St. Petersburg, Feb. 27.-1:35 a.m.-An action of no mean proportions is in progress on the Russian left flank. The advantage thus far is on the side of the Japanese, though at heavy cost. From advices from the front it is difficult to say how severe the losses have been or how decisive the reverse, and whether the Japanese are likely to attempt to drive in the Russian left much farther. Gen. Kuropatkin evidently has been trying to establish his left flank far in advance, to com-mand the crossings of the Taitse River, the operation being a counterpart of Gripenberg's movement on the right flank to secure the fords of the Hun River, preparatory to the break-ing up of the ice in the spring. The scene of the operations is fifty southeast of Mukden, beyond Da Pass, an important defile commanding the road to Fushan. Both armies occupy apparently impregnable positions on e centers, Gen. Kuropatkin evidently planned to inaugurate widely sweeping operations on both flanks, but press dispatches from the front indicate that the weather is fine and favorable for operations, and that all is quiet on the Russian right wing.

Fatal Explosion in a Shaft of Full Guard Posted at Whitehall Whenever Her Majesty Is There.

London, Feb. 27 .- The King has given

instructions that the honors paid to the sovereign by the guards mounted at Whitehall shall in future be given to the Queen as well. During the reign of Queen Victoria a full guard under a captain and subaltern oincer was always on duty during the parliamentary ession, and on the occasion of Queen Victoria's last visit to London a sec-ond subaltern was posted. The King, however, on his accession declared that a full guard should only be detailed when the sovereign was in residence at Buckingham Palace. Lately it was brought to his notice that when he was away from town and the Queen was in London, the full honors were not paid to his consort.

The Silver Stick therefore has issued an order that the guard shall be on duty at Whitehall if the Queen is in London, even though the sovereign shall be absent. Likewise, his majesty has ordered that the royal standard, which has hitherto floated from Buckingham Palace during his residence there, shall be hoisted whenever the Queen is in London. TURBINE ENGINES **ALIMONY DINNER** FAIRIES ENTER FOR THE LINERS GIVEN IN CHICAGO

The Cunard Company's New Divorcees and Brides-To-Be A Society That Tells Children of Venture-Launching of the Monster SS. Caronia.

New York, Feb. 23. - On the 4th of July, 1845, the founders of the Cunard Steamship Company launched their first steamship, symbolizing by the date and by the name, "The Britannia," what swift ocean travel between the United States and Great Britain might be expected to accomplish, chiefly a commercial and a ruary, nearly 60 years later, Washington's birth anniversary, the latest of the steamships of this company was launched, the day being chosen again to symbolize the closeness of the commercial union between the United States and Great Britain.

On Saturday of this week the latest and the largest of the ocean steamships is to sail from Liverpool to the United States, and when that one was launched she was christened by Mrs. Joseph H. Choate, wife of our ambassador to the Court of St. James. The name of this vessel that is soon, if all goes well, to arrive at New York is 'Caronia," and possibly she may be the last of the twin-screw steamers propelled by what were not long ago marvels of marine architecture and machinery, the quadruple expansion engine. This steamship is almost 500 feet in length and has a gross tonnage of 21,000 tons. Her engines are capable of

developing 20,000 horse power. The sister ship that was launched yesterday is to mark a new departure. as 20 years ago the twin screw and the triple expansion engine were new and magnificent developments of marine construction and power producing capacity, and as 40 years ago the single screw was a step in advance of the wooden built craft. The steamship which was launched yesterday is to be equipped with the turbine engine and will be driven by three propellers, each connected by a suitable shaft with an independent engine.

Some of the most competent of the experts continue to be doubtful as to the success of the turbine engine for ocean steamship service. But they learned a lesson from the record made many years ago, in 1839, in fact, when the Great Western steamed across the ocean up New York Harbor, carrying

So the experts now say, not that the turbine engine will prove a failure, but its ability to do all which those who are enthusiastic about it believe it can do. The scientists and inventors have so constructed these ocean-going craft that there is no longer any fear of stress of weather. The latest appliance, a sort of keel, or side board running along the flanks of the steamship, projecting like a shelf, although at an acute angle, has reduced the rolling to a minimum. But there is no conceivable triumph of science by which the pitching of a steamship may be prevented.



The North Sea Finding.

The report of the North Sea Commission is a triumph for Great Britain in more than one respect. It not only upholds the British contention, but it is an immense gain for the cause of arbitration, and with it the cause of peace. The British people, in the heat of indignation over the North Sea outrage, would have supported their Government in going to war, and the jingoes murmured when the offending squadron was allowed to proceed unmolested. Even the Times complained that British maritime prestige had been dealt a heavy blow. If the commission had justified the Russian admiral, the anger of the British nation would have given a setback to the arbitration movement, which might have undone all the good work of the past few years. and perhaps destroyed the usefulness of The Hague tribunal. But Great Britain's forbearance has won for her a greater victory than her navy could have brought her. The neutral nations will be convinced by the verdict that the Russian admiral was wrong, and will do homage to Great Britain for her magnanimity in foregoing the summary vengeance which she might easily have exacted through her naval superiority. The fact that all the neutral all at once. commissioners, French, Austrian, and American, upheld the British contention, is so conclusive that Russia cannot protest.

The Paris newspapers are correct in describing the report as illogical. There is a diplomatic attempt to spare the feelings of Russia by shielding Rojestvensky from the imputation of inhumanity. This is so obvious that it deceives nobody, but Great Britain can well afford to overlook it, knowing the motives that prompted it. As the Petit Journal aptly says, logic has been sacrificed to conciliation. The commissioners have kindly sugar-coated the pill and Russia ought to swallow it without making a wry face.

The Manitoba Voters' Lists.

Allegations are made in the Conservative press that the voters' lists used in the Dominion election in Manitoba were mutilated in the interests of the Liberal party. The matter is capable of explanation. The Dominion law declares that the provincial voters' lists shall be used for elections to the House of Commons, if the lists are not more than a year old. In Manitoba the law provides that the voters' list for the Province shall be revised on the eve of a provincial election, anywhere. which takes place once in four years. In anticipation of a Dominion general election last year, the Conservative Government of Manitoba-without justification-ordered a special registration in May. The object was to take the revision of the lists out of the hands of the Dominion Government. The latter, it was expected, would ignore this improper registration and proceed with a revision on its own account, but this intention was abandoned and the list prepared in May was used last November. This list was prepared for the election to the Legislature in 40 different constituencies, and it had to be adapted to ten Federal constituencies, causing much confusion. This was particularly the case in the Federal constituencies of Provencher and Lisgar, each of which contained a portion of the provincial riding of Rhineland. It was necessary to pick out the names of electors on the Rhineland voters' list who were in the Federal ridings of Lisgar and Provencher. This overlapping of the boundaries of Dominion and provincial ridings therefore involved a great deal of clerical work, and it is possible that mistakes were made, but there is no evidence as yet of a plot to disfranchise Conservative voters. The altera. tions in the lists were rendered necessary by the unwarranted interference of the Provincial Government, who hoped to score a party advantage. An investigation is being made and if there has been dishonest work the public will hear of it.

The Trust War.

The trust issue in the United States is taking on some sensational phases. The Supreme Court having pronounced the beef trust illegal, the great packers are now under indictment in an Illinois court on a charge of criminal conspiracy. Armour, Swift, Cudahy, and other multi-millionaires, have been arraigned like so many felons. These men are able to pay any fine that may be imposed upon them, so that the only adequate punishment will be to send them to jail. The judge who has the courage to pass the sentence may go down in history second only to Lincoln as an emancipator.

Just now Kansas is the great theater of the trust conflict. The Legislature there has declared open war on the Standard Oil Company. It appears that the Standard is the only refiner in the state, and controls all the pipe lines so that it is able to charge oil producers just what it pleases for the conveyance of the crude oil to, its own refineries. It is alleged that the Standard also compelled the railroads to establish prohibitive rates on crude oil so that the producers had to use the Standard pipe lines or nothing. The State Legislature passed a law providing for a state refinery with an output of a thousand barrels per day, operated by convict labor, and another law, making the Standard pipe lines "common carriers" and fixing a uniform rate for the carriage of oil. The Standard retaliated by suspending all operations in Kansas, so that the crude oil producers were compelled to stop

Calcutta, Feb. 27. - Although for many years suttee or sati, to use the modern spelling, has been practically stamped out by the action of the Indian Government, cases occasionally occur. still regarded with approval by many Hindus. The report of the magistrate who committed the perpetrators for trial centains the following passages: "The evidence goes to show that one Chaudri Missir, alias Chattub Hujnissir, a Brahman of Sanchari Vilage, having died recently, arrrangements were made for the cremation of his body at the 'Devi Sthan' of that place, on the banks of a small river. A piece was cut in the ground in the shape of a St. Andrew's Cross, and the funeral pyre was built over it. The body being laid on the pyre, the widow having bathed in the river and adorned herself as for her marriage, took her seat on the pyre, and called on her son, the accused Juggernath Missir, to do his duty as a devout Hindu. Juggernath lighted some wheat stalks and having walked round the pyre

three times, applied, according to

custom, the fire to the mouth of the

deceased "This failed to ignite the pyre, and, it is said, that he and the four Brahmans accused—viz.: Balkinshun Missir Dwarka Missir, Ram Charan Missir, and Lach Man Te Wari-performed the Humad, which consisted of the burning of incense and the placing of lighted chips of wood, dipped in ghee under the pyre until ignited. By this time a vast crowd was assembled. As smoke from the incense ascended, is said to have 'moved' about writhed, and finally to have stood up and turned toward the setting sun, but immediately fell back on the pyre, apparently overcome by the increasing flames, and amidst cries of 'Sat Ran.' London, Feb. 27. - The naval critic of the Daily Telegraph, reviewing the war in the far east this week, says: "In one short year the world has witnessed the crash of Russia's vaulting ambitions in the far east. 
