Duke of Atholl's **New Steel House**

Can Be Erected at Greatly Reduced Cost is Claim-Little for Upkeep-Other Devices for Using Liquid Concrete Also Suggested.

As a result of the assistance promised by the Minister of Health. a number of steel house schemes have been brought from their experimental stage into public light.

Details are issuing regarding what is knows as the Atholl steel housing scheme. The Duke of Atholl some time ago co-operated with the firm of Sir William Beardmore in experiments in the construction of steel houses, and the Housing Corporation of Great Britain has associated it self with the scheme.

'The essential feature of the Atholl house," said the general manager of the corporation to a press representative, "is that it is a steel house in the strict sense of the word, and not a wood frame house lined with steel. It can be erected at a greatly reduced cost in comparison with the bricks and mortar building.

"The walls are constructed of an outer section of Beardmore pickled sheet steel, 3-16ths of an inch thick, treated on the outside with a special preservative paint, and on the inside with a special thick preservative solution, which is impregnated with granulated cork, the effect of the treatment being to absorb the moisture within the hollow walls.

"The inside portion of the wall is fixed at a space of four inches from the outer portion, giving a hollow wall with free air circulation, forming at the same time insulation against outside temperature varia-

"The cost of applying the preservative to the outer steel sheets often enough is only 12s, per house per annum.'

The Atholl house can be built in a nonth in various types-three apartments (non-parlor) or bungalow; four apartment, and the ordinary wo-storeyed type.

Messrs. Beardmore have placed heir works at Glasgow at the disposal in connection with the scheme. The Government committee which reported on the Weir steel houses has in the draft state a report dealing with the use of concrete for workingclass dwellings.

Devices for using concrete in liquid form poured between shuttering and left to solidify and in the shape of blocks have been considered. It has been suggested that more use might be made of local materi-

Transforming the Map of Canad

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 4. (C.P.)-Aerial photography in Canada has opened a new world to the map maker, A. M. Narraway, controller of surveys. Topographical Survey of Canada, told the association of Dominion Land Surveyors at the 18th annual convention opened to-day. Mr. Narraway outlined the work undertaken by the Department of the Interior in surveying by air. "Inaccessible forest or mineralized areas are now accurately mapped with ease and at a much reduced cost," he said.

Such rapid progress had been made during the past year that over 40,000 quare miles had been successfully photographed in various parts of the ountry from Nova Scotia to Alberta. Maps of the entire areas were in the course of preparation and would be ssued early this year.

From the work already completed it was known that so many changes in the shapes of lakes had been discovered and so much additional information had been added that the maps of various parts of Canada, especially those in forested areas, would be almost completely altered, and an entirely new impression of the country would be revealed.



William Johnson, of Milford, N.H., has an egg laid by one of his hens the day after the eclipse, which has pictured on it a representation of the sun half shadowed by the eclipse. The egg itself is as perfect as any well regulated hen ever laid, except o one side of it the hard shell does not cover a round spot about the size of a quarter dollar, and in its place a thin white membrane puffs out. Edges about the parting of the shell look like rays of the sun, while across the thin tissue spot is a darker crescent shadow of the yolk. This shadow lays across the round raised film part in exactly the same position as the moon was silhouetted when half across the sun's face.







Electricity in the Past and Now





Looking After War Graves in the East.

Ottawa, Ont .- (By Canadian Press) Shaded from the scorching sun by the cool, green, swaying branches of native trees, and enclosed within high stone walls that afford access to mourners and sympathizers alone. the remains of Britishers who, gave up their lives in the Great War while serving in far-off Macedonia, Greece and the Balkan States, lie tranquilly at rest, while inscribed on each shining headstone above the grass grown mounds are the words "Their Name Liveth for Evermore."

This was the reassuring picture furnished by Captain A. F. Menzies, deputy director of works, Imperial War Graves Commission, in an interview on his return from Salonica, where since 1921 he has been actively engaged with the Commission. Capt. Menzies, who is an Ottawa man, reached Salonica in the Christmas of 1920 as assistant deputy director of works with the Imperial War Graves commission. Since that time until his recent return he has been steadily engaged in the work of establishing cemeteries and gathering together the graves of British soldiers who gave up their lives for the cause of world peace and world

The Memorial to the Missing, on Colonial Hill overlooking Lake Doiran and facing the Grand Coronne in front of which the Allied Forces were held up for a considerable time owing to the inaccessible position held by the German and Bulgarian troops, is to be unveiled about April 12. 1925, when all British cemeteries will be officially opened.

Some idea of the difficulties and hardships that presented themselves to the commission can be gleaned from the fact that when Capt. Menzies arrived at Salonica in 1920 two officers connected with the commission had died from malaria and sunstroke. Added to other difficulties were those encountered in locating the graves throughout such a vast section. In some cases peasants had loughed up the land which had been sed as burial plots during the war. While these conditions were lamentable they were unavoidable as such ctions had been perpetrated before he commission reached the areas in which the burial grounds had thus peen destroyed. 

Even at the beginning of the past century, the importance of geological examination as a preliminary to opening up mineral lands was perceived and in 1839 our Government employed noted English geologist named Jukes to make a geologial reconaissance of the country. Systematic geological work, however, was not attempted until 1863 when Murray, a Canadian Government Geologist began his exploration of the island. In this he was later assisted by Howley. who contnued the work until 1909. when for some unknown reason the Geological Survey was discontinued. Thanks to the labours of these investigators, we have to-day much important information on our Mineral Resources and also a geological map of the island. The latter is, in the main correct, and is of great value at the present time. The fact remains. nevertheless, that great tracts of land, especially in the interior, are as yet unexamined geologically and are practically unknown.

Coincident with the inception of the Geological Survey under Murray, Copper ore was discovered at Tilt Cove in Notre Dame Bay. Mining operations ensued and their success gave impetus to prospecting in that region, which resulted in the discovery of the Little Bay and Bett's Cove properties. These also became important producers of Copper ore. In addition, numerous other properties such as Baie Verte, Sunday Cove Island, Robert's Arm, The Colchester, Lady Pond, and Whalesback, all in Notre Dame Bay, and later York Harbor on the West Coast, were located, some of which were worked successfully.

It was thus that in the 'eighties Newfoundland became an important mineral country and for some time ranked sixth among the Copper producing countries of the world. With the depletion of the high grade Copper areas in the known properties of this bay, however, the various mines were forced to close down, due to the fact that in these days it was impossible for them to make use of anything but what to-day would be con-

sidered extremely rich ore. Lead is another mineral that has been mined to some extent in Newfoundland in the past. Placentia Bay was for some time the scene of considerable activity, and the LaManche mine has a recorded production of some twenty thousand tons of Lead Iron ores. ore to its credit.
