Man Commits Suicide.

A suicide, the first in the history of the place, occurred last Thursday morning. Emanuel Murphy was the victim. The unfortunate man had been sick for some months and arrangements were being made for him to go to St. John's to the sanitorium. Thursday morning he got up and shaved, and told his wife that he would be leaving for St. John's by train that day. After breakfast he went out of doors, and shortly re-turned and commented on the weather being cold. From then on he acted rather peculiar, passing out and in the house several times. About ten o'clock he went out, and some few minutes later he not returning, his wife sent one of the children to see where he was. The child returned, saying that its father was standing by a tree, a few yards from the home but that he would not speak. Mrs. Murphy then hastened to the scene together with some neighbors, and found the unfortunate man hanging from a tree. His feet, however, were resting on the ground. Edward Boland cut the cord which held the victim of the tragedy, and the doctor was immediately summoned, but it was found that life was extinct. Strange to say it was but a very slight piece of cord that had been used, and there could have been little or no struggle and it is thought the man must have been suffering from an attack of in-sanity at the time of the deed.—



Later Particulars of "Hush" Ships.

The lates statement of dimensions regarding the so-called "hush" ships built for the British navy during the war, indicate that their dimensions, speeds, etc., as published during the war were greatly exaggerated. Thus, The Engineer gives the following dimensions for the battle-cruisers "Renow" and "Repulse": Length, 794 feet, beam, 90 feet; draft, 30 feet; normal displacement, 26,500 tons; and for the celebrated trio "Furious," "Courageous," and "Glorious," the dimensions given by the same authority are: Length, 786 feet; beam, 81 feet; normal draft, 25 feet; and displacement, 18,600 tons After the "Furious" was changed to a seaplane carrier, airplanes had no difficulty in landing on her deck after returnisg from a flight. She is credited with 18 torpedo tubes and with 90,000 horse-power for a speed of 31 knots, which, we are told, was very greatly exceeded in actual service.

There is another problem raised by this authoritative report, namely, the less "electric belt." number of Newfoundlanders with no home to which to go, and therefore kept in hospital only for that reason. year round; 365 days at \$2.43 means \$8,869.50 cents. Our records and statistics definitely show a similar condition of affairs-only probably proportionately greater. Though we have every year to raise money to meet this tax on our budget, we have been severely criticized for mentioning it. We could not meet it unless we did, and yet those who criticize do not offer to solve the problem for their people in any other way. St. John's considers it legitimate to add this expense to their budget and make the colony pay for it. The paltry doctor, much less enable us to meet this charity, nor have we any means to raise it locally. Voters cannot want their homeless fellow countrymen turned out to perish the day they are fit to leave hospital. Are they not willing to make provision to meet this expense till a home or some method of sustaining life can be arranged for them? So long as our Association exists it has no doubt about its course

of action in this matter. The St. John's hospital report in sists that the trend of modern times in all parts of the world is towards the hospitalization of the sick, because (a) the hospital gives the patient the best, and often the only chance for his life or limb; (b) because the doctor can tell better what is the matter with the patient through its X-ray department, its laboratory, and its other aids to diagnosis, not available in the ordinary bedside practice; (c) because the patient can be watched and studied before the operation and after. Without a hospital, doctors in our scattered outports can often only see one patient once anyhow. In diseases like pneumonia and Spanish Influenza, the trained nurse is at present the most valuable part of the treatment; (d) "because only then can dietary or electrical or other special treatments be carried out." 
Public Notice!

Mr. Lewis J. Bartlett has been appointed by the Government in place of the late Mr. Eli Whiteway to attend to the movement of patients to and from the various public institutions with headquarters at the Pubilc Health Office, St. John's.

Medical Practitioners, Relieving Officers, and others are hereby notified that patients shall on no account be sent to St. John's without first receiving assurance from Mr. Bart lett that they can be admitted or. in the case of the General Hospital, that cots will be available upon their ar rival. It has been brought to the notice of the Government that sick people sent on without authority have been caused much additional suffering and hardship in boarding louses in the city, in some cases with risk of permanent injury to their health, for which of course they themselves or their advisors have been responsible. Cases other than smergency cases coming to St. John's without the proper natherity will run the risk of being immediately sent back to their homes, so as to prevent undue suffering, as it is impossible to provide accommodation for all applicants under existing con-

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
