

Just as a child learns language in the first stages without a grammar, it should at first learn music naturally and without too much rule. Rythm appeals to all animate creation, and much may be made of rythm from the earliest stage of musical work. The identification of different rythms on hearing them played will be an easy help heat the family living room. task and a useful one.

Almost all of the cradle songs slumber songs, boat songs and swing songs are in eight time in medium or slow tempo. But the same rythm taken rapidly becomes the snappiest and brightest in music, and quick steps and other spirited music will be found in the same rythm. The most rickerty rythm imaginable is five four and even hough the child will not be called unon to play such a rythm for a long time, it may sense its effect even in the early stages of musical study.

How Peace Treaties are Prepared.

When the war comes to an end a treaty of peace will be signed, sealed, and delivered, as between the various belligerents.

This will be a most imposing document, written by hand throughout, sealed with many seals, and bound about with green silk ribbon. Following the usual custom, each copy will begin with the words: "In the Name of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity." Should, however, Turkey be one of the signatory Powers, as seems probable, this formula will be altered to "In the Name of Allah the Al-

mighty God," in the copy allotted to

there are signatory Powers will be signed and sealed. The original coples will be securely locked up in the State archives of the different countries certified conies will be used for printing from and for reference

Peace treaties are not written like ordinary documents. They are written in parallel columns, one in English, the next in French, the next in Italian, German, Russian, and so on, according to the number of languages spoken by the peoples of the signatory Powers. The text of each of these columns is an exact translation of the text of all the other colimns, and the utmost pains is taken n the selection of words that will convey identical shades of meaning.

The monarchs of the signatory Powers do not affix their signatures or seals to the peace treaties entered into by them. This important formality is carried out by specially accredited Peace Plenipotentiaries.—Tit-Bits.

The threat of reprisals by the British Government for the sinking of hospital ships has issued following the German admiralty statement, that the Admiralty had convincing evidence that hospital ships were frequently misused for the transportation of ammunition and troops. This statement said that hospital ships passing on the military route of hostile armies engaged in France and Belgium, which were then in the lines of Flamborough Head and Terschelling on the one hand and Land's End Point on the other, would be no more treated as such, but that Germany's enemies would be free to use such vessels for the transportation of wounded and sick army members outside of this district, barring other sea routes reserved in case of further misuse of hospi tal ships in violation of international law. The reply of the British Government denied the German Admiralty's allegation and pointed out that Germany had a right to search hospital ships in case of suspicion, a remedy which they never had utilized.
