





1913 To Be a Year of Blood.

A Paris cable says: It was Mme. de Thebes who last November predicted war in the Balkans, an epidemic and other strange things. Many have come true. Mme. de Thebes, referring to 1912, called it a black year.

Fuller's Earth.

The cleansing properties of fuller's earth are not as well known as they should be. When grease has been spilt on the carpet make a paste with boiling water and equal part of fuller's earth and magnesia, apply to the stain while hot and allow to dry.
