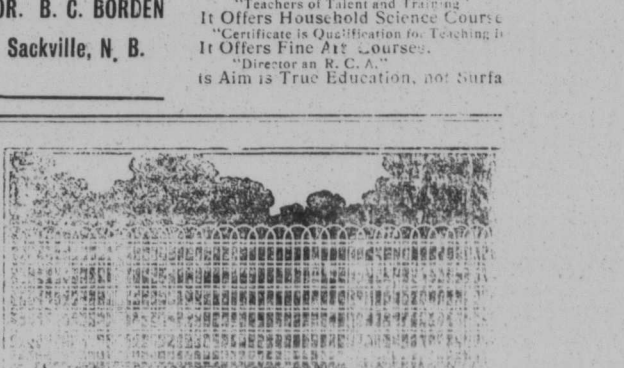

THE BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA.

The Bank of Nova Scotia presents another characteristic report for the year 1910. The net profits are given as \$662,301, and with a balance brought forward gave the directors a sum of \$707,166 to deal with. The 12 per cent. dividend took \$360,000; then \$150,000 was transferred to the reserve; \$125,000 was written off the bank premises item; \$25,000 was given to the officers' pension fund, and \$5,000 for the relief of the Campbellton sufferers, and \$42,166 was carried forward. The action in regard to the reserve raises that fund to \$5,650,000, the capital being \$3,000,000. The other features of the statement are also suggestive of the strength and careful management that has made the attainment of such a position possible. The Bank of Nova Scotia has expanded very rapidly during the last few years, and the statement this year is considered one of the most gratifying yet presented to the public.—Gleaner.

ANNUAL MEETING OF DIVISION

North Shore Sons of Temperance Propose Drastic Amendments to License Laws.

The annual meeting—twenty-first quarterly session—of the Kent and Northumberland District Division of the Sons of Temperance took place at Harcourt yesterday afternoon, Rev. R. H. Stewart in the chair. The officers and delegates present were: Harcourt Division, No. 438—District Worthy Patriarch, Rev. R. H. Stewart, Councillor David W. Clark, Rev. E. H. Creed, Principal Guy Patterson, Miss Maud Smallwood, Miss Debbie Rexton, No. 419—District Outside Sentinel, H. M. Ferguson, J. P. Newcastle, No. 45—District Scribe H. H. Stuart, Caledonia, No. 126, Douglstown—Harold C. Stothart. The Grand Worthy Patriarch, E. S. Houtiger, of St. John was present at the session.

Visiting members from Harcourt Division included L. J. Wathen, J. P.; Lloyd Wathen, H. W. Wylie, Misses Jessie P. Dunn, Debbie E. Lamkey, Belle Lamkey, Eva Watson and others. Committees were appointed as follows: On State of the Order—L. J. Wathen, H. M. Ferguson, H. C. Stothart. Program—Miss Jessie P. Dunn, Miss Debbie Lamkey, Principal Patterson, Rev. E. H. Creed.

The D. W. P.'s report showed that during quarter just ended and during the year much progress had been made along Temperance lines in the District, as well as in the world outside. By petition the ratepayers of Wellington parish had declared almost unanimously against license, and in Richibucto the only remaining parish in Kent where liquor selling is licensed, a plebiscite had been granted for next fall. Prospects were bright for the reorganization of the dormant divisions at McLaughlin Road, Beersville and several other places. Report was received and adopted. The District Scribe gave the following comparative statement of the membership of the different divisions.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Order was received and adopted. "We have gone over the reports of the work done by the Divisions in the District, also the work done by the friends of temperance throughout Kent and Northumberland and find the temperance sentiment is on the increase.

"In Harcourt we find local option a grand success, although we find there are a few individuals who continue to risk the violation of the law by bringing a few bottles of liquor and disposing of them to their confidential friends.

"In the Parish of Wellington we are pleased to report that eighty-two per cent. of the ratepayers have petitioned the government for local option; and also that the Municipality of Kent, in response to a largely signed petition, have made provision for the taking a vote of the ratepayers of the Parish of Richibucto at the next Municipal Election, whether or not License shall be granted for the sale of liquor in that Parish.

"We find Northumberland is growing stronger in the Temperance work and trust the good work may continue.

"We would that the District Division pledge itself to render Richibucto to all the assistance possible in their efforts to obtain local option."

AMENDMENTS TO LIQUOR LAWS ENDORSED

It was moved by H. H. Stuart and seconded by Harold C. Stothart. "That this Kent—Northumberland District Division in annual convention assembled request.

1—The Dominion Government to so amend the Canada Temperance Act as to provide that:

"(a) No liquor shall be imported into a District under the Canada Temperance Act by private individuals, all liquors required for legal purposes to be purchased from Vendors appointed by the said Government and residing within such district.

"(d) That all persons arrested for drunkenness be compelled to tell where and from whom they obtained their liquor, imprisonment to be the penalty for those refusing to tell.

"(e) That each government Vendor of alcoholic liquors be required to annually publish a complete statement of business done by him during the year.

"(d) That the privilege of obtaining prescriptions for liquor from Medical men residing outside of district under Canada Temperance Act be done away, the only exception to be the case in which the medical man nearest to the patient resides in an adjoining municipality.

**COUNCIL MEETING**

On Monday evening 16th inst., Mayor Murray presided at a small meeting of the Council there being present at the opening Councillors Mowat, Miller and Alexander,—a bare quorum.

Town clerk read the minutes of previous meeting which were confirmed—at which time Coun. White entered the meeting.

Communication read from A. W. Campbell chairman of Board of Management, Intercolonial Railway relative to closing of Sugar Loaf street, which was laid on the table.

Letter from F. M. Murray, re the cancellation of a coal schooner's charter, offering settlement for \$21,35 which was referred to Electric Lighting Committee.

Letter from W. H. Gray asking permit for water and sewerage for his new building on O'Leary St. Referred to water and sewerage committee. The mayor read letter from Premier Hazen relative to the promise of the Provincial Legislature to provide a sum of \$5,000 for 10 years or an equivalent in a lump-sum for the purpose of paying the bonded interest of the town.

This was handed to the Finance Committee.

On report of the Assessment Committee, the following reductions were made from the assessed value of land on W. H. Gray—\$700 reduction,—D. H. Lunan \$500 reduction, Chas. Audette \$100 reduction. The case of Robert Connell was continued on recommendation of committee although the assessed value was found to be correct.

The Police and License committee recommended payment of accounts totalling \$13.50. Agreed.

The Finance Committee recommended payment of accounts totalling \$121.89. Agreed.

Councillor Miller moved, and Councillor Mowat seconded, "that the sums of money to be apportioned to the town by the government be placed in the bank of Nova Scotia to bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum compounded quarterly, to be used for the payment of the present bonded indebtedness subject to legislation hereinafter to be enacted by the legislature of New Brunswick."

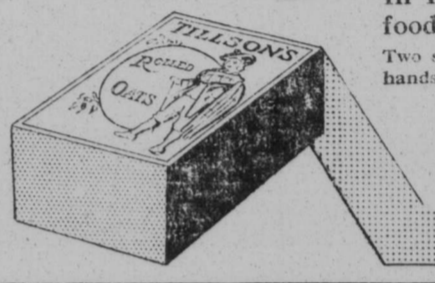
Carried. After long discussion as to ways and means, Councillor Miller moved, and Councillor Alexander seconded the following motion—"whereas the town treasurer's salary for the current fiscal year only amounts to \$673.76 resolved that the council make him a special grant of \$495."

Carried. In answer to questions, Solicitor MacKenzie gave it as his opinion that the I. C. R. had power themselves to close Sugarloaf street, but that the Railway Board wanted to put the onus of closing the street on the Council.

Councillor Mowat, and Solicitor MacKenzie were instructed to appear at the present session of the County Council, and oppose in toto the resolution recently voted by that body for the town of Campbellton.

This being all the business Council adjourned.

wick Government
(a) To prohibit the importation of alcoholic liquors by any person or persons into any non-license district in said province.
(b) That all persons arrested for drunkenness, whether in license or non-license districts, be compelled to tell where and from whom they obtained their liquor imprisonment to be the penalty for those refusing to tell.
(c) That the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, the Grand Lodge of the I. O. G. T., the provincial W. C. T. U., and the N. B. Temperance Federation be asked to give this District Division their endorsement and assistance in the matter.
This resolution was considered section by section, each section and finally the resolution as a whole, passing unanimously.
Next session will be held in Newcastle in April, exact date left to executive.
