

Latin Grammar and Exercises, Latin Reader, Caesar, or Sallust, Virgil's Æneid and Bucolics, Cicero's Select Orations, Roman and Grecian Antiquities and History, Ancient Geography, &c. &c.

COLLEGIATE COURSE.

The Fourth, or Collegiate Course, includes such Studies, in addition to those of the preceding Courses, as will prepare Students for the successive Annual Examinations, requisite for admission to the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, at KING'S COLLEGE, Fredericton.

TERMS.

The next Term will begin on Thursday the 4th January, 1849, and continuing Twenty-four Weeks, end on Wednesday, the 20th June. The Second Term will begin on Thursday the 2d of August, and continuing Nineteen Weeks, end on Wednesday, 12th December.

VACATIONS.

Six Weeks preceding the first Thursday in August, and Three Weeks preceding the first Thursday after the first day of January.

At the end of each Term, to commence on the last Monday, at Nine o'clock, A. M.

Additional Charges will be made for Tuition in the higher Departments, but the expense for Board, &c.

and Tuition, will in no case exceed - - - - £30 per annum. Ten Shillings per week will be charged to those who remain during the Vacations.

The amount of the ordinary expenses must be paid in advance —one half at the beginning, and the remainder at the middle of each Term.

Each Pupil should bring with him :---Not less than three suits of clothes; eight day and three night shirts; six pairs of stockings; two er three pairs of shoes; two hats or caps; also, a cloak, or overcoat; an umbrella; combs and brushes; and a Bible, with marginal reerences.

Parents are particularly requested to send every Article marked with the name of the Pupil in full.

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REMARKS.

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All who design to become Students in this Institution, should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of a Term, as the regular Classes are then organized; pupils, however, will be received at any time.

The only pre-requisites for admission into the Primary Department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable the Pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

The time which will be occupied in the First and Third Courses will depend upon the capacity and industry of the Student.

Certificates will be given, at the close of each Academical Year, to such Students as may have passed satisfactory examinations in all the studies of either Course.

Persons who may not wish to pursue either Course regularly, will be allowed to enter any of the Classes in order for which they are qualified.

Whenever it may be requested by a sufficient number of Students, Classes will be instructed in French, Book-Keeping, Land Surveying, Navigation, Analytical Geometry, Calculus, &c. &c.

The Institution is furnished with Maps, Globes, Chemical, Philosophical and Astronomical Apparatus, &c. &c.

Several valuable Instruments were purchased by the Principal during his recent visit to England. Among these are a beautiful Achromatic Telescope, the object glass of which is of three and a quarter inches aperture; an Oxy-hydrogen Microscope; a pair of superior Magic Lanterns for illustrating facts in Astronomy, Natural History, &c. &c.

The LIBRARY, which has been enriched during the year by the addition of many standard works, now contains two thousand well selected Volumes. Lectures will be delivered upon the different branches of Natural Science, &c.

Every effort will be made to secure cheerful diligence in application to study. The object will be not only to instruct, but to educate : not only to impart useful knowledge, but to fix good habits. No reaonable exertions will be spared in giving a thorough and symmetrical training to all the mental and raoral powers, and in avoiding the too common error of cultivating the intellect at the expense of the heart. The course of training will be directed, as far as possible, to the formation of an intelligent, efficient and manly character, suited to the duties and responsibilities of active life.

Every reasonable precaution will be used to preserve a healthy state of moral feeling. It is determined that no one shall continue in the Academy whose character and habits are found to exert an *influence* unfavourable to good morals or good order.

The government will be strictly parental. The Governor and Principal will reside in the same Building with the Students. Daily records of scholarship and conduct will be made with great care.

Parents and Guardians are *earnestly advised* that the lads should be furnished *very sparingly*, if at all, with spending money. Money sufticient to meet incidental expenses should be lodged with the Governor and Chaplain of the Institution, or with some other responsible person.

SACKVILLE is a retired country village, pleasant and healthy, and easy of access from all parts of the Lower Provinces.

The Academical Building is elegant, spacious, and comfortable, and delightfully situated.

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
