to sell him a kitchen range for \$60.
The farmer doesn't want it. The agents
persuade him that it is the best thing out
and that they will take his old stove at
\$12 in part payment and also that they
will board at his place for two weeks
and pay him \$10 a week for themselves
and horse, which will take \$32 off the
price of the stove. The farmer concludes
to take it and the crafty agent persuades
him to sign a note for the full amount
of the range, \$60. This done, they make
their exit and neither take the old stove
nor wait to board for two weeks at \$10
a week.

One of the most honored names of the Polyglot Patrimony is that of Khama chief of the Bechuanaland. The Aborigines Friend is a journal of the transactions of the Aborigines Protection Society and we note with anxiety the report in a recent number of that magazine that the chartered company favors such interference with the present arrangement for the prohibition of all strong drinks in Khama's country as will enable English and others travelling in that country to gratify their tastes in this respect.
