HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Tuesday, April 5.

Continued

The house on motion resolved itself into Committee of the Whole on Liquefying Liquors Bill. Dr Skelton in the chair.

Hon Mr Winter in moving the adoption of the bill, said he did not think it necessary to make any further observations concerning it. The objections that have been raised as to the Bill dividing the towns in which it might be enforced into sections, can have but little weight, as is apparent from the face of the Bill, that it must operate throughout the whole of such town or settlement.

Mr Kent—He had already stated that he would like to see some measure introduced, here, which would have the effect of accomplishing some good in this matter. This he believed the present Bill would undoubtedly fail to do. Instead of advancing temperance, he believed it would be creative of a great deal of intemperance. Moral suasion was, however the effectual means of attaining the end in view, and men cannot by statute be made amenable to these moral laws.

Mr Parsons considered that it was most injudicious to pass this Bill.

The Chairman Board of Works regarded this Bill as a good and wise one, and quite failed to understand the objections that had been raised by several hon gentlemen opposite.

Hon Surveyor General considered that the Bill had not presented itself to the house in an acceptable shape.

Hon Receiver General—Although the hon Surveyor General has challenged the wisdom of this measure, still he must contend that it was a good Bill, and he knew from his own experience that it had worked most beneficially at Bay de Verd.

Hon the Speaker would support the present measure because, in the first place; he was a firm believer in the efficacy of local laws and secondly, because the sense of a large majority of his constituents approved of it.

Mr Penney desired a correct statement to the effect that wherever the Permissive Bill was in operation it was violated with impunity.

Mr O'Mara—it has been asserted outside and insinuated inside this house that his views in this matter are guided by electors in St John's East and in deference to the views of these parties he was giving his opposition to the Bill.

The first section of the Bill was then read, and upon the hon Mr Winter moving that the first section do pass there appeared against this section a majority of the House, so it passed in the negative.

Hon Mr Winter—As some hon members have thought fit to defeat this first section of this Bill, he did not think it necessary to move the reading of the other sections, but before the count rose he wished to offer a few observations. Hon members who voted against this Bill have defeated it for the present, but he could assure these hon members, and the house, and the country at large interested in the cause of temperance, that there was not the slightest intention of dropping the Bill, he would reiterate that in spite of the present adverse opinion of this house, the measure, though now defeated, was not killed, and the Bill will be brought forward until it was ultimately carried, so that every small harbor and settlement throughout the country would be able to rid themselves of the nuisance and curse of public houses.

Hon Receiver General considered that the vote given, though adverse to the measure was a victory for the cause of temperance. He believed that such a vote would have the effect of rousing up the friends of total abstinence whose feelings and sympathies would be so roused by the vote of tonight as to make them put forth their full strength and make an extended effort for the suppression of public houses.

The Committee then rose.

On motion of Mr Parsons the Bill to amend the Law relating to Suits by Minors in Inferior Courts was read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

On motion of hon Receiver General the Indemnity Bill was read a first

time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr Scott gave notice that he would on to-morrow, ask the Chairman of the Board of Works who were the contractors under the Sanitary Act for 1880, if there are any contracts or arrangements made under that Act for 1881, and if so, what are they, and with whom made.

Also, that he would, on to-morrow, ask to have laid on the table of the house, a detailed statement of the various charges on account of Court Houses and Goals under head of Wages Harbor Grace Gaol and Raterford & Co. for blankets for Harbor Grace Gaol amounting to \$149.

The house then adjourned till half-past three to-morrow.

Wednesday, April 6.

The house opened to-day pursuant to adjournment at half-past three o'clock.

PETITIONS

Hon Mr Shea presented a petition from Nathaniel Parsons and others, of Harbor Grace, praying for a grant of money to enable them to make a road to their farms on the South Side.

Mr Norman presented a petition from the inhabitants of Brigus upon an important subject connected with the fishery of this country. In moving that this petition be laid on the table he begged to state that it had his most cordial support.

Mr Watson had much pleasure in supporting the prayer of the important petition just presented by the hon member for Brigus, Mr Norman.

Premier had listened with great pleasure to the observations of his hon colleague, Mr Watson and had equal pleasure in giving his support to the prayer of the petition presented and spoken to by the hon member for Brigus, Mr Norman.

Receiver General supported the prayer of the petition.

Mr Goodridge—The petition had his hearty and entire support, and he had much pleasure in endorsing the able and vigorous remarks of Mr Watson upon that, and upon the kindred subject of the size of the mesh to be used in cod traps.

Mr Shea saw no reason to offer against the appointment of a Committee as suggested by the hon Premier, to enquire into and report upon the subject matter of the petition, but he was sorry he could not see at present that any practical or beneficial result would thereby be attained.

Mr O'Mara presented several petitions from residents in Torbay and other settlements in the district of St John's East, praying for grants of money to open up and repair roads, and for the construction of bridges in these localities.

Mr Parsons also presented several petitions from various localities in St John's eastern district on the subject of roads and bridges.

Ordered that these several petitions do lie on the table.

Hon Attorney General presented a petition from Rev Arthur Wagborne and other inhabitants of New Harbor, Dildo Arm and Green's harbor, Trinity Bay, praying that no delay should be allowed to interfere with the carrying out of the construction of the railway in this country.

Mr Parsons presented a petition from James Wheeler and others, of Torbay Road, on the subject of the improvement of the main road.

MOTION RELATIVE TO THE FISHERY AWARD.

Mr Kent pursuant to the order of the day, moved, seconded by Mr O'Mara, that it is the opinion of this house that the interest on Halifax Fishery Award should be this year as heretofore appropriated for the purpose of such public improvements in the several electoral districts of the colony as may be determined by the legislature.

In moving the foregoing resolutions Mr Kent observed that he had called the attention of the house to the subject of the Fishery Award before on several occasions, and in spite

Mr Scott was opposed to the further maintenance of the force. The circumstances of the colony do not require it.

Hon the Premier did not at present intend to offer any remarks to the propriety of further maintaining this particular force. It had been disposed of at once, as far as the session is concerned. They have had a discussion upon it, and the majority of the House believed it expedient to continue it. In referring to the present Inspector of the Police and the anonymous newspaper articles that have been recently published against him, he should say that for a considerable period he has had a great deal to do with gentlemen, and he did not like to say that a more efficient officer does not exist in the colony.

Mr Little was very happy to hear from the hon Attorney General that the condition of the police force was of so satisfactory a character. It was most gratifying to him, having participated in its institution.

Mr Farons felt glad that he took exception to this vote, if for no other reason than in having elicited so satisfactory an appreciation and recognition of the conduct of the Inspector of Police.

The vote then passed, The Chairman then reported from the Committee that they had agreed to the Bill.

Ordered that the Bill be engrossed and read a third time to-morrow.

The House then resolved itself into Committee of the whole on the Bill to amend the Harbor Grace Water Company Act.

Mr Saint in the chair.

The Chairman reported from the committee that they had considered the Bill referred to them and had made some amendments which he was directed to report to the House. These amendments having been read a first and second time were, upon the question being put, agreed to by the House.

Ordered that the Bill as amended be engrossed and read a third time to-morrow.

The House then adjourned till half past three o'clock to-morrow.

Friday, April 8.

Pursuant to adjournment the House opened at half past three o'clock.

The House upon motion of the hon Receiver General was resolved into Committee of the whole upon the Indemnity Bill.

Mr Parsons objected to every vote in detail, and at great length animadverted upon the inexpediency of pending money under Executive authority, and thus robbing the House of its legitimate functions.

Mr Little considered the subject before the chair one of the most important of the session involving as it did the expenditure of \$36,000 upon no legal authority.

Mr Kent said advertising to the sums of money spent on Executive responsibility, that there appeared under the figures that would point to the increase of salaries. There was one charge of the account of Alexander Reid, for extra services, and for Judges of the District Courts for services and travelling expenses and other matters of a similar character which ought to receive explanation.

Hon Receiver General in explanation said that the money paid Mr Reid was for extra work concerning documents connected with the Financial Secretary's department that had to be furnished to Assembly, and other work which compelled him to remain in his office late at night. Judge Conroy and Judge Prowse have to hold Court in Bay Bulls, Witless Bay, Killisnoy, Holywood and Harbour Main. For this work they receive \$400 per annum. The establishment of a court in these places was of great convenience to the people and met with general approval. These officials also receive an allowance to defray the expenses of cab-hire. Judge Bennett of the Harbor Grace Court, holds court fortnightly at Hearts Content and Bay Roberts. On his session petitions were presented from these places asking for the appointment of a Magistrate, necessitating an expenditure of at least \$1600 by the present arrangement there was a considerable saving of expenditure. There is also a charge here for subsidy to the Cromwell Line. The amount was small in comparison with the advantages it bestowed upon the trade and the general public.

Mr Penney moved that a Select committee be appointed to consider the desirability of legislation concerning the use of cod-traps.

Mr Scott said respecting the matter of the Molybean fields, that his reason for asking the question was for the purpose of drawing the attention of the Government to an article that appeared in the Maine Mining Journal.

Hon the Premier said that the notice which the hon member for Saint John's West has given is as follows:— I (Mr Scott) give notice that I will on to-morrow ask the hon and learned Premier whether the attention of the Government has been drawn to a paragraph which appeared in the Maine Mining Journal of the 25th of March 1882, of which paragraph the following is a copy—

"The State Department at Washington has issued a warning to capitalists against investing in the newly discovered Molybean fields near Bay des Isles on the west coast of Newfoundland. This tract is included in guarantee to the French fishermen by the Treaty of Versailles in 1735 and the same declaration expressly forbids the erection of any stationary buildings thereon. The State Department deems this warning sufficient to prevent speculators from running the risk which would follow the infringement of the rights guaranteed the French in this respect, and whether it is the intention of the Government to take any steps to counteract the effect of such notice on our mining interest, and if any correspondence have taken place between the Governments, and if so to lay the same on the table.

In reply the hon Premier said that the attention of the Government had been called to the paragraph in question by Messrs Garrett Dooly and Charles Hutchins, who are the licensees of land referred to, upon which the following communication from Colonial Secretary was addressed to them—

Secretary's Office, 4th April, 1881.

Dear Sirs,— You have drawn my attention to a paragraph in the Maine Mining Journal of the 25th March last.

I beg to state in reference to this paragraph that the fishery rights of the French are limited to the coast, that the land styled the 'Molybean Fields' in the Valley of the Lumber, is well inland, and remote from the strand to which alone the privileges of the French apply, the French, therefore, possess no rights which can interfere with the use of the land in question.

These persons are at liberty to make use of this document in the way best calculated to remove any erroneous impression that may have been created by the paragraph in question. But in case that further action should be necessary, representation should be made to the Imperial Government with a view to bringing the matter under the attention of the American Government.

The House then adjourned till Tuesday next.

Tuesday, April 19.

The House opened to-day pursuant to adjournment at half past three o'clock.

Speaker in the chair.

Hon the Premier rose and said, we have to-day received tidings across the Atlantic of a most melancholy character. The cable has flashed to us the intelligence of the death of one of the greatest modern statesmen, one who with distinguished ability and rare success presided during many years over the destinies of the greatest empire on the face of the globe. As an evidence of our regret for Lord Beaconsfield, and as a spontaneous tribute of respect for his memory, he would move the immediate adjournment of the House.

Mr Little supported the motion.

The motion was then put and carried unanimously.

The House adjourned till half past three o'clock to-morrow.

Wednesday, April 20.

House opened at half past three.

The Report was, upon motion, received and adopted.

Mr Watson gave notice that on to-morrow he will move that the Select Committee on the question of the desirability of legislation on the subject of cod-traps used in this colony be empowered to sit and take evidence after the termination of the present session, and to report to this House at the next session of the Assembly.

Hon Receiver General gave notice that he will move on to-morrow that the Committee appointed to enquire into the present system of carrying female passengers engaged in the Labrador fishery be empowered to sit and take evidence after the termination of this House at the next session of this Assembly.

THE LATE FIRE IN BRIGUS.

In the discharge of our duty as a public journalist, we some time since called the attention of the people of Brigus to the necessity of taking early action for the purpose of securing the great public boon of protection against the ravages of fire. In doing so we acted in accordance with the convictions of that necessity forcibly impressed upon us during our various visits to that picturesque and important town, recognizing as we did, the imminent risk and peril to which life and property were exposed in the event of serious conflagration threatening a settlement so populous and in every way so liable at any moment to the most disastrous consequences. From the establishment of this journal our efforts were most strenuously directed to the accomplishment of the same object for Carbonear, where happily, thanks to the heartfelt and enlightened co-operation of its

people those efforts were crowned with the most perfect success. Having the qualification of thus witnessing the realization of our most anxious desires for the protection of the public interests in this respect, we next directed the attention of the people of Brigus to the attainment of the same object, in the hope that by doing so they might be induced to profit by the example of their Carbonear neighbors. The words of salutary advice and warning addressed to the people of Brigus were however so far permitted to pass unheeded but the danger then so vividly portrayed, has since no doubt been more forcibly impressed upon their attention by the fire which has occurred within the past few days. This timely lesson fortunately limited in its destructive consequences, will it is most earnestly to be hoped, prove an incentive to the inhabitants of Brigus to immediate and effective action towards obtaining at as early a date as possible, that means so essentially requisite to the protection of their lives and properties, namely, a powerful engine, backed by a well organized and effective Fire Company. To the furtherance of an object so conducive to the public interests we shall only be too happy to devote our columns, and shall feel amply repaid in the future, by the consciousness of having by our efforts, contributed to secure for the people of Brigus the benefits and advantages now happily enjoyed by those of Carbonear.

Local and other Items.

We understand that a Customs seizure was made on a quantity of shingles landed from the Aurora on the night or early morning of her arrival from Bridgewater. It appears the shingles were discovered in a lot each at Southside, Burnthead and Freshwater, having been smuggled to these places by the crew of the above mentioned vessel. The shingles are now under Her Majesty's Lock.

We were more than amused on last Saturday to see a gentleman of the police force pitching buttons, or coppers, we are not positive which, as we were too much surprised to make an investigation, but he continued until stopped by another member of the force who was not doing his duty when he did not arrest this obstructor of the public thoroughfare and by one who ought to shew good example. We do not know what the public may feel inclined to call it in French, but gentlemen it looks bad in uniform. The argus eye was on him, so Peter says.

Everything seems to be pushing in town, so much so that the Road Board have been; we understand, the whole week trying to muster all their numerous and influential members together. We requested an immediate answer from them on a certain point and we have waited double the time specified and still no answer came. Now, if the Chairman and Inspector have not influence enough to form a quorum, it is time for the Government or the public to form a new Road Board; men approaching their dotage should not be allowed to impose on a public like this, and John Burke,

Esq., is to blame, and not the Government, as he tries to control everything in this influential town, but it is for this session only—go it, old man; but no pension will follow.

The Lothair, Captain Joyce arrived on Sunday, from Sydney with a cargo of coal.

The Annabella, Captain Pike, and owned by J & R Maddock arrived from St Anthony, on Wednesday, cargo of fish.

The Laodamia left for St John's on Wednesday after selling a large portion of her cargo in town, consisting of Oats Potatoes and Butter.

We have been informed the Rev R Hanley proceeded up the Bay this week on a visit to his brethren of Harbor Main.

The Flash, Captain Pike, and owned by Messrs Penney Bros., left yesterday morning for the Labrador with a cozy breeze out the Bay.

Constable Snook have been successful in getting together and putting in the hands of the Sub-Collector all the shingles known to be smuggled from the Aurora.

The eagle eye of the Herald was on the St John's gents who accompanied the H. G. gallant to this town on Thursday night. Fast men, we are watching.

We have been informed on the highest authority that there is not the slightest doubt but the Rev. R. McDonald will be consecrated Bishop of Harbor Grace within a month or so.

We are credibly informed that Mr. P. Dwyer, who met with an accident some time since, which might have proved serious, is fast recovering under the skilful treatment of Dr. Martin.

We have been informed that our old friend Rev S. Flynn, P. P., Fortune Harbor, have been spending a time at the residence of J B Tobin, Esq., he may be expected to arrive here next Plover.

Very little improvement have been reported concerning the cod-fishery in our Bay the past week. On the lower part of the north shore, from Western Bay down, a great many salmon have been taken.

The French steamer Raphael, Capt. Dulac, twelve days from Havre, put in here this morning short of coal. The Raphael will proceed to Labrador for the purpose of collecting a cargo of salmon and trout.—Telegram.

A subscriber wants to know the reason why the Sergeant let two pigs out of pound without enforcing the law laid down for his guidance; also why the law with regard to the pound-ing of goats is not enforced.

A report reached town on Wednesday last, to the effect that His Lordship Bishop McCarthy, formerly Parish Priest of Cork, have been requested to accept the vacancy at Harbor Grace. Our informant states that an item to that effect have appeared in Tablet.

We are eagerly watching a certain firm who ought to take more care of their ships' medicine chests, and save a fine of four hundred dollars, that's all—old times are passed and cannot be recalled—that is the days of salts and sassa and castor oil medicine chests we mean and nothing more.

The Oleander, Captain Leary, arrived to Messrs. Duff & Balmer on Tuesday evening from the Bank fishery with 1000 qtls green fish. We congratulate Messrs Duff and Balmer on the so far success of their Bankers and hope soon to see the Henry West arrive with equally as good a catch.

The American banker Edger S. Foster Capt. Whitehouse, arrived from the Banks this morning, with 120 qtls. green fish. The Capt reports fish plenty on the banks and at the time he hove up yesterday six other bankers were in sight.

The Oleander came from Freshwater yesterday where she landed her fish, turning out 924 qtls. weighing 24 to the draft.

We have been informed by one of Mr Pendicowsky's Attorneys that he (Pedicowsky) will be liberated on the 8th of June, and the sentence of transportation will not be enforced owing, we believe to the creditable manner in which he conducted himself since his arrest. He purposes residing at St John's where a large amount of work has already been offered him. His Attorney may be expected here shortly to settle his business and collect his debts.

The Elizabeth McLea, Capt Bate, of Bristol, arrived this morning from Cadz via St. Michaels, with cargo, sst, to Hon John Rorke. The Elizabeth McLea left Cadz 23th March, and reached out in Longshore 33, on the 13th April, when she experienced heavy north west gales in which she had her decks swept, carrying away, boats, galleys and bulwarks, and unfortunately two seamen named respectively, John Smale and Henry Jenaa, both of Clevedy, Devonshire were washed overboard and drowned.

In the Supreme Court the Case of Ryan vs Shelgrove, for breach of agreement, trespass, &c., occupied the whole of Thursday and Friday, when it was finally settled by a verdict for Plaintiff of £18:5d.

The case of Duchemin against Nash was at last closed yesterday evening by a verdict for Mr. Duchemin of \$277.80. This prosecution appears to have been regarded with an extra degree of interest partly perhaps because of the novelty of its character, here, and partly that it has taken three trials to dispose of it. Nearly two years ago Mr. Duchemin and some of his family sustained severe injuries from being thrown from a carriage on the Topshill road. The accident was caused by a heap of earth which the defendant Nash, as contractor with the Board of Works, should have removed.

Mr. Duchemin on two occasions sued the Board, instead of the contractor, for damage, and failed; for though, the jury pronounced in his favor, the court held that accountability lay with the contractor, and not with the Board. The third trial, directed against Nash, has brought the Plaintiff's contention to the amount above stated.—Newfoundland.

Late accounts from Fortune Bay say that herring have been plentiful there all this spring. About thirty tankers, French, American, and local, obtained their bait from nets during the close season, and three hundred schooners and boats have been employed in the French bait trade.

of the protests of hon members of this House that award has been swallowed up in the general revenue. Last year there were some various appropriations for the various districts to the extent of \$1500 each. The allocation of \$1000 to each district out of the interest of that award would at present be more appreciated than in any former year, owing to the distress and poverty which it is impossible to meet or alleviate out of the regular special grant. The money interest accruing from the fishery award constituted a special fund sacred to special purposes. It ought not to be diverted from the channel through which it was intended to flow. The result of the present action of the present action of the Receiver General would be that a fund which should be kept apart for the purposes indicated will be swallowed up in the main stream of the general revenue. He would therefore move the resolution which affirmed the principle formerly adopted by the house, but leaving the power to the Legislature hereafter to determine in what particular manner the money shall be appropriated.

Mr Scott had much pleasure in seconding the motion, and he considered it ought to meet with the approval of the house.

Mr O'Mara had much pleasure in according his support to the course of action proposed by his hon and learned colleague.

Mr Greene regretted the action of the Government with regard to this matter. So far as the district of Ferryland was concerned, their grants would be entirely inadequate without their proportion of this sum.

Receiver General regretted that he could not concur with the views expressed by the preceding speakers. If the course proposed by the hon and learned member for St John's East (Mr Kent) were accepted, it would necessitate the increase of taxation. Neither the events of the past, nor the prospects of the future, could warrant them in the adoption of such a course without levying an additional and unpopular impost. Hon gentlemen on both sides of the house were opposed to any further taxation under present circumstances, and therefore he would not admit the expediency of the action proposed by hon gentlemen opposite.

Mr Little considered it bad policy on the part of the Receiver General to endeavor to absorb the interest on the Fishery Award, and treat it as an ordinary item of duty on merchandise. The Resolution was then put and lost.

WATER COMPANY BILL.

Hon Mr Winter said, with regard to the Water-Company Bill that it was merely to supply a defect that appeared to exist in the Act respecting special appraisements. There is a clause in that Act allowing special appraisements between the terminal appraisements, on a such property as becomes subject to assessment during that interval. There is at the present time, a large number of houses that ought properly to be subject to the operation of that Act, and although there is a provision in it for an appraisement it does not provide for sufficient machinery to bring it into force.

The Bill was ordered to be read a second time to be committed to a committee of the whole house to-morrow.

Mr Parsons moved the second reading of the Bill relating to minor suits in the district courts. At the present time minors cannot sue summarily in the district courts, but must take the legal proceedings in the Supreme Court, entailing additional costs and subjecting them to considerable inconvenience. Minors always had the right now sought to be conferred until 1872 when the Act was, no doubt, unintentionally omitted from the consolidated statutes. Supposing a small debt of three or four poun being due to a minor he is obliged by the present law, to wait till the Supreme Court opens to take proceedings. This was a manifest hardship and the object of the proposed Bill was to remedy it.

Mr Greene seconded the Bill he thought the principle a good one.

Hon Mr Rorke opposed the Bill as he thought it was a piece of legislation for very exceptional purpose. It might be remembered that a measure of this sort was introduced here about two sessions back and that he then strenuously objected to the matter. Planters in many instances, when they find that their voyage is a poor one, make their sons, who are minors participate in the result of the voyage as sharemens. He would never deny justice to an individual minor who could not his wages, but at the same he could not support a measure which, in his opinion, would facilitate the practice of fraud amongst those engaged in the fishery or in any other undertaking.

Mr Greene said that the hon member for Carbonear seemed to forget that if a merchant issued supplies to a man on the strength of his sons who are minors being excluded from a participation in the results of a voyage, the minors are not entitled to any share. This Bill on y give minors a right to sue in the District Court, and saves them from much of the expense at present incident to legal proceedings. It was not for the benefit of legal gentlemen.

Mr Little did not see how the objection made by the hon member for Carbonear can hold. The principle of the bill has been recognized in this colony. It was to enable a minor, who entered upon a fishing voyage, to sue his master, in case he refused to pay wages, in his own name. Where there is no shipping paper the Bill places him in precisely the same position he was in before.

Hon Mr Winter had much pleasure in supporting this Bill. It simply asks to have a young man under the age of 21 placed in the same position with regard to certain legal rights as one above that age.

Mr Scott had much pleasure in according his support to the Bill. The principle of it was incorporated in our laws so far back as 1851 and in that we merely followed the practice of English Courts.

Hon Surveyor General would give the Bill before the chair his hearty support. As a matter of fact the section was accidentally omitted from the statutes when they were being consolidated.

Hon Mr Rorke wished it to be understood that he had no desire whatever to deprive any person of his wages, if he earned in the ordinary and legitimate way with the knowledge of the supplying merchant.

The Bill was then read a second time. Ordered to be submitted to a Committee of the whole on to-morrow.

Upon motion the Indemnity Bill was read a second time.

Mr Kent presented the following petitions, from Martin Ryan and others of Torbay, and from William Shea and others of Pouch Cove which were received and ordered to lie on the table.

Hon Mr Rorke gave notice that he will on to-morrow ask leave to bring in a Bill to repeal Sec. 1st, title 17, cap. 12 of consolidated Statutes in so far as the same relates to the coast of Labrador. The house then adjourned till half-past three o'clock to-morrow.

Thursday, April 7.

Pursuant to adjournment the House opened at half past three o'clock.

PETITIONS

Mr Nowlan presented a petition from Edmund Duff and others, of Holyrood, on subject of roads.

Mr Watson presented a petition from George Payne and others, Methodist of Heart's Content, for a grant of money to construct a road to the cemetery there.

Mr Parsons presented petitions from John McGrath and others, of Torbay, from William Tupper, John Malone Pk Malone and others of same settlement on the subject of roads.

Mr Kent presented a petition from Garret Coody of Torbay, praying for employment on the public works.

These several petitions were received and ordered to lie on the table of the house.

Mr Parsons presented petitions from several inhabitants of St John's East on the subject of roads, also a petition from E. S. Bay on the subject of the erection of a pump there.

On motion the house then went into Committee of the whole on the Supply Bill.

Mr Watson in the chair. Mr Parsons said it would be remembered that on last session he offered his opposition to the main features of this measure. He felt that he must again oppose it; on several former occasions had advocated the abolition of the office of Governor. He found that the Governor of New York, governing four millions or more people than are contained in the whole dominion of Canada, only receives for his services \$9,000, while our colonial governor was paid by the fishermen of this country a salary of \$12,000. He contended that the colony should not be liable for that sum, until the incumbent of this office was a colonial, and not an imperial appointment. Besides the salary of His Excellency, \$12,000, there were other incidental expenses, such as for a Private Secretary \$923, fuel and light \$2000; repairs to Government House \$500; and 1600 for a summer residence, amounting to an aggregate altogether disproportionate to the financial ability of this country. He trusted that at the expiration of His Excellency's term the Legislature will admit the advisability of abolishing this office.

On the vote for the maintenance of the Horse Police being proposed for adoption.

Mr Parsons said that he was not here when the amount passed in committee upon supply, and if he were he should certainly strongly oppose this vote. The sooner we abolished that useless appendage the better.
