BLOW AND NATURAL RESOURCES

The junior Conservative paper comes to the assistance of Dr. Blow and defends his strange and unparliamentary course in the natural resources.

It admits that Leader Borden when in opposition did favor the handing over of the natural resources to the province. It admits that the promise was without qualification. It does not go so far as to say that the natural resources have been handed over, but it insists that Premier Borden will hand them over when he gets round to them.

Mr. Borden was more specific when in opposition. He said then that not twenty-four hours would pass when he became premier before the work of transferring the public domain would be under way. Twenty-four hours have passed since that time and Mr. Borden has let Premier Sifton's letter lie for eighteen months, or thereabouts, acknowledged but unanswered. That does not look as though Premier Borden was in any hurry. His ministers had no hesitation in saying in Saskatchewan that upon the result of that election depended the fate of the natural resources. If Premier Borden intends to hand over the natural resources, he is not going to do so until he dangles them as political bribes as long as he possibly can.

But suppose that the junior Conservative organ is really inspired and favored with knowledge denied to all others, it makes it all the worse for Dr. Blow.

According to that information Leader Borden made the unqualified promise and really intends to do so when he gets around to it. But Dr. Blow rushes in with a red flag and says "Hold! There are grubs in the land. Do not hand over the natural resources to them." Whatever Premier Borden may think about it, Dr. Blow has no hesitation about what he would do. He would have Premier Borden smash that sacred promise into a million small pieces rather than hand over the natural resources to a rattle of water, while the present provincial government was in office.

Under those conditions the position of Dr. Blow is much worse than if Premier Borden was hesitating. According to The News-Telegram it would seem that all that was necessary to get action on our natural resources would be for Dr. Blow, Mr. Michener or Mr. Tweedie to insist upon speedy action. But they are tempting Premier Borden to hold back. They are much worse than we thought they were. They are the men who are really keeping our natural resources from us.

MR. TWEEDIE'S PUBLIC RECORD

What has Mr. Tweedie done in the provincial legislature that he should expect the progressive citizens of Calgary to renew their confidence in him?

This is the largest and most progressive city in western Canada. We should be leading in the legislature.

Mr. Tweedie has been through two sessions of the legislature. What has he to show for it? What legislation has he even suggested?

What public act has he introduced? What law has he suggested? What resolution has he attempted to pass through the house?

He has done nothing. He has not even been an aggressive critic. He made big promises about execution in the public accounts but he accomplished nothing.

Alberta would have lost nothing and Calgary would have done quite as well if Mr. Tweedie had not been elected in 1911.

Editorial Notes

R. B. Bennett says that The Albertan got \$14,000 for advertising and printing last year, which is just about right. The Albertan gave good value for every cent of money received, as Mr. Bennett and all of his party friends know. The bitterest opponent of The Albertan, however, never accused it of selling its services to the highest bidder, or suspected it of joining forces with the antagonists of the province or the city to work against their interests.

The fact that Premier Sifton is taking the platform in behalf of the Labor candidate in Lethbridge is not surprising. The fact that the Conservative leaders are taking the stump against the Labor candidates in all parts of the province is not surprising.

The junior Conservative paper in Calgary concedes the return of the Sifton government, and after a careful study of conditions believes that it is or is about the best that the Conservatives can do, though it might swell up to 20 or 25. That is an estimate of an optimistic supporter of the opposition.

BENNETT VS. SULLIVAN

If some of the leaders of the Conservative party had their way they would introduce Rogers rule into Alberta as soon as possible. Let any one notice the attack made on Saturday night by R. B. Bennett upon John J. Sullivan, the Liberal organizer in High River.

Mr. Bennett declared that Mr. Sullivan was a nephew of the notorious Cap. Sullivan of Ontario, a dangerous man and should be hounded out of the country.

This is the first time that any public man has declared that in this country a man should be punished for the misdeeds of his ancestors or near or remote relatives. But apart from that, J. J. Sullivan is not a nephew or relative of any kind of the famous Cap. Sullivan. He is no nearer relative to Cap. Sullivan than R. B. Bennett is to Bill Miner.

Mr. Sullivan is a peaceable, law-abiding citizen. He took part in the infamous Macdonald election and was placed under arrest by the Roger bandits. He was thrown into jail, though not the slightest evidence of any kind was offered against him. Not only that, but he has never been brought to trial, though frequently demanding it.

Sullivan is a quiet and respectable man. He is taking a hand in the election contest as he has a right to do. He knows better than most people the real meaning of the Siberian rule of Bob Rogers, which Mr. Bennett would introduce here if he had his way. He is taking part in the struggle against the invading brigands who are trying to force Rogers' rule upon Alberta. His reputation is unimpaired and he has as much right to his good name as the ill-bred bully who is slandering him.

BRIBES GREAT AND SMALL

Can the people of Calgary be bought up by promises of prizes? We doubt it. R. B. Bennett seems to think that they can.

On Saturday night he promised the electors of this city some visionary rewards in the form of election sops if they elected the three candidates he had selected.

Elect the men and Calgary gets the prizes. Defeat the men and Calgary loses the plums.

That is straight enough. There is no confusion or evasion about that. There is more dishonesty in the real sense about a corrupt promise like that than there is in the act of the poor, deluded associate of the Calgary member, who is out in the side lines trying to buy up the depraved with money and liquor.

But Mr. Bennett did not stop at offering the bribe himself. He intimated that Premier Borden is the same kind of a briber. He told the public that, if they elected his candidates, that Premier Borden would be ready to fulfill his promise of giving Alberta its natural resources.

Calgary people cannot be bribed. They will not bite at a cheap and uncertain bait offered in such a rough and uncouth manner.

Premier Borden told the people of western Canada, that when elected to office he would hand over the natural resources. Mr. Bennett brands his leader as a faithless deceiver by adding at this time that he will hand over the natural resources as payment for their votes in the coming election.

has never held any office of any kind whatsoever, any voteless female has the privilege of and use for a party affiliation.

Had Mr. Tweedie had the forethought to consult his friend, Rev. S. B. Hillocks, that revered gentleman would have told him (if he has retained any pastoral recollections) that Dr. Amelia Yeomans is one of the veterans of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in Western Canada, that for more than twenty years she was one of the foremost women in all social welfare movements. The upper wharfe she practiced medicine, that she was one of the first qualified women in the Dominion of Canada, and that she was known to every worker for the betterment of the welfare of men, women and children in Vancouver and Montreal, that she is the honorary president of the Woman's Equal Suffrage Association of the Dominion of Canada, and that she has a record and reputation for noble work and the highest Canadian ideals in the largest cities in the Dominion, where the name of her office has probably never been heard at all.

Dr. Amelia Yeomans is not a Suffragette. She is a suffragist and one of the finest and most womanly. After a long life of service she came to Calgary several years ago to visit her two daughters and to spend here last days here, where she before she died, the realization of a life-long effort.

And Mr. Tweedie, stepping before several thousand people, says this lady is a suffragette, it comes to the attention of the Sifton Government, brought here from the East a few months ago. Were the suffragists of Calgary to follow the fine gentlemanly example of that silver-tongued orator, R. B. Bennett, it would be fairer to call Mr. Tweedie, "in plain Anglo-Saxon, a common liar." But the suffragist has not yet tarred with the R. B. Bennett stick, and it is enough to say that Mr. Tweedie has evidently made a mistake—that there has been a confusion of names perhaps. It may be that Mr. Tweedie knows a certain Dr. Amelia Yeomans whose name is Yeomans—but for Mr. Tweedie's information it may be said that she is NOT "our Dr. Yeomans" and that she has no connection with Calgary suffragists, has never been seen in this city and has never appeared in this city appearing on a single platform at a single committee where woman's suffrage was discussed.

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BRUSSELS DRAWS THE GEAR OF STRIKE OF FOOD

Believed That 500,000 Men Will Obey Summons to Lay Down Their Tools; Government Has Massed Soldiers at All Strategic Points

SOCIALIST LEADERS WILL HELP STRIKING WORKMEN

Socialist Demonstration Held in Many of the Cities of Belgium; Transportation of Dynamite Prohibited; Brisk Sale of Revolvers

BRUSSELS, April 12.—Both sides of the dispute tonight are awaiting the commencement tomorrow morning of the general strike, the progress of which will be watched by the whole of Europe with the deepest interest.

The respective forces have prepared a heavy force of soldiers and machine guns at all strategic points in the kingdom, but it is believed that at least 300,000 men will go out, and the aggregate possibly may be stretched to 400,000 or even 500,000.

The Socialist leaders have arranged to entertain the strikers and assist them with food when it is needed. Wheat already has been divided into four districts, in each of which soup and bread will be distributed.

No Unlawful Incidents. Socialist demonstrations were held in many cities of Belgium today. No less than nine meetings were held in Brussels. All of them passed off without incident.

The most important meeting was at Mons, the center of the great mining district. There the speakers were Emile Vandervelde, leader of the socialists, and M. Vandermieren, the party's general secretary.

In addition to today's speakers, all the leaders are warning the workmen against violence, and they believe their committee will be obeyed. As far as can be judged, the temper of the men, though excited, is sane, and their intentions, undoubtedly, are to avoid trouble. The government, however, is taking no chances.

The transportation of dynamite, of which thousands of tons are used in the mines, has been prohibited. On unrequiring report, possibly portentious of trouble, is that a fire alarm has been sounded in the village of Brussels. An incident of this kind probably was uncovered today when an "infernal machine" containing dynamite with the fuse half burned was found on the veranda of a manufacturer in the village of Leode, near Brussels.

The steamer Lepland, which is due at Antwerp tomorrow from New York with a heavy cargo and 1,075 passengers, will be the first important vessel to be affected by the strike.

Brussels, April 12.—Premier de Broqueville, speaking to the journalists last night, did not disguise the gravity of the situation. He said he believed the strike is being promoted by the secondary labor leaders who hope for a general strike, but that the government will not be so easily deceived. He said that the government would not be so easily deceived.

The premier said he hoped the strike would be a peaceful one, as had been announced. The spectacle of the labor party calmly and with dignity demonstrating its strength and discipline, could not fail to make an impression on the nation. The premier said, however, that the government was prepared to stop disturbances and defend the freedom of labor.

The unions, M. Vandervelde contained, would appoint gangs of men to keep things going in the various establishments so that the very day the strike is ended the factories and mines will be able to resume all operations.

Brussels, Belgium, April 12.—Troops today occupied most of the great industrial centers of the country. The order for the general strike ordered for Monday, when 300,000 or 400,000 men will quit work.

In most of the cities large crowds gathered to watch the arrival of the troops and cheer the soldiers as they marched. The Socialist strike leaders in the various localities have offered to the authorities the services of special constables drawn from their own ranks and in preserving order.
