The Airplane as a Decoy. Ever since wars have been waged man has made use of decoys to outwit the foe. Even in the recent war a decoy proved to be useful once in a while. An instance occurred at a point on the western front where the British trenches faced a salient of the German trench system. At the time when the British staff determined to reduce the salient, the Daily Chronicle tells us, the Germans were expecting an ordinary attack with its primary bombardment. They promptly fell into the trap set for them.

Early in the morning a British airplane flew very low over the front-line trenches and passed parallel to the German line, but 500 or 600 yards behind it. The Germans thought the plane a target that could not be missed, and turned their backs on the British trenches to fire on the machine. While they were engaging the airplane, the British infantry suddenly went over the top and in a few minutes captured the position and took a number of pris-

oners.

The machine returned to its airdrome riddled with bullet holes, but both the pilot and the observer were uninjured.

Industry Overdone.



Fertilizers For The Potato Crop

Of all ordinary farm crops that of he potato is probably the most proitably responsive to liberal feeding. The acceptance of this statement does not in the least ignore the fact that there are several other factors that play a very important part to-ward success in potato growing, type of soil, character of season and the cultivation and spraying of the crop, but it means that with these factors favourable the crop is a very responsive one to applications of plant food and that the yield will be approximately commensurate with the available plant food supply.

It is generally conceded that there no better preparation for the crop than a clover or alfalfa sod well nanured (10 to 20 tons per acre) and oloughed in the late summer or early autumn. This practice of fall plough manure and provides a good supply of humus which is so useful in keep ing the soil moist, and at the same time allows for the preparation of plant food in forms available for the use of the crop. Spring dressings of manure are not desirable, as they end to encourage the development of scab.

As is well recognized, soils differ greatly as to their productiveness, a quality largely dependent upon richness in available ptant food, indeed there are no two soils exactly alike it impossible to lay down hard and fast directions for fertilizing or to give a formula that would be equally applicable for all soils. But with a fairly good soil, from a well manured clover sod as described, we should consider 350 to 700 pounds of 3; 9; 6; commercial fertilizer would represent the limits that may be deemed desirable and profitable. This would mean an application of mitrogen 10½ to 21 pounds, of phosphoric acid 31½ to 63 pounds and of potash 21 to 42 pounds, per acre. If the ingredients are purchased rather than the ready mixed fertilizers, (generally the more economical plan) the amounts would be nitrate of soda 75 to 150 pounds, super phosphate 200 to 400 pounds and sulphate of potash 40 to 80 pounds per acre. On light and very poor soils scantly manured the maximum amounts here given may be some what raised, dressings to 1000 pounds or more per acre frequently proving profitable. For soils rich in nitrogen, as from clover and liberal manuring, the nitrogen in the above recommendations may be cut down one third. On clay loams the potash may likewise be reduced one third.

It is considered good practice by many experienced potato growers to supply a part of the nitrogen in the form of an organic nitrogenous fer tilizer, as dried blood. As both fer tilizers contain approximately same percentage of nitrogen may readily be done by an replacing half the nitrate of soda in the above recommendations by an equal weigh

Probably the best plan of applica tion is to broadcast the fertilizer mixture on the prepared land when reworked in the spring and harrow in. If the method of putting the fer tilizer in the drill or furrows is con sidered more direct and more econ omical, care should be taken that the fertilizer does not come into direct contact with the sets.







Good Winter For N.B. Lumbermen

In an interview with a Standard re orter, last Wednesday evening, W B Snowball, of Chatham, stated that this winter had been an exceptionally good one for lumbermen on the North Shore and that probably this year's cut will exceed that of last by at least twenty five per cent.

The wharves and yards along the liramichi are piled high with Admiralty and other overseas stock which will have to be moved early in ne spason to enable the shipping of this year's cut which is destined largely for the American market.

Prices in the lath market are very high this year, from \$14 to \$15 a thousand is being offered for round wood laths, and quite a few mills have already started sawing. Mr. Snowball said this is the first year that such operations have ever been conducted along the Miramichi, but he prevalent high prices have afford ed operators an opportunity to dis se of the smaller logs in this man er at a good profit.

Mr. Snowball said that the bulk of the cut would go to the States, not withstanding the unfavcrable rate of exchange, for the Americans would pay the rate themselves The last storm with its heavy fall

of snow has assured good brook driving, and as everything else has been favorable, the lumbermen are looking to a very successful year.

Asked as to whether the industrial unrest had reached the lumbe camps, Mr. Snowball said that agita tion didn't reach the tall timbers: wages were high there, from 15 to 20 per cent. over last year, and men
