Quebec, Jan. 30.-T. D. Bouchard, Quebec, Jan. 30.—T. D. Bouchard, member for St. Hyacinthe, started a debate on compulsory education in the Legislative Assembly yesterday afternoon, and in the course of his remarks made an outspoken attack on C. J. Magnan, chief in apector of Catholic schools for the province of Quebec charging him with designedly changing and falsifying figures to prove that school attendance in the province of Quebec was better than in other provinces. Inces.

In Quebec, he said, the people had been misled by false statistics, which begot a false sense of security, and while they dreamed of the superiority of the French-Canadian race, people in other places were actively progressing.

Mr. Magnan, he said, had given Quebec a school attendance of 77 per cent or higher than any other province.

There was a striking difference between the figur's given and the facts of the case. The report of the super-intendent of public instruction for 1913-14 accounted for 148,427 girls between the ages of 7 and 14 years in the province of Quebec, while the same report stated that there were 151,276 girls between those same ages attending school, and the only conclusion he could arrive at was that 2,489 girls, who had never existed, were attending schools in the province of Quebec.

Under such circumstances it was not surprising that the school attendance in Quebec was higher than that of Ontario, and the other provinces, and Mr. Magnan had every reason for being opposed to any change in the system.

St. Catharines, Jan. 30.—"Even if Germany has conceded President Wilson's famous fourteen points, they still beat us 30 per cent. Germany has prepared for peace far more carefully than she did for war," declared Rev. Dr. Newell Dwight Hills, pastor of the Pilgrim Church, Brooklyn, in the course of an address on "German Atroctities" here last night. Dr. Hillis declared that Germany had massed all her banking deposits in one system, and converted the funds to buy up control of the water powers of Switzerland, the coal mines of Poland, the platinum and petroleum deposits of Russia, and the vast timber tracts of Siberia.

"Unless we bring in a fifteenth point, forcing Germany to release her industrial stranglehold on smaller nations of Europe, we have failed hands down,"



ARCHANGEL, Tuesday, Jan. 28 .-By the Associated Press .. - The Ameri can and Allied forces operating south of the town of Archangel evacuated town of Archangel evacuated lied positions at Tarasevo and Tulgas The forces which retired from She govarsk, about sixty-five miles north of Ust Padenga, which was the Allied po sition farthest south, a week ago, today halted their march northward and established new posts at the villages of Vistarka and Ust Sama, on the opposite bank of the Vaga River at a strategical bend in the stream about ten miles north of Shegovarsk. The

new posts are protected by forests through which there are no winter trails in the immediate region.

Refugees' Plight Serious. The number of refugees fleeing over forest paths in zero weather from Shenkursk to the Allied lines north of that town is increasing. Red Cross that town is increasing. Red Cross representatives report that the plight of the refugees is serious.

butcher cuts off what is known as a wedge, which may be fried, minced, pot-roasted or boiled. Veal, lamb and pork should be thoroughly cooked, but not beef. The beef juices are better a little underdone than overdone.

"There is most value for beef tea in the shank, which will produce a clear liquid, which will jelly. Most people foolishly buy the neck, which will not 'jell.' The 15-cent oxtail or shank will make more soup than a whole four-pound rib of beef.

"I should advocate the using of handmineers for the pieces of meat around the soup-bone from the hindquarter, because that comes from the section where the best cuts of beef come. The forequarter soup-bone meat should not be put through the mincer, however, as it tends to be gristly.

"In lamb, the loin or rib chop is the most expensive, and at the same time most profitable joint in the animal, and is used mostly for frying. A shoulder roast of any animal, whether beef, lamb or veal, contains more juices than any other portion. The leg of an animal is dry, and you shouldn't use the hind leg of lamb or mutton for anything but roasting. The blade-roast of lamb is nice and sweet, and can be carved easily if the butcher removes the little thin blade. The, breast can be roasted in a pan with potatoes under it. The scrag end and flank are used for soup, and the neck portion for Irish stew.

"Lamb's kidney is the most expensive cut you can buy, but beet's kidney is equally as good and more economical. I don't advise the using of either pork liver or kidney, as they are apt to be diseased. Often little spring lambs have livers full of pus cells, and yet the Government allows the meat to be sold, when it would condemn beef in the same condition."



## Training the Invalided Soldier

TYHEN the first Canadian casualties were announced every heart in Canada thrilled with the thought-"What will the country do to help these men overcome the handicaps they have suffered?"

Since that day Canada has been quietly developing a wonderful organization to help restore the strength and earning capacity of her invalided soldiers.

This work is in the charge of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment. It is divided into three classes.

#### Ward Occupations.

Soldiers who, on account of their injuries, are confined to wards or to their beds in hospitals are taught handicraft work of various kinds. This work is not meant to train a man in work by which he could earn a living. It is encouraged rather because it diverts the soldier's mind from his disability, and gives him light exercise. In this way it assists wonderfully in the soldier's recovery.

#### Occupational Therapy.

This work is conducted in hospitals. It is intended mainly to help in the cure of the patient. . But it often serves as the ground-work for a course in Industrial Re-training. The following gives some idea of the breadth and scope of the subjects taught in these classes:-Mechanical drawing, woodworking, boot and shoe repairing, machine shop practice, gardening, poultry raising, civil service instruction, book-keeping, stenography, telegraphy.

#### Industrial Re-Training:

When a man is so injured by war service that he cannot follow the occupation or trade that he worked at before

enlisting, the Department trains him for a new occupation.

For this work, use is made of Technical Schools and Universities at fourteen centres throughout the Dominion. Here primary training is given by specially planned courses. This helps a man begin his actual re-training work intelligently.

Most of the re-training is given in actual factories and shops. Hundreds of large and small concerns have co-operated whole-heartedly in this work-placing at the disposal of the Department, without charge, their equipment and the services of many of their staffs.

Ninety-five per cent of those who have been granted "Industrial Re-training" courses by the Department have been successful in becoming self-supporting in a new trade or occupation.

These benefits are given by the Department to ex-members of the Canadian, British and Allied forces living in Canada, who come within the classes for which these benefits are provided.

During the period a man is being "Re-trained" he and his dependents are granted adequate pay and allowances.

## \$40,000,000 WORTH OF FOOD IS STORED AND COST STAYS UP

OTTAWA, Jan 29.—Advices from the United States indicate that the cost of living there is taking a tumble in spots. The cancellation Allied contracts for various food commodities, coupled with the vir logical effect across the border.

Not so in Canada. The householder is still paying the highest war prices for flour, for bacon, for beef, for butter, for eggs, in fact, for everything which is kept in cold storage. In the meantime there are from thirty to forty million dollars' worth

of food products in these same plants throughout the Dominion—and that is a computation which is based, not on the cost to the consumer, but on the price of the commodities laid down at the storage plants' These latter prices are very different from those charged to WHEAT STALLED IN ELEVATORS.

There is approximately 50,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat in Canadian elevators, which is available for export, and for which at the present there is no export demand. On this the Government has guaranteed the price at \$2.24, and may have to put up part of it. But spite of the large surplus there is no appreciable sign of the price of

On January 1, there were 12,000,000 pounds of butter in cold storage, costing 46 cents a pound laid down in the plants; 38,000,000 pounds of pork, costing 24 to 26 cents a pound; 57,000,000 pounds of beef, costing 17 cents; 9,000,000 pounds of mutton, costing 22 cents; 5,000,000 nds of poultry, costing 32 cents a pound, and 4,000,000 dozen of eggs costing 46 cents a dozen CONSUMER IS "THE GOAT."

As compared with January, 1918, this is an increase in quantity of per cent in butter; of 4 per cent in pork; of 20 per cent in beef; of 78 per cent in mutton, and of 114 per cent in poultry. 




