

Madrid is Now Being Governed Owing to Riots.

Madrid, May 4.—Martial law has been proclaimed here. The newspapers are particularly discontented with the state of affairs existing, as the mere are particularly discontented with the state of affairs existing, as the mere mention of military operations is punishable severely. Groups of people which gather around the spots where the martial law proclamation is posted, promptly disperse, laughing when they read the article prohibiting public gatherings. All interest is now centered in the debates in the Cortes. The proclamation is couched in warlits, language, beginning: —"Whereas, Spain, finding herself at war with the United States, the power of the civil authorities in Spain is suspended; whereas, it is necessary to prevent any impairment of the patriotic efforts which are being made by the nation with manly energy and vertiable enthusiasm. Article 1—A state of siege in Madrid is hereby proclaimed. Article 2—As a consequence of article one, all offences against public order, those of the prees included, will be tried by the military tribunais." Guards at all the public buildings have been doubled. Other troops are confined to barracks.


