War Legislation.

The Legislature has been in session three days. The first day was necessarily devoted to the opening cere-monies and the disposal of the Governor's speech. During the past two days several measures have passed both houses. With the exception of two measures, those relating to wireless for sealing steamers when engaged in sealing, and the empowering naval base of the Mediterranean fleet. but the injuries of the Aquitania are stopped. of the Government to call for its installation on such other steamers as may be desirable, and the Sealing Enquiry legislation, and the fiscal measures which are partly called for by war conditions, but mainly shortages due to other causes, the other measures are war measures pure and

Among the fiscal measures is one providing for the placing of stamps on certain mercantile instruments and another to collect revenue on estates left at death.
