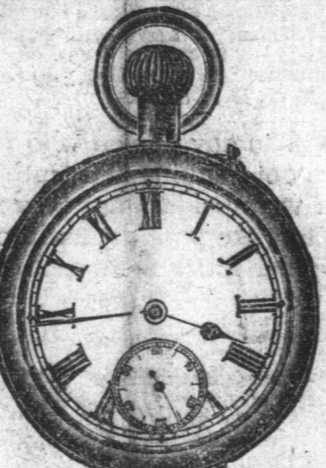

Board of Trade. A Council meeting of the Board of Trade took place last evening. Capt. W. Winsor became a member. A discussion arose about freight shipments from Montreal. Mr. W. A. Munn, who lately came back from that city, said that the Black Diamond line intended to discontinue running their steamers employed on the route last year and would likely sell them off. They would replace them by two larger steamers, up to date, which would carry freight only. They expected to be able to reduce the freight rates from \$1 to 40 cents a ton. They will endeavor to make an arrangement to secure other steamers and build up a much larger tourist traffic than has prevailed hitherto.

Regulus Arrives. The s.s. Regulus, Capt. Randall, arrived here at 5 p.m. yesterday. The vessel had a good deal of stormy weather on the run down from Sydney, which port she left on Wednesday at 5 p.m. The vessel left here at daylight on Sunday last and had stormy weather on the run up, which occupied 80 hours. Strong head gales with a mountainous sea and thick snow on occasions was her portion. Several seas were shipped and did some damage about the decks, but not to any great extent. On the run down here she had fairly fine weather. She brought a coal cargo to Franklin & Co.

Curliana. Point games for the Bonavista and Victoria trophies will be played in the Curling Rink Monday afternoon and night. It is hoped that all the new curlers will participate in the games. The Terra Nova Club has the Bonavista trophy and the Victoria trophy is in the possession of the Mic-Macs. Mr. J. C. Jardine, the President, won the former prize last season.

Will Come Here. Mr. W. A. Munn says that while he was in Toronto he spoke to Mr. A. B. Morine, who told him that the Newfoundland Club which had not long since been formed in that city intended forming a club with the object of visiting Newfoundland during the Guy-ter-centenary celebrations. Mr. Morine believes that with good modern steamers plying between Montreal and St. John's big tourist traffic would result.

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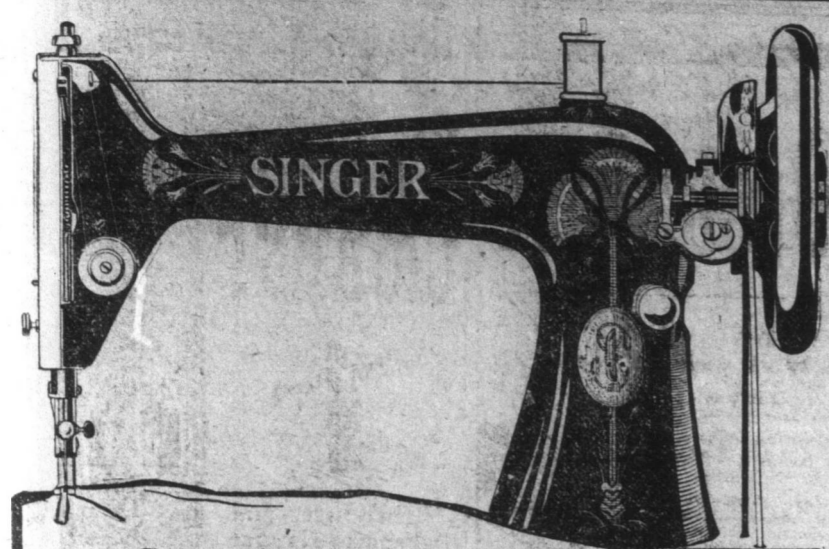

When you run across an expression you do not understand, a word whose definition you are uncertain of, do you simply remain in your state of ignorance or do you look it up?
I often hear people say, "I do want to be well educated, but I have so little time I cannot keep abreast of things as I would like to."

Very few of us who have our living to earn can do that. Our days are spent in bread winning and our nights in recuperating for more bread winning. Except for the man in ten who has a one-in-ten physique and brain, any very deep study, any systematic course of reading, or any thorough attempt to keep abreast of the political situation, the scientific discoveries, and the new thing in literature and the arts, is incompatible with a six days in the week job.

But there is one thing that most of us can do, and that is, "look it up." And the finished product in this case would, of course, be some store of education.

I know a man who had to leave school and go to work before he had completed his first year of high school, and who yet kept up his education.

He does not try to learn the definitions, but having them continually before him in this way he says he gradually absorbs them.

The other day I was visiting in a home where there is a very bright little school girl. Her older sister who, despite her three years' seniority, is not half so well informed or interesting a girl, looked up from the book she was reading.

"What does 'condign' mean?" she asked. "Condign punishment?" Her father confidently started to define it, and then decided that, although he had probably read the word a thousand times, he didn't know exactly what it meant.

"Oh, never mind," said the older girl, going back to her reading, but my bright little school girl was already at the dictionary.

"Condense," "Condescension," "Condign," she ran her finger down the page. "Condign—deserved, merited, suitable. Condign and worthy praise," she read.

And after that I didn't wonder so much at the difference between the two girls.

Of course, looking things up is something of a bother.

A musician's finger exercises are too, I suppose.

But if he wants to be a great musician he usually does them.

Do you really want to be a well educated man or woman?

Then supposing the next time you strike a word or expression you don't understand, you do the finger exercises of education and look it up.

A call for which there is no return, and which is made solely to keep the above named gentlemen in good humour, whilst Sir Edward Morris is heaping up the public debt for the benefit of the Reids, giving them all the remaining lands in the country, bartering away to an unknown syndicate all the coal areas in the Colony, and handing over to his party supporters all the valuable lands in Newfoundland and Labrador, nearly 20,000,000 acres of which has been given away since August last to his party supporters. Whilst this flagrant extravagance is going on it is impossible for a farmer or a fisherman to get the principal roads and marine works in his locality put in decent workable condition. When we remember Morris's blatant promises of last spring and the previous fall and note his present performance we fear much for the future treatment of the needs of the fisherman and the farmer.

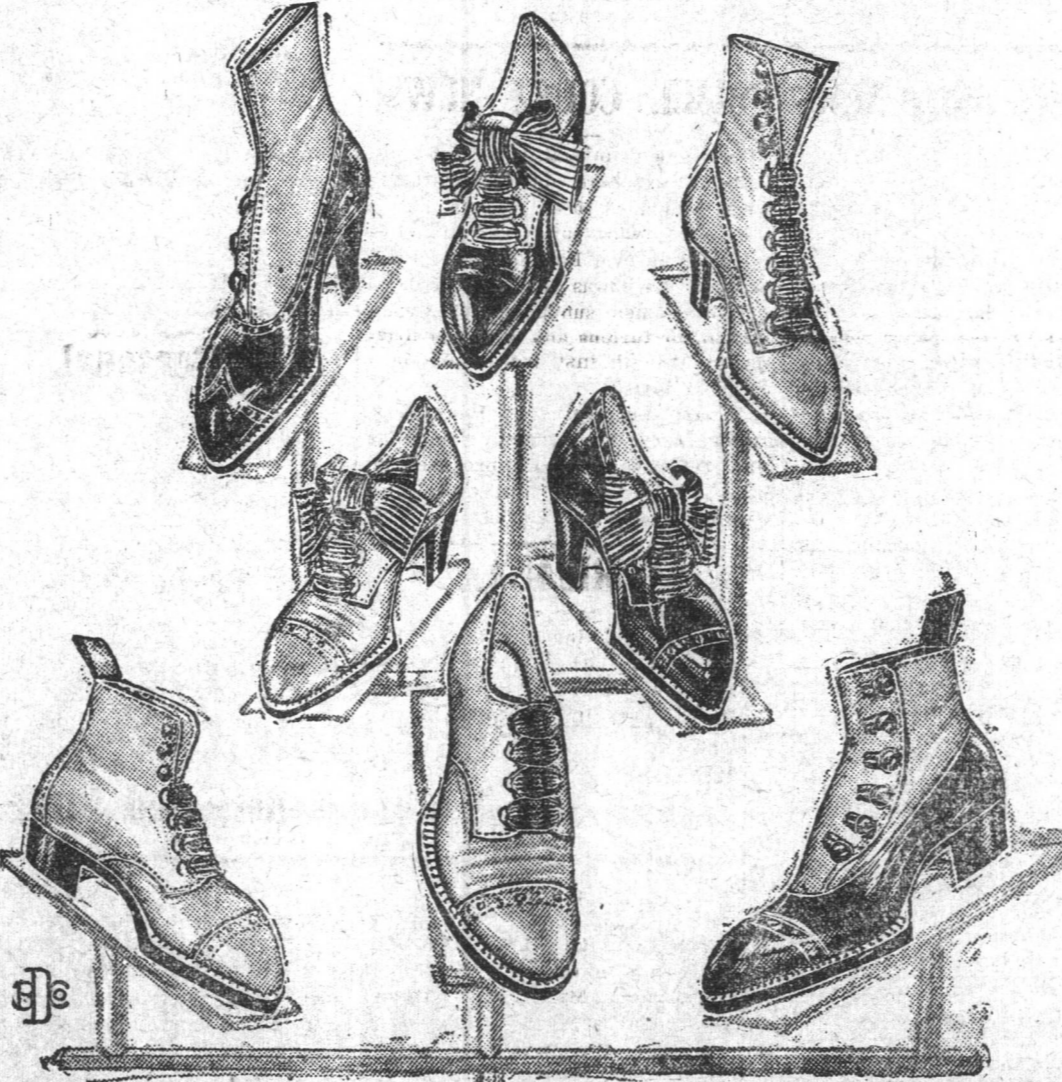

Bowring & Co., Ltd., after which he was for two years with the firm of Bowring Pros. St. John's, Nfld. Some eighteen years ago he came to New York, succeeding here Mr. Thomas B. Bowring, who was leaving for London to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. George Bowring, formerly at the head of C. T. Bowring & Co., Ltd., London. Messrs. Bowring & Co. are managing agents in New York for the well known Red Cross line of steamers which during the summer maintain a weekly passenger and cargo service between this port, Halifax and St. John's, Nfld., and are also New York agents for the Bibby Line of steamers operating an extensive service between Liverpool & Southern India via Mediterranean ports and taking goods at through rates from New York. The company represents in America several well-known firms of foreign shipowners and is ably represented by agents in the principal shipping centres abroad. The company likewise has its own house in San Francisco and has in late years done an increasing business to Australia, South America and the Far East. Mr. Stoddart is an active member of the New York Produce & Maritime exchanges and the genial efficiency of his business ability has given him a steadily increasing host of friends.—Shipping Illustrated, Jan. 29.

Greek Military League Dissolved.

ATHENS, Feb. 18. Premier Dragomiris in a statement before the Chamber of Deputies today said that the convocation of assembly in extraordinary session was necessitated as much by the condition of internal affairs as by the foreign situation. He explained that the military league had agreed to dissolve, and all those desiring to return to a normal state of affairs had decided that there was no other alternative. The Premier said he would submit a programme approved by all the party leaders. If the chamber proved recalcitrant there might be undesirable consequences, and he warned them that there was no other way out of the predicament.

The U. S. Cruisers Unseaworthy.

NALTIJO, Cal., Feb. 18. It has been learned that the cruisers West Virginia and Maryland are both in poor condition. When they reached San Francisco from the Orient last Monday the West Virginia, it is asserted, entered port running only two cylinders. Conditions in the engine room were such that the engineer of the ship not only recommended that the vessel be sent to Mare Island for a general overhauling but filed a formal protest with the Deputy against taking the West Virginia to sea when the fleet sails, on the ground that she is unseaworthy.

50 Injured by Police.

FRANKFORT, Feb. 18. It was 2 o'clock this morning before the police had cleared the streets of the crowds gathered in public protest against the proposed Prussian suffrage laws. To-day some 50 of the demonstrators are seriously injured. The Socialists insist that those attending the meetings had been advised by the speakers to go quietly to their homes and that most of them were doing so when a policeman who had arrested a man was fired upon by a party of would-be rescuers. This incident, they say, afforded the police the opportunity for which they were waiting—to attack the home-goers brutally regardless of age or sex.

Rioters Shot.

CAIRO, Ill., Feb. 18. With three companies of militia guarding the court house and jail under direct supervision of Adjutant Gen. Frank Dixon, Cairo settled down to-night to complete quiet after a strenuous 24 hours. It is believed the mob spirit is quelled. There are many scattered groups of men about the streets but no crowd is allowed to congregate. Threats were made against Sheriff Nellis for the killing of one man and the wounding of four others by the deputies in beating back the mob which attacked the jail last night to lynch two negroes.

French Ultimatum.

PARIS, Feb. 18. The Government has instructed the French Minister to Morocco to despatch a special courier to Fez bearing France's ultimatum to Mulai Hafid regarding the signing of the recently arranged Moroccan loan. The Government has advised the signatories to the Algiers convention of the measures to be taken in the event of the Sultan refusing.

The friends of former Premier Moret has united in opposition to Premier Canallas, claiming that he is not the leader of the Liberal party and insisting that he resign and permit Captain Gen. Weyler, the former Minister of War, to form a cabinet. The Premier has refused to retire, declaring that the forthcoming elections will decide the issue.

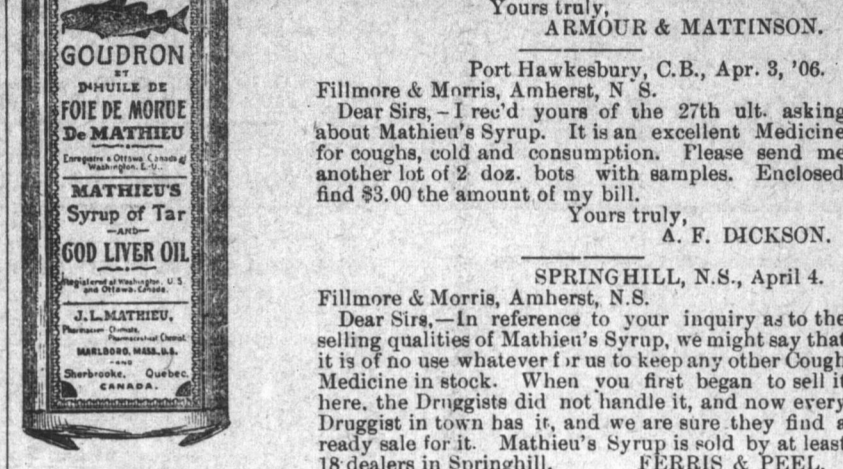
Shorthand Diplomas.
