Mr. E. Brougham, Esq., the efficient excise officer at Chippawa, having heard of his operations, and that the oil so imported or smuggled would by no means stand the test required by law, in addition to his other duties has recently had his hands full in looking after him and protecting the public by examining ocks of dealers and condemning the dangerous fluid wherever found. understand that the other day Mr. Brougham made a raid upon the oi dealers of Ridgeway, and ascertained that not a single drop of oil in that village would stand the test—one hundred degrees Fahrenheit. About two hundred gallons were esized. Vesterday the oil men of Port Robinson were called upon, and some of their stocks were found to be uninspected and below the standard. It is well for the people that the Government officer is taking such an interest in this matter, and ridding the country of the trash of oil which too often finds its way from the United States to our market, and which everybody knows is most dangerous to handle.

ENGLISH AND AMERICAN ENTERPRISE.—
The London Globe says: "The projected tunnel through the Rocky Mountains, already begun, promises to be the chief of all the engineering wenders of the world. The Box Tunnel astonished people in its day, but in future the Mont Cenis Tunnel itself, the length of which is more than seven miles, is to be looked upon as a mere nothing. The Rocky Mountain Tunnel is to be 12 miles long, and there will be 6,000 feet of earth and rock, or considerably more than a mile, over its greatest depth. The expense will naturally be enormous, but it is hoped that not only will most of the Western railway traffic be drawn through the 'short cut,' but that large mining, profits will accure incidentally. The company is sanguine of finding gold, silver, diamonds and the precious stones. The bore is to be effected by diamond-pointed drills, driven by powerful machinery, and it is reckoned that the tunnel will be finished at the rate of sixty feet a working day. The Mont Cenis work was fourteen years in construction; this it is hoped, will take no more than four.
