes in 20-pound packages, we could not dispose of our stock on hand, and the loss would be about \$50,000. We have material for two or three months yet to come which would become sheer waste. Sixty days is the minimum time by which we could get rid of our present supply, but the Government only gives us seven days. The particular kind of cereal manufactured by us is a perishable substance, and so if I do not get the license within a very short time our stock will simply rot."

Should the Battle Creek Toasted Corn Flake Company close down as a result of the action of the Government, some hundred men will be without employment and \$50,000 per annum of wages be discontinued.

GOVERNOR-GENERAL TO BESTOW CROSS ON LONDON OFFICER

Will Present Decoration To Lieut. T. A. Loughrey.

CEREMONY AT TORONTO

Reward for Bravery at Front Being Presented at Government House Thursday.

Lieut, T. A. Loughrey, M. C., son o A. Loughrey, 312 Hyman street, will tomorrow be officially decorated with his Military Cross by the Duke of Devonshire, governor-general of Canada The investiture will be at Government House, Toronto

Lieut, Loughrey was on Tuesday notified from Ottawa to be present as Government House on Thursday afternoon for the official presentation of his decoration by the governor-general. The London officer left this city in April, 1915, with No. 3 Stationary Hospital, but later transferred to a combatant unit going to France as an infantry officer. While leading a mid-Ferbus Wood, Lieut. Loughrey's platoon captured two machine guns, three officers and 36 men. In this encounter Lieut. Loughrey received serious wounds in the face, body and arms, necessitating removal to the Edinburgh Hospital. There septic poisoning developed, and it was some months before he was invalided back to Canada. Before his departure he was notified that he had been awarded the Military Cross.

Lieut. Loughrey arrived back in London last August. He is still suffering from his wounds and will undergo an operation next week.



DESERTER'S TERM MAY BE REDUCED IF OFFICERS WISH

Man Sentenced for Year May Rejoin Colors and Escape.

One lonely charge was entered on the police court blotter today in contrast to 41 on Tuesday. Albert B. Gillett was found guilty of being a deserter from a military unit on a charge laid by Major Baron Osborne. Von Recklingbausen, styled by Flynn as "patent engineer of no little ability," has been turned over to federal authorities for internment during the war. He is declared to have been an intimate associate of Sinn Feiners. A statement issued by Flynn said papers found on von Recklinghausen's person and in his rooms show definitely that large sums of money had gone forward to France for ultimate German purposes. **RUNS IN OPPOSITION** TO SIR THOS. 

In this connection, it is especially important to take into immediate consideration the problems of demobilization with a view of securing as far as possible the settlement upon the land of a considerable proportion of returned soldiers, including those from the British lists and from Allied nations, who may desire, under suitable conditions—of encouragement and assistance, to engage in agriculture."

Running the C. N. R.

Coming to the problem of transportation which will be dealt with by the committee the order-in-council points out the probability that in the early future two thousand additional miles of railway, must be acquired in the public interest. It is essential that through the systematic methods of operation should be devised, the order-in-council continues, and that the management of this large and important system (the C. N. R.) should be kept entirely free from party interference or political patronage.

The order-in-council proceeds: "The policy of state-owned lines of steamships to operate in connection with our state-owned railways demands attentive consideration. The problem of transportation necessarily begins at the farm or other point of production, and involves the consideration of improved highways, which subject should be laken up with consultation with the Government's agencies in the several provinces.

"The Government agents will also consider the future possibilities of air service for certain national purposes, while attention will be given to the wisest methods of raising revenue and possible reduction in public expenditures. Questions of thrift and increased productiveness of the land will come under review. The committee will take into consideration the importance of encouraging co-operation among persons engaged in agricultural production. The conditions of labor, the relations between employer and employed, the effect of the war thereon, and all questions incidental thereto, will be subjects a of study, while special attention will be given to the national service performed by the womanhood of Canada during the present war. 



In Response to Numerous Complaints Against Rasputin's Actions, the Holy Synod Banished Him to His Old Home in Siberia After the "Blessed Gregory" Had Refused to Obey the Decree Ordering Him to Seclude Himself in Some Convent.

This "Exile" Was Far From Being a Punishment, for Once Back in Pokrowskoie, Rasputin Surrounded Himself With Twelve "Sisters," All of Whom Lived in the House With the Monk, His Wife and Their Children-Many Times the Wife Fought for Her Rights.

At the time this incident took place Rasputin was already living in St. Petersburg, whither he had repaired on the invitation of some of hs admirers and protectors, who had the opportunity to listen to his preachings in Kieff and other Russian towns, Among them figured the Countess Sophy Ignatieff, a woman of high standing, irreproachable reputation and great influence in some circles of the capital, where her salon was considered the centre of the conservative orthodox party. Bishops and priests figured among her daily visitors, and it was among her habitues that the most important ecclesiastical appointments in the empire were discussed. Often it was the candidates whom she honored with her protection who were chosen for a bishop's place or for that of a superior to one of hose rich monasteries, the heads of which are quite personages in the state.

The countess was already an old woman, widow of a man who had been murdered during the revolution of 1905, and, moreover. incapable of being even suspected of any frailties of conduct. She was the mother of a large family, and though by no means brilliant, was yet clever in her way, with a slight propensity to intrigue. She was extremely devout, with a strong tendency to exaltation where religious matters came into question, and was continually lamenting what she called the relaxation of modern society in those practices of strict church discipline which Russians belonging to the higher classes have lately taken to forgetting. She would not have missed attending any of the long church services, sometimes so tiring in the Orthodox faith, which are celebrated on Sundays and many feast days, and she strictly fasted at prescribed times. Indeed, her whole existence was, as regards its daily routine, more hat of a nun than of a woman of the world. But for all that, she ked to keep herself well informed as to all that was going on and her, and politics was her especial hobby.

Rasputin and Illiodore were in time to become mortal enemany as simply a question of good breeding, to which it was mies, but at first a great friendship united them, and when Rasnecessary to conform when one belonged to good society, but putin was sentenced to enter a convent in the manner already which, beyond this, was treated entirely as a matter devoid of related Illiodore took up his cause most warmly and telegraphed to one of the former's admirers, an ecclesiastic of high rank in St. Petersburg, in the following terms: "Neither Bishop Feofane nor Archimandrite Serge has behaved fairly in regard to the Blessed Gregory." Illiodore's efforts, however, did not avail, and Rasputin was ordered to leave the capital immediately. But instead of being compelled to enter the convent whither they had wished to confine him at first, he was allowed to return to his native village of Pokrowskoie. Before doing so he bethought himself of calling on his former patron, Bishop Feofane, but the latter met him with the exclamation, "Don't approach me, Satan! Thou art not a blessed thing, but only a vulgar deceiver!" At Pokrowskoie Rasputin surrounded himself with twelve sisters, of whom the oldest was barely 29 years of age. They all lived in his house which was extremely well arranged and richly furnished. Rasputin's wife, together with her children, was also there and occupied a suite of five rooms, whilst each of the sisters had a separate room to herself.

> People wondered that the woman who ought to have been the sole mistress in the place had consented to share her authority with all these girls, and some even thought that she was as bad as her husband. In reality, the "Prophet's" consort had done all that she could to persuade her husband to give up the "mission" which he declared had been imposed upon him by the Almighty and to return to his former life of a simple peasant. Her efforts had remained fruitless, and Rasputin had replied to all her entreaties that his past existence had come forever to an end and that he knew his star was about to shine in a wonderful way within a short time. He commanded his wife not to attempt to interfere in the matter of his own personal relations with the "Sisters" living under their roof. Though she tried to submit to his will, yet there were occasions when terrible scenes occurred between husband and wife. Then the latter would attack violently, the girls, whom she accused of all kinds of dreadful things, and would then fall on the ground in attacks of strong hysteries, screaming so dreadfully that people heard her from the street. But tears and submission were equally of no avail and Rasputin did not trouble about his wife's rage or grief any more than he had troubled in general with any other impediment he had found in his way. As concerns the kind of life which the "sisters" were leading at Pokrowskoie, this is how one of them describes it:

It is now already six months since I am here, living in a kind of nightmare. I do not know to this day whether the "Blessed" Gricha is a saint or the greatest sinner. the earth has ever known. I cannot find a quiet place in this miserable village. I would like to run away, to return to St. Petersburg, but I dare not do so. I am so afraid, so terribly afraid of the "Blessed" one. His large, grey, piercing eyes crush me, enter into my very soul and absolutely terrify me. At a distance of 5,000 versts I feel his presence near me. I feel that he has got extraordinary powers, that he can do everything that he wishes with me.

For two whole years Rasputin was not allowed to show himself in the Russian capital, but the influential friends he had there never left off trying to get the decree of banishment rescinded. Among others, the Archbishop of Saratoff, Hermogene, and Illiodore worked most actively in his favor, and the latter in one of his sermons did not hesitate to call Rasputin the "greatest saint which the modern Russian Church had ever known." At last the efforts of his friends proved successful and Rasputin, toward the end of the year 1912, reappeared in St. Petersburg, where this time his progress was far more rapid than it had been formerly. and here his reputation of a latter-day saint grew with every hour, until at last he came to be looked upon as a real manifestation of the Divinity upon earth.

It was about that time that he was seen more frequently at Tzarskoie Selo, where the poor Empress was eating her heart away in anxiety over the health of her only son, the little heir to the throne, whose days seemed to be numbered. Rasputin, who had been introduced to her as a pious good man, whose prayers had already worked miracles, was very quickly able to influence her in the sense that he persuaded her that the small grand duke could only be cured if constant prayers were said for him by people who were agreeable to the Lord. It is not to be denied that the pseudo-saint had cultivated to a considerable extent the science of hypnotism and that he used it in regard to the consort of the sovereign in the sense that she grew really to believe that the presence of the "Prophet" by the side of her sick child might cure the latter. There was nothing else in their relations to each other, which remained always, in spite of all that has been said, purely official ones.



DRUG-EATING TO **DODGE SERVICE** UNKNOWN HERE

Board Doctors Say Toronto Stunt Not Yet Attempted Locally.

LITTLE CHANCE OF ESCAPE

Men Who Do "Put One Over" Penalized by Own Actions in So Doing.

The use of drugs to create tempor ary symptoms of heart disease or other ents when a man is to be examined by military medical officers under the military service act, has no been discovered here, according to military authorities. A case of this nature was disclosed in Toronto, and a man is held there on a charge of supplying aspirin tablets, together with black pellets, which have not been analyzed, but which it is claimed will black pellets, which have not been analyzed, but which it is claimed will cause temporary heart weakness.

"Some men are so foolish as to eat cordite," said one military officer today. "This has an affect on the heart, but it is only strong enough to arouse the examining officer's suspicions and cause further investigation, generally resulting in the man being categorized 'Class A 2'. Other men try swallowing a large sized chew of tobacco. This may have the desired effect, but zenerally the man becomes so ill that he cannot appear for examination until both his sickness and the effect on his heart have vanished. Soap is another resort of the man who is trying to dodge military service. This is apt to work the same way as the tobacco."

Means Continued Diet.

The officer pointed out that if the man did succeed in being credited with a weak heart he would likely be placed in a category below "B". Men in such categories are liable to re-examination at any time, so that to continue the deception the man would have, to adopt his tobacco or soap as a regular part of his diet. "If he prefers to do that instead of going overseas, where the chances are twenty to one that he will come through safely, he is welcome to his exemption." said the officer.

while examination is voluntary no penalty attaches to such attempts except that men caught in the act are likely to be found fit for the front ine trenches. Men supplying any form of drugs or other articles to be used for that purpose are liable to heavy penalties if convicted. The first charge laid so far has been that of fraud, the grounds being that if the man was not defrauding the man to whom he sold the drugs he was at least defrauding the Government of a recruit.

Ruse Which Failed.

Other schemes to obtain categorization below "A 2" are also proving futile. The story is whispered of one "deaf" man examined by a medical board here. He couldn't hear a thing, the examining officer said, even when that gentleman used his parade voice. It was at last indicated to him that he was rejected, and the man, after dressing, departed. As he passed through a door about 30 feet from the doctor he was requested by him in a voice slightly lower than normal to close the door. "Sure," said the man, but he closed it from the inside, for the examiner was busy marking his paper "A 2." "I guess you'll do for the front line," he said.

When measures so necessary to our welfare as individuals and as a nation, require that the weight of our opinion be thrown into the scales that register fhe will of the people, then the exercise of the franchise becomes a duty that women of imprial spirit cannot and DARE NOT SHIRK."

Good Work Already Done.
