CENTRAL POWERS DESIRE BRITISH MINISTER IN MURDER-PERIL ENTENTE TO ASK TERMS, WASHINGTON TO BE TOLD

London, Jan. 31.-The German newspapers, according to a Rotterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, intimate that Germany will acknowledge President Wilson's speech in such a way as to encourage the president to continue his efforts in favor of peace. According to the dispatch, Count von Bernstorff has been instructed

to say that Germany is ready to for-mulate peace terms if asked to do so by the Allies, and if there is a possibility of peace negotiations being successfully undertaken. The dispatch adds that Austria has sent a similar communication to the Austrian charge d'affairs at Washing-ton and that it is believed Bulgaria will follow the example of the Teutonic powers.
