### John Anderson British Subs In The Baltic.

That more submarines will be sent into the Baltic we may take for granted, probably in point of fact as many as the situation there calls for.

There is, of course, a limit to the number that can conveniently be kept supplied by our Allies, and equally a limit to the number that can be spared but it is known that large orders were placed for submarines when the war began, and it is not unlikely that while the Russian preparations for looking after our submarines have been increasing, our own supply of submarines has grown far beyond our home needs. If anything like the numbers mentioned by the correspondents have gone through, it seems reasonable to look for still greater stringency in the blockade of the Russian and Courland coasts. There has been little news from this field of war for some time, but it is to be remembered that we may hear of no new casualties, because both the Russians and the Germans have good rea sons for keeping the progress of th

campaign secret.
